THE CITY COUNCIL.

The Usual Amount of Business—More Sewers—The Proposed Chemical Engine.

Regular meeting of the city council last evening was attended by the full council, with Mayor Cowan in the chair.

The committee on streets and public property reported that the sewers contracted for by James Laurent were completed and that they recommended they be paid for to the amount of \$75.60, which was adopted.

The same committee recommended that a small catch basin be placed on the west line of block 22, not to exceed \$20 in cost, which was adopted.

The marshal recommended that sidewalks be rebuilt on lot 4, block 22, also on west side of Ellsworth between 6th and 7th, also on the north side of 3d street, between Ferry and Washington on lots 5 and 6, block 15, which recommendation was adopted and the work ordered within five days.

Petition of J. F. Backensto for a crosswalk on the west side of Calapooia street across 9th street was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

The contract for the building of foot bridges across the Santiam ditches on Ellsworth and 8th streets and Calapooia and 5th streets was let at \$67 to S. W. Reece.

The former contractor for building the Ellsworth street bridge was voted the balance due him upon two bridges already built, to the amount of \$11.

A motion to authorize the extending of the Calapooia street sewer was amended and referred to the committee on accounts and current expenses.

On motion the committee on accounts and current expenses and the mayor and Councilman Gradwohl were instructed to ascertain if sewer pipe can be obtained on terms to conform to the limits of indebtedness.

S. Froman requested that drainage be made on Baker between 3th and 9th streets, which was ordered under supervision of the street commissioner.

The matter of the flume running down Broadalbin street was ordered put in repair by Schultz Bros.

Also the flume on Lyon street was ordered put in repair.

The report of the committee on health and police in reference to sewers was taken from the table and referred to the committee.

Committee on fire and water was ordered to sluice out the Calapooia street sewer.

On motion the council adjourned.

AFTER NAUGHTY FISHERMEN.

Thousands of Salmon on the Klamath River Being Destroyed—Some Dispatches.

Governor Pennoyer received the following dispatch:

LINKVILLE, Or., Sept. 21.—Governor Pennoyer, Salem, Oregon: Lieutenant Alfred M. Fuller, Second Cavalry, reports as follows:

The Klamath River Improvement Co have built a dam across Klamath river at Manistee, Siskiyou county, California, four miles from Ager station, without providing a fish way; that fifteen or twenty people are employed night and day taking large quantities of salmon and destroying thousands of others; that the river is fairly polluted with dead fish, all in violation of law. There is much indignation among the people in that part of California and Oregon, and needed measures should be taken to stop the lawless acts and to have a fishway constructed that will allow the millions of salmon to go up this important river, as this is the season that they must go up to deposit the spawn. N. A. MILES, Brig. Genl. Comdg.

Upon receipt of this governor sent the following dispatch to Governor Waterman:

SALEM, Or., Sept. 23.—Gov. R. W. Waterman, Sacramento, Cal.: I forward you the following dispatch from Brigadier-General Miles, inasmuch as the matter complained of is within the jurisdiction of California. Will you please take steps to correct the abuse. SYLVESTER PENNOYER, Governor of Oregon.

Under section 437 of the penal code of California the obstruction of a river as complained of, stricture to say, is not a misdemeanor, until after the fish commissioners have requested it not to be obstructed.

The governor also apprised General Miles of his action.

Southern Oregon Fair.

The Southern state board of agriculture is now holding its fair at Central Point, Jackson county. Secretary Miller, writing from Jacksonville, says of the prospects: Our district fair promises to be a great success—not only in point of numbers, but in the excellence of the horticultural and stock exhibits. The fame of Southern Oregon has already gone abroad as to its wonderful fruit yield, but it is not generally known that it yields the palm to none in blooded stock. But a few years since the horses of Southern Oregon had a coast reputation. Recent sales notably that of McDonough & Swan—worth \$200,000 or Van DeLashmunt for \$100,000—prove that the old Vermont stock is still in the ring. As for blooded cattle, almost every kind is owned. Our district fair will resemble former state fairs in that many who have never seen a fair will come and camp during the week. Nothing since the gold excitement of the fifties and the building of the railroad has occurred to draw such crowds. In fact, the largest crowd ever assembled in Southern Oregon will be at the fair near Central Point, between Monday the 23d and Friday the 27th. The grounds are located in the heart of Rogue river valley, having plenty of shade and good water. The mile track, on granite soil, is specially adapted for winter training and is destined to become the common meeting ground of the California and Oregon turfmen.

Coming Thursday Evening.

A Flume Gives Way.

The flume of the Broadalbin street branch of the Santiam canal broke in on First street yesterday morning, flooding adjoining basements with water four feet deep. Such flumes on business streets should be enclosed in stone covered aqueducts to prevent from frequent annoyances of this kind. The question was submitted to the city council at its meeting last night.

When the Rains Come.

Boating on the upper Willamette is sure to be lively during the coming navigation season. The Oregon Pacific company have two of their boats, the Hoag and Bentley at Corvallis, where they are receiving substantial improvements and repairs. New wheels are being built for them and twenty feet of skylights are to be placed in the roof of each cabin. The O. P. & N. company say they will have two, and maybe four, boats on this route. There is a vast quantity of wheat and other grains, as well as much other freight to be moved and as many boats as can be placed on the run are sure to have all the freight they can handle. A few weeks of rain would bring the water up to an easy boating stage.

THE WHEAT CROP.

Bulletin Noted From the Several Counties in Oregon, Washington and California.

From the crop bulletin just made public by the department of agriculture relative to the crops throughout the country, the following notes from county correspondents on the Pacific coast are taken, relative to the wheat crop:

Oregon: Lane—Got an early growth before the drouth set in. Union—Prime condition; a little light in weight. Summer fallow is very high in yield—110; spring fallow is 90, owing to the June drouth. Gilliam—Generally an entire failure. Linn—Fall wheat yielded better than was expected, yet is spotted in some sections and about an average crop. In other localities it would market 105; spring wheat is 80. Yamhill—A full average.

Washington: Columbia—Not so plump as usual. San Juan—Fall wheat is a good crop; spring wheat is not a good crop.

California: Humboldt—Much injured by rust; not even fit for hay in some sections. Sutter—Fall off in ripening prematurely. Lake—Very poor; late rains and heavy dews caused rust in all late sown, the greater portion of which is not worth cutting; some of the early sowing was damaged, especially on moist land. Stanislaus—Will average fourteen bushels per acre. Marin—Small crop of fair condition.

Miss Henrietta Moore, of Ohio, who stands high on the list of National W. C. T. U. lecturers is now speaking at different points in this county, and will reach Albany on Monday, the 30th inst. She will give an address at the W. C. T. U. hall at 3 p. m., to which all are invited, and especially the ladies who desire to know more of the work of both the national and local unions. Her evening lecture will be well worth the hearing of all thinking people. She has recently done good work in Washington territory and meets with general favor wherever she speaks, this being her second visit to this coast.

UP THE CALAPOOIA.

Something About the Valuable Timber Lands that Will Sooner or Later be Lumbered.

CRAWFORDSVILLE, Sept. 23.

In these days of timber grabbing and the operations of timber sharpers it is refreshing to see some of the vast wealth of timber of this region falling into hands, whereby it will be converted into lumber in an honest and legitimate manner. This is just now being done here.

About 250,000,000 feet of lumber has been located on the Calapooia near here during the past six months. This has been done by actual settlers. A Michigan company with a capital stock of several million dollars are arranging to start a big saw-mill here in the near future. They propose to improve the river, and it is said, will make an effort to have a branch railway from Albany to this timber belt, which contains some of the most valuable timber on the coast.

Mr. J. H. Armstrong has been largely instrumental in getting the timber opened up, and he has done so without any dissatisfaction whatever. The timber lands when secured are valued at \$10.00 per acre, and the owners say they are willing to pay taxes on an assessment at that rate.

It is quite certain that these mills will ultimately be built, and this movement promises to add materially to the growth of this part of the country.
