IT WAS A SUCCESS.

The Oregon Exhibit at Milwaukee—Commander McElroy Returns Home. Salem Evening Journal, Sept. 11. Commander McElroy, accompanied by his wife and son and Mr. and Mrs. B. S. Cook, returned home last evening from Milwaukee and when seen this morning, were looking in the best of spirits and have got the "handshaking" down so fine that they can outdo the president.

The Oregon exhibit was the crowning feature of the whole encampment. The gentlemen having the thing in charge understood what they were doing and their efforts were well rewarded. During the week they were there it is estimated that over 30,000 people visited the headquarters of this wonderful show and were completely carried away by the wonderful display. Thousands of people have tasted Oregon fruit and have samples of Oregon grain that never would have happened only for this trip.

The Oregon delegation for three days paraded the principal streets of Milwaukee, headed by a fine band. The delegation followed the band in cars loaded with fruit, which was scattered among the surging crowd of people on either side of the street, who scrambled to secure a peach, prune or pear from Oregon, as if it were worth its weight in gold. In each of the cars was a good speaker, who addressed the crowded streets, telling of the display on exhibition at the headquarters and also other matters relating to Oregon. The whole thing was a perfect success. Texas and Wisconsin had a display on each side of the Oregon headquarters, but they both showed up so badly by the side of the Oregon exhibit they, as the saying goes, "shut up shop," and drowned their sorrows by mingling with the roaming crowds.

The Oregon exhibit will remain where it is, under the charge of G. W. Mitchell of Yanhill until October 5th, when it will be removed to the reading room of the Board of Trade at Chicago, where it will remain. This is the first time that any exhibit of any description has been allowed in this room, but as the board was so completely surprised at the magnificence of the display they cheerfully consented to allow it the space mentioned. The word "Oregon" was in the mouth of every visitor at the encampment and it was the best advertisement the state has ever had. The citizens of that city did everything in their power to make everything comfortable for the visitors, and no cut-throat prices were demanded. Mr. Cook and Mr. McElroy are loud in their praise for the treatment received.

COAST NOTES. Many hop yards will go unpicked in Oregon this year owing to low prices. A California exchange is authority for the statement that a lodge of colored Masons was instituted in Red Bluff a few days ago.

Over \$20,000 of fire insurance has been canceled in Whatcom, W. T., during the past week because of lack of proper protection against the flames. The loss of registered money by the recent mail robbery on the Canyon City road was less than \$200, and not over \$1000, as published to the world.

Last Thursday's Baker City Blade says: "The thermometer was down to the freezing-point yesterday morning, and ice formed in several places throughout the city." Tacoma is about to erect an exhibition building to cost \$100,000, and be ready for business in 1890. It will include immense fish tanks for exhibiting Puget Sound fish.

The new artesian well at Baker City has caused a renewed interest in the project in boring for water and many of the towns of Eastern Oregon are making preparations to sink wells. The report is that at least three townships of unsurveyed land in the Melrose valley will be thrown open for settlement about January first. It is also reported that over 500 settlers have squatted on the land and it represents quite an active and growing village.

It is estimated that the forests of Washington territory contain 175,000,000,000 feet of uncut hemlock and fir, in some places averaging from 25,000 to 60,000 feet per acre. With the immense facilities possessed for converting this into lumber, it will be years before an impression will be made upon this industry. The sheriffs of the different Eastern Oregon counties are planning a call for a sheriffs' convention, the object of which is to organize and perfect plans to co-operate with one another for the detection and capture of horse thieves and other criminals. A similar organization exists in Iowa and is said to be far more effective than the present plan by which there is little co-operation among the sheriffs.

Farewell Party. A pleasant farewell party tendered Rev. H. P. Webb at the residence of G. F. Simpson last evening. Mr. Webb has occupied the pulpit of the Methodist church in this city for a number of years, and has made many warm friends. He departs in a few days to begin his labors at Sellwood. Death of Mrs. White. Mrs. Mary White, daughter of W. R. Graham, of this city, died at her home in Independence on the 9th inst, aged 35 years. The remains were brought to this city for interment, being buried yesterday beside two of her brothers. The deceased was formerly a resident of Albany.

COMING TO THE VALLEY.

Home Seekers Crossing the Mountains in the Good Old Way, By Teams. The Ochoco Review of the 7th inst. says: Oregon's advertising efforts in the Middle West are beginning to realize now in this part of the state. The past three weeks some thirty or more wagons and teams, with the average accompaniment of loose stock, have passed through this part of the state enroute to the Willamette valley. Those specially mentioned hail from far-away Kansas, Nebraska and the Black Hills country, all the way across in the good old way—by team. Their efforts are commendable, to say the least. One outfit camped here last Sunday evening, direct from the Black Hills, having left there on May 12, this year. They said their teams were ponies, and they distanced other teams on the way that were large, heavy horses. The latter will come in this fall some time. All look to the Willamette valley as the heaven of their hopes. None of them show any disposition to stop in this dry country. They want to go where it rains once in a while. Quite a number of persons who are residents of this county, and the dried up section east of here are also going to winter in the Willamette.

We think Tangent is standing her little boom as well as any town of her size in the way of building. The new school house is completed at last, and Mr. E. W.
