WASHINGTON NEWS.

Notes and Comments From the National Capital.

PERSIAN COMMISSIONSHIP.

Tanner Offered a Minor Position.—The World's Exposition in 1892 Will Probably be Held in Washington.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.

The president did not get off to Deer Park until Saturday, owing to important matters demanding his attention here. Before going he tendered the appointment of commissioner of pensions to Major William Warner, of Missouri, ex-congressman and ex-commander-in-chief of the G. A. R. Major Warner is here but has not yet decided to accept the position, and many of his friends say that his acceptance is extremely doubtful, as he cannot afford to give up his present large income from his legal practice for the salary of commissioner of pensions, \$4000 per annum. However, great political pressure is being brought to bear upon him and he may be made to see that it is his duty to accept. I am in a position to state positively that whether Major Warner accepts or not the president has fully decided that he will give the position to a representative member of the G. A. R., so that veterans may rest assured that their interests will be looked after.

Although several days old the resignation of Commissioner Tanner is still the all-absorbing topic of conversation.

Mr. Tanner has been tendered a U. S. marshalship in New York, which he declined. It is thought that the president will appoint him recorder of deeds in this city, and that he will accept the appointment, although some of his friends say that he will not again accept office under the present administration.

Secretary Noble declines at present to make public either the report of the commission which investigated the pension office or his correspondence with Commissioner Tanner, but they are certain to be brought when congress meets, if not before, as a congressional investigation of the whole thing is now inevitable. And it is probable that the republicans will forestall democratic action by themselves taking the initiatory steps thereto.

Secretary Windom has given notice that he will receive no more callers until his annual report is completed.

Letters received here from all sections of the country show that four-fifths of the people are in favor of holding the World's Exposition of 1892 in Washington. Of course it will be held here, there has never been a doubt of it.

Attorney General Miller has gone to Indianapolis to bring his family to Washington. He expects to return about the 1st of October.

A LONG RIDE ON A WHEEL.

Tom Roe of Chicago Will Cross the Continent on a Bicycle.

San Francisco Alta.
Tom Roe, the chief of the Chicago bicycle tribe, arrived in the city last night and is now stopping at the Palace. He left Chicago last Monday afternoon by rail, but will return on his wheel. He is to ride back in less than fifty-nine days, and if he succeeds in his task he will receive a handsome gold medal from the Chicago Herald. Immediately upon his arrival in this city Roe was taken in tow by a number of local wheelmen, who escorted him through some of the principal parts of the city. In conversation with a reporter last night Roe stated that he will start for the East to-morrow, leaving the Palace Hotel at noon. It has been stipulated that he is to stop at every station along the railroad and telegraph to the Chicago Herald the number of miles the cyclistometer attached to his wheel registers, his physical condition, and such other matters appertaining to his trip as will be interesting to the public. The Santa Fe officials have taken a deep interest in his endeavors, and have instructed their agents along the entire system to afford him every facility to make fast time. They have kindly placed their wires at his disposal, and for the benefit of the wheelmen that are interested in Tom's effort to break the record of fifty-nine days, daily bulletins will be exhibited in various parts of Chicago.

Roe has studied the territory through which he must pass, and believes that he will be enabled to ride the distance in fifty days, barring any serious accident. To do this he must average a trifle over fifty miles a day. The distance over the route Roe has selected is 2573 miles. The route Stevens took when he made his record was through Southern Dakota, or what is known as the northern route, which is nearly 300 miles shorter than that over which Roe will travel.

Roe is a strong and able-bodied fellow, very determined, and a skillful as well as a rapid wheelman. Recently he rode from Indianapolis to Cincinnati over rough roads, a distance of 140 miles, inside of sixteen hours. He is to ride between daylight and dark during his projected trip. As a compliment to the Chicago Club, of which Tom has been such an active member for so many years, he will carry the entire distance a banner representing the club's colors of blue and old gold, on which is worked "The Chicago Herald" in blue and old gold silk. It will be fastened to the handle of his wheel.
