SANTIAM MINES.

WOMEN AS MAIL CARRIERS.

The Polk county papers are loudly boasting of their women mail carriers. They say Miss Ethel Rose carries the mail from Airlie to Lewisville, a distance of six miles, Miss Chapin, from Dallas to Syracuse, a distance of six miles. That is a good record, but over in Tillamook county there is a woman mail carrier who goes there twenty-five miles better and has served her country by being the mother of nine children besides. This woman is Mrs. Page, and she carries a semi-weekly mail between Neskonowin on Nestucca beach, and the store at Grand Ronde, a distance of thirty miles. Her route lies over a mountainous country in which are many steep grades and dark passes, but she braves the winter winds, and delivers the mail on time. In the summer when the roads are good, she travels in a light vehicle, but during the rainy season she goes on horseback.

SCHOOL REPORT.

The following is a report of the Orleans school district, No. 35 for month ending September 27, 1889: Number of pupils enrolled 17; number days attendance 227; days absence 43, (nearly all caused by sickness). Average department 97.5. Those excelling in both scholarship and deportment were Mina Yates, Loyd Millhollen, May Headrick, Fay Banks and Fesha Daves, the first named standing the highest. Those excelling in scholarship alone were Mart Bertbold, Joe Blumberg, and Bird Croft, and in deportment alone were Elva Millhollen and Charlie Dow.

The pupils have all done well. They have made good progress in their studies, and the best of humor has prevailed on the playground. If the children always do as well and try to help make their school pleasant, this will soon be one of the most pleasant schools in the state.

The interest of the pupils would be increased if the parents and officers of the school would take more interest and visit it.

EUGENE, Oct. 5.

STATE DISPATCHES.

News Notes from the State Capital—The Railroad Commissioners.

Special to the Herald. SALEM, Oct. 7.—George W. Corder was brought to the asylum from Douglas county to-day. He is 27 years of age and resided at Glendale. He is destructive and often violent. W. S. Newbury and J. G. Warner were commissioned notaries public to-day. Articles incorporating the State Land and Trust Co., of Salem, were filed in the office of the secretary of state to-day. The capital stock is \$30,000, issued in shares of \$100. The incorporators are George W. Johnson, W. F. Peck, H. A. Johnson, Jr., and M. W. Hunt. Business is to begin about October 15. The board of railroad commissioners are in session attending to correspondence. Commissioners Faulk, Clow and Colvig were present. Clerk Waggoner will investigate the killing of Anderson by striking a cattle guard fence near Trunk two weeks ago. The circuit court docket for the October term, beginning October 14th, was completed to to-day, and consists of forty cases. The supreme court met to-day, it being the regular October term. The docket will consist of eighty cases. Bower vs. Holladay, judgment of the lower court modified. Opinion by Thayer, C. J.

Burkhardt, for assuming the relations of husband and wife without observing the marriage laws of the country. They were arraigned in Justice Humphrey's court, when a license was procured and the marriage ceremony was duly pronounced by His honor Judge Humphrey, which terminated the case commenced several days ago.

Negotiations Pending.

It is understood that negotiations are pending for the purchase of the Santiam canal, the Magnolia flouring mills and the city water works to Mr. H. B. Turner of New York, one of Col. T. E. Hogg's party. The value of the property is about \$150,000. Mr. Turner and others have been engaged for three or four days in looking up the abstract of the property. It is whispered about that some big improvements are to be made if the purchase is concluded, and it will probably be consummated within a few days.

COAST NOTES.

News Items Gathered from Exchanges Throughout the Northwest.

The Corvallis public schools have about 250 pupils. There are nine scholars in the state school for the blind. The Salem fruit evaporator now consumes 250 bushels of apples daily. The O. & C. road has put several extra coaches on the Eugene express to accommodate the crowds attending the Industrial Exposition at Portland. The Lane county jail has only one occupant awaiting the meeting of the circuit court. He is the man Putman, charged with mailing obscene letters. The Presbytery of Oregon meets in semi-annual session next Tuesday at East Portland. The synod of the Columbia, including the Presbyterian churches in Alaska, Washington, Northern Idaho and Oregon, will also hold their annual meeting, beginning Thursday week, at Pendleton. Miss Piberin, the girl who was so badly burned at Brown's hopyard, near Eugene, a few weeks ago died from the effects of her injuries. She was buried the next day in the cemetery across the river. The family resides on the line of the Oregon Pacific road, between Corvallis and Yaquina, but didn't have the means to take the body there for burial. Latest reports from the Santiam mines are very encouraging and development work is being pushed forward very rapidly. The shaft of the Albany Mining Company is down sixty feet and good prospects are ahead. The Golden City Mining Company are running a cross cut to their old tunnel and the stockholders assert that they have something rich. A new road will be built to these mines by private capital and the Santiam district may yet obtain a world wide fame.
