THE CONFERENCE

The delegates from the American
nations will shortly assemble
in Washington to commence their
deliberations. The delegates of
the United States will be Gen.
John B. Henderson, of Missouri;
Clement Studebaker, of Indiana;
Cornelius Bliss and Charles R.
Flint, of New York; T. J. Coolidge,
of Massachusetts; Andrew Carnegie,
of Pennsylvania; Henry G.
Davis, of West Virginia; John F.
Hanson, of Georgia; W. H. Trescott,
of South Carolina, and M. M.
Estee, of California. Four of the
ten—Flint, Davis, Hanson, and
Trescott—are democrats, and the
rest are republicans. Politics,
however, had no influence in their
selection. They are well-informed
and practical men, and have had
conspicuous experience in some of
the most prominent and extensive
departments of activity. Henderson,
Davis, and Estee are lawyers;
Bliss and Flint are merchants;
Carnegie, Studebaker, and Hanson
are manufacturers; Coolidge is a
financier, and Trescott is a diplomat.
The representatives of the Central
and South American states are
also able, practical, and distinguished.
The problem which the
congress sets out to discuss is
worthy of the eminent and earnest
men who will compose it. Last
year the nations to the south of the
United States imported merchandise
to the value of \$450,000,000,
but only 11 per cent. of it came
from this country. Eighty-nine
per cent. of this trade, broadly
speaking, was enjoyed by England,
France and Germany. We are
heavy purchasers of sugar from
the West Indies and coffee and
hides from South America. We
take from the independent countries
of the continent a large portion
of the commodities which they
sell, while they obtain from us
only a small fraction of the articles
which they buy. Under other and
more sensible conditions these
elements of trade would be equalized.
If a fair share of moderation,
fact, and sense is shown by the
countries concerned, the desired
conditions can be brought about.
Central and South America need
the manufactures of which we have
an abundance, and we can provide
a convenient and profitable market
for the raw material which they
have to sell, and this exchange
can be accomplished in a manner
and to an extent which would
prove highly advantageous to all
the countries participating in it.
If the congress of American nations
which is soon to assemble should
outline some scheme whereby this
condition of things can be brought
about, it will have done the work
which it was created to accomplish.
Other and not less important
measures will undoubtedly be
discussed, and the results of the
convention will be of lasting benefit,
and broad and far reaching influences,
or it will simply be a mutual
admiration society of the different
nations represented. There is no
danger, however, of the meeting
resulting in a such a state of
affairs. Though the desired
results may not be at once apparent
they will never the less follow in
the years to come, and this first
international congress is but the
forerunner of many similar meetings
in the future.

that the governor must approve

The crop-weather bulletin issued
by the Oregon state bureau for the
week ending Oct. 5th says: The
weather conditions have been
favorable to fall plowing and seed-
ing and to the growth of grasses in
Western Oregon, while in Eastern
Oregon not sufficient rain has
fallen, except in a few of the more
favored localities to be of much
practical benefit. At Astoria there
was a heavy rain and wind storm
on the first two days of the week.
Throughout the northern part of
the Willamette Valley especially,
the past week has been all that
could be desired, warm showers
and sunny days since Tuesday.
Grass has made good growth, rain
enough has fallen to insure late
pasture. Grass and clover field
and late garden crops has been
favored by the weather. The wheat
is all in the warehouses, but
little has been sold, it is generally
being held for an improved market.
There appears to be no movement
in hops. Potatoes have a good
market with a tendency to increase
in price. As fine grapes as has
been shown in the Portland mar-
ket were received at the Central
office from Grant, Sherman Co.,
showing the adaptability of the
climate and soil of that region to
the culture of grapes.
