## WASHINGTON NEWS.

The Cabinet Meeting Decides Against an Extra Session.

POSTMASTERS AND CONSULS.

Greater Philadelphia Launched—Civil Service Commission—Reception to Senator Sherman.

Special Correspondence.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—The President returned to Washington Friday night for a short stay. He left Mrs. Harrison in Philadelphia the guest of Mrs. Wannamaker. Finding it impossible to return there the President telegraphed Mrs. Harrison and she came on to Washington. Saturday the first cabinet meeting for quite a while was held, all the cabinet were present except Secretaries Blaine and Rusk who are out of town. The extra session, lasting several hours was given up to the discussion of an extra session of Congress, and it was finally decided not to call an extra session. When the meeting opened the only outright opponents of an extra session were Secretaries Windom and Tracy, but they were so well fortified with unanswerable arguments against the extra session that the decision was finally arrived at unanimously. It was generally expected that several other important matters would be taken up at this meeting but owing to the unusual length of the session they were postponed. The Democrats appear to be disappointed because no extra session of Congress has been called. They had been indulging in the hope of its being called and of some mistakes being made by the republicans that would change the unmistakably favorable sentiment which the country entertains at present for the administration.

The President has appointed a long list of postmasters, also the following: Thomas H. Anderson, Ohio, to be minister to Bolivia; Edwin Dun, to be Secretary of the legation to Japan; Arthur W. Barrett, of Massachusetts, (a brother of the editor of the Boston Advertiser) to be secretary to the legation to Venezuela; W. R. Gardner Jr. of Indiana, to be second secretary of the legation to Japan; and the following Consuls: Joseph T. Mason, of Virginia, at Managua; Bernard Macaulay, of New York (son of Gen. Dan Macaulay, ex-Mayor of Indianapolis) at Managua, Nicaragua; Aulick Palmer, of the District of Columbia, at Dresden; and John D. DeHille, of Texas, (son of Olive Logan, the famous newspaper correspondent) at Bristol, England.

Secretary Proctor has gone to Vermont and Gen. Schofield is Secretary of War.

Quite a number of officials and several members of the diplomatic corps went over to Philadelphia Saturday to witness the launching of the new cruiser "Philadelphia." A daughter of Postmaster General Wannamaker christened the new boat.

Judge Heuck the plain spoken Congressman from Tennessee and Civil Service Commissioner Lyman had a good natured argument a day or two ago as to whether the Civil Service Commission should be abolished. Judge Heuck took the affirmative and succeeded in easily demolishing every reason that Mr. Lyman could furnish for the existence of the commission. It is more than probable that the Judge will repeat his argument upon the floor of the House early in the next session.

Policeman Kearney, the man who arrested the assassin Gattuso as he was running to a carriage after the shooting of President Garfield, died here last Friday.

Wednesday last, will be the one hundredth anniversary of the organization of the United States Treasury department. Secretary Hamilton, could be compared to the department as it is to-day with what it was then would doubtless open his eyes wide.

The World's Exposition to be held in Washington in 1892 will be the grandest affair of the kind ever seen. The Centennial exhibition of 1876 will seem by comparison with it to have been a very ordinary show.

Senator Sherman is to be given a rousing reception by the Ohio republicans next Friday when he will return from his European trip.

Ohio and Indiana furnish more applicants for position in the Railway Mail Service than any other states.

## THE UNION PARTY.

Prohibition Third Party Under a New Name.

Last Saturday, as per previous call, there assembled in Salem delegates from various portions of the state to formulate a proposed new party. The meeting was held in the garage hall, Dr. J. F. Hendrix of Harrisburg, president, and J. M. Payne was secretary.

Committee on declaration of principles were: M. Miller, prohibitionist; W. C. Edwards, Knight of Labor; H. E. Hayes, master of state grange; Dr. J. F. Hendrix, union labor party; J. H. Rook, woman suffragist; J. H. Beatty, union carpenters, and J. P. Robertson, L. Butler, Ashley White and W. O. Warren. Messrs. Robertson, Butler and White are prohibitionists, and Warren is a granger.

## TANNER'S PLACE.

Major Warner Explains that He Cannot Accept It.

A SCHOOL-BOYS FATAL FALL.

Nagle Released from Custody for the Killing of David S. Terry—The Shooting Was Justifiable.

DEER PARK, (Md.), Sept. 16.—Major Wm. Warner was closeted with President Harrison over an hour last night. He left early this morning. He came to explain why he could not give up a lucrative business to accept the pension commissionership. Whether the president succeeded in changing his determination cannot be learned.

Lewis A. Groff, of Omaha, was appointed general land officer this morning, vice Stothel M. Stockslager, resigned.

## A TIMELY RAIN.

It Assists in Extinguishing the Big Louisville Fire.

LOUISVILLE, Sept. 16.—The rain this morning aided in extinguishing the fire which burned the building in which were Bamberg, Bloom & Co., and other firms. The heaviest losses are as follows: Bamberg, Bloom & Co., \$90,700; Louis Gramman & Co., shoes, \$75,000; L. Bretsfeld & Co., \$55,000. The loss on the smaller buildings will bring the total to \$1,265,000.

## SUGAR MARKET UNION.

One Hundred and Thirty-Five Delegates in Session in New York.

New York, Sept. 16.—The eighth annual convention of the Sugar Makers' International Union assembled at Tammany hall this morning. There are 135 delegates from all parts of the United States and Canada present. This morning an adjournment was taken after a brief session until 2 p. m. Important matters are to be considered in the convention, which will last more than a week.

## FELL FROM A BEERY.

Frightful Fall of a Lad at Fresno, California.

FRESNO, Cal., Sept. 16.—Henry, the 17-year-old son of George E. Church, fell from the belfry of the K street school house this morning and was instantly killed. The school-house was occupied for the first time this morning, and the boy was running about the building and stepped on a loose board, causing the accident.

## NAGLE DISCHARGED.

The Shooting of Judge Terry Decided to be Justifiable.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 16.—In the United States circuit court this morning Judge Sawyer decided that the federal court has jurisdiction in the case of U. S. marshal Nagle, charged with killing Judge David S. Terry, and ordered Nagle discharged from custody, the shooting being justifiable.

## A BOODLE RETURNS.

An ex-County Commissioner of Chicago Surrenders Himself.

CHICAGO, Sept. 16.—Johnny Hannigan, ex-county commissioner, accused of boodling, and who ran away from Chicago two years ago to escape prosecution, has returned from Canada. He walked into court this morning and asked to be allowed to give bail. The judge held him in \$10,000.

## Returning to Work.

LONDON, Sept. 16.—Most of the strikers resumed work this morning. It is expected that work on all the docks will be in full way to-morrow. Thousands of unemployed dock laborers are waiting at the gates of the docks and threaten violence against the men employed to take their places, whom the dock companies refuse to discharge.

## An Overdue Mail Boat.

NORFOLK, (Va.) Sept. 16.—The Roanoke island mail boat, due at Elizabeth, N. C., last Monday has not arrived. It is feared that she was caused in Albemarle sound during the gale and was lost.
