

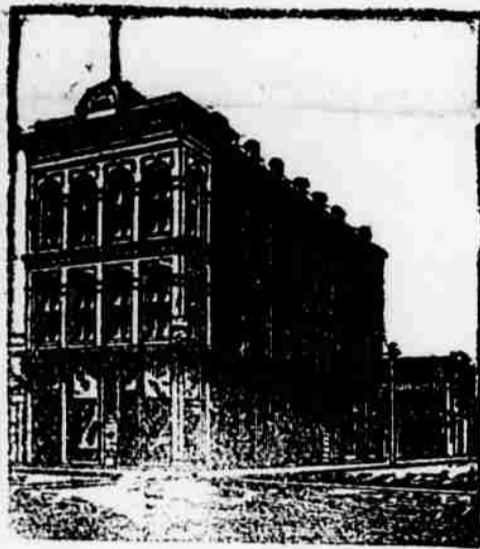

A BLOODY FIGHT.

Four Officers Murdered in the Navassa Islands Riot.

THE AUTHENTIC PARTICULARS

Governor Pennoyer Is Still Cranky on the Railroad Commission Business—Eastern News Items.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 1.—Authentic information about the riot on Navassa Island was received last night in a letter from Dr. Smith, acting superintendent of the Navassa Phosphate Company, who, with C. W. Roby, mine boss, and one other officer, are the only surviving officers of the bloody affair. They have taken refuge on the British man-of-war "Forward," which came to their assistance.

Dr. Smith writes that on the morning of the 14th of September the negroes rose in insurrection and killed four of them, N. Foster, Joseph Kales, Jas. Mason, Wm. T. Shea. Roby was the first assaulted in the digging, and was left for dead. At noon the men congregated in front of the superintendent's house and refused to work. When Jones attempted to arrest one of the ringleaders he was knocked down and in a few minutes a howling mob surrounded him. He managed to get to the house, where the other officers had sought shelter, though a volley of rocks and other missiles were hurled at him. He took refuge in the rear of the superintendent's house and opened fire on the mob. The battle lasted three hours, with an occasional negro wounded, when the inmates were startled by the explosion of a dynamite bomb on the lower porch. This was soon followed by another, until there was a continued roar of dynamite. When the officers attempted to seek another shelter Foster was butchered with knives and Joseph Kales was copped to pieces with axes. William Shea and James Mahone were also murdered. All the murdered men have been properly buried. The negroes still have possession of the island.

STATE DISPATCHES.

Governor Pennoyer Does Not Retain Judge Boise's Decision.

SALEM, Oct. 1.—Governor Pennoyer, speaking to a reporter to-day expressed his regrets at Judge Boise's refusal to allow him to test in the courts the right of the railroad commissions to draw their salaries without the approval of their boards. He said that "Judge Boise was sealed in one of the judicial tribunals of the state for the purpose of hearing and deciding just such questions, and not for the purpose of slandering the door in the face of those seeking the enforcement of the law. The old rule was that the doors swing open at the appearance of any such suit."

THE KNIGHTS OF LABOR.

The Meeting at St. Louis is an Unimportant One.

St. Louis, Oct. 1.—General Master Workman Powderly of the Knights of Labor arrived here this morning. In an interview he said that the meeting of the executive board in this city is a regular one and not called to consider any general misunderstanding, as he knows of none of any consequence existing. He has no information of any anti-Powderly meeting to be held by discontented Knights.

UNFORTUNATE BOULANGER.

He Is Short of Funds and Will Live in Cheaper Quarters.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—It is reported that Boulanger will take up his residence on the Isle of Jersey. It is said the change is to reduce expenses, as those who have been furnishing him with funds refuse to continue to supply him with money. He has had a quarrel

with Rochefort, who will visit Egypt and pass the winter there unless he is granted an amnesty by the French government.

Irish Troubles.

DUBLIN, Oct. 1.—Farm laborers of county Clare are indignant at the farmers, who they claim are using the national league for their own profit. They oppose in every way the interests of laborers. A meeting was held by the laborers, at which it was resolved to form a laborers' league and demand the power to elect representatives to the local board.

QUEEN VICTORIA'S YACHT.

The Floating Palace in Which the English Sovereign Travels.

London Truth.

The exquisite cleanliness of everything strikes one forcibly on board the Victoria and Albert. The deck is laid with cork floor cloth, over which, when the Queen is on board, a carpet is placed, and everything else that is to be seen is of pure white, with gilded relief work and silver mountings. There are very comfortable little sitting-rooms on the promenade deck, and there is also a dining saloon on the promenade deck, which has three windows and a skylight. It is furnished in green morocco, and the ceiling is white and gold.

The state apartments below are placed on either side of a corridor, and they are furnished with a very pretty chintz. The Queen's cabins are on the starboard side, and her sleeping apartment contains a large and old-fashioned but very comfortable looking bedstead, with pillar and canopy, and next is the dressing room, which was formerly Prince Albert's cabin, and it remains as he left it, his little writing table and wardrobe never having been moved. Large maps hang on the walls. The cabins occupied by Princess Beatrice (or by any princess who happens to be traveling with the Queen) are aft of her Majesty's quarters, and on the other side of the corridor are the cabins of the Princess and a large bathroom. The breakfast room is in the afterpart of the vessel, and it has very large windows and is hung with the portraits of all the officers who have commanded the royal yacht. The drawing-room is furnished in bird's-eye maple, with a piano and several beautifully carved side tables. It is hung with portraits of members of the royal family, and in this room is a small library. The yacht is now lighted with electricity, except in the Queen's own cabins.
