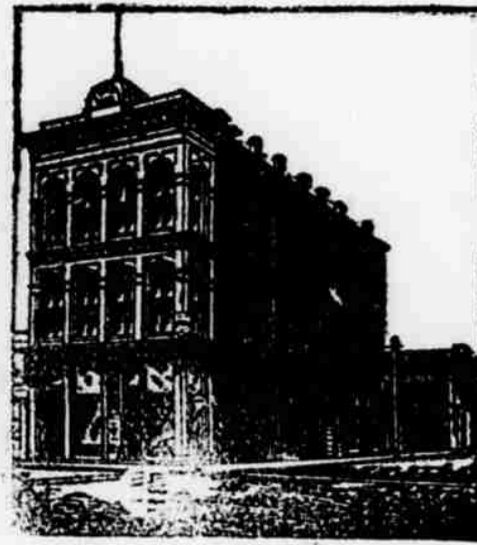

WASHINGTON NEWS ITEMS.

Ex-Secretary Bayard's Approval by M. Page—The Knight Templar Conclave—The Catarrh Cure.

LOSANOS, Oct. 9.—One good result from the visit of Emperor William to England recently. Among the questions he asked in his nervous, active way was one as to the power of illiterate persons in England. An approximate estimate shows an alarming number of illiterate people in the realm. He bluntly expressed his surprise at the existence of such a condition of popular ignorance in a country so wealthy and so high in the scale of civilization. His comments were repeated to the queen, who lost no time in laying the matter before her advisors and requesting them to suggest a remedy. Persistent agitators who have for so many years kept the question of free schools before the public in spite of their discouraging experiences, and feel at last that there is a prospect of seeing their labors crowned with success, but they complain bitterly of the indifference of most of the people of high position and the open hostility of others who do not hesitate to proclaim education the parent of socialism and anarchy, and frankly say that the common people know too much already.

WILL DIE BY ELECTRICITY. The New York Law for Murderers Declared Constitutional.

ALBANY, (N. Y.) Oct. 9.—Judge Day decides that the electrical execution law is constitutional, and remands Kemmler to the custody of the warden of Auburn prison.

The Strike at Berlin.

BERLIN, Oct. 9.—The strike of the dock laborers at Flessburg shows no sign of settlement. Soldiers from the garrison and a number of special forces who were brought from other places are unloading vessels. The emperor today received the members of the North Sea Canal commission at Kiel. He afterwards proceeded to Haltena and made an inspection of the mouth of the canal.

Knights Templar Conclave.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The feature of the second day of the triennial conclave was the exhibition drill. The Templars undressed in the rain, while the chilly winds swept through the numerous stanzas, many of which were handsomely decorated. Ladies were by no means comfortable.

Mexican Amber.

Engineering News.

For the last fifteen or twenty years travelers have occasionally brought specimens of a very remarkable amber from some locality in Southern Mexico. The only information gained concerning it is that it is brought to the coast by natives who say that it occurs in the interior so plentifully that it is used by them for making fires.

The color of this amber is a rich golden yellow, and when viewed in different positions it exhibits a beautiful fluorescence, similar to that of ussini, which it also resembles in color. A recent specimen is even more beautiful than the famous so-called opalescent or green amber found in Catania, Sicily. This material would be extremely valuable for use in the arts. It is believed that an expedition has started for the locality where it is found in the interior.

WASHINGTON GOSSIP.

Ex-Secretary Bayard Soon to be Married—News Notes.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The marriage of Ex-Secretary Bayard to Miss Clymer will take place the 1st of November. The Misses Bayard will come to Washington for the ceremony. During their brief stay in this city they will be the guests of friends, as the furniture of their former home on Highland Terrace was sold at auction previous to their departure for Wilmington in the early summer.

Secretary Windom expects to move into his new home, the handsome stone mansion built by George Lenon on Massachusetts avenue, during the present week. Mrs. Windom's return is looked for during the present month.

Secretary Blaine and family are to remain at the Normandie until the completion of the old Seward house on Lafayette square, which is now receiving the finishing touches at the hands of the decorator. It is hardly possible that Mrs. Blaine will find time in the multiplicity of her official duties to attend to the cares of housekeeping, in which at one time she took such pride and pleasure. When the family of the Secretary of State first lived in Washington many years ago, Mrs. Blaine was noted as one of the best housekeepers and ablest marketers in Congressional circles.

THE ASTORIA & SOUTH COAST. Favorable Reports Read at the Annual Meeting at Astoria.

ASTORIA, Oct. 8.—The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Astoria & South Coast railway was held this afternoon. A very long and favorable report was read from President Reid, setting forth the bright prospects of the road for the future, and detailing progress and probabilities. The report was ordered engrossed as a part of the minutes of the meeting.

Chief Engineer and Superintendent Theisen furnished a report of progress, and the present condition of work; amount expended for the year, \$70,866 04.

Secretary Holden made a financial report. Received during the year from stockholders, \$90,975; from sales of real estate, \$5000; funds in bank at noon to-day, \$25,285 21, which represents the company's net assets, minus about \$5000 warrants drawn for material not yet paid out.

Considerable interest was manifested in the subsequent election of directors, two sets being voted for. It was understood to be a test of strength and views regarding the present management. A compromise was made and the following nine directors were elected: F. J. Taylor, C. W. Fulton, Dr. A. K. Kinn, William Reid, F. W. Conner, C. H. Page, I. W. Case, D. K. Warren and E. P. Thompson.

PATENTS AND PROGRESS.

Marvellous Changes Wrought by Inventors in Half a Century.

inventive age.

One need not be very old to have a distinct recollection of his daily life, its conditions and environments, fifty years ago, when the patent system of the United States was in its early infancy. Then the country was almost entirely agricultural, for our grand career in manufactures and the industrial arts was just beginning. It virtually began with the patent system—the creation of the Patent Office—and it has actually kept pace with the development of that system, so that this magnificent progress stands as the indisputable result of the system. In other words, we owe our splendid achievements in manufactures and the arts to the stimulus that the patent laws have given to invention.

Fifty years ago most of the people of the United States were clothed from the products of the domestic spinning-wheel and hand-loom. The itinerant shoemaker went from house to house, setting up his bench and plying his reaction in the farmer's kitchen. There were no planing-mills, no shops for the manufacture of doors, sashes and blinds. All the work of the builder, including carpenters' and joiners' work, was done by hand. The carpenter, if a good one, got a dollar a day. Coal was consumed by but few families, even in the large cities, and by nobody in the smaller towns. The tailors, like the shoemakers, came to the house and made into clothing the cloth woven by the mother and daughters, with a little help from the fullingmill that was generally near the gristmill of the neighborhood. The railroad and the telegraph had not yet added their powers to the forces of civilization. This year, 1889, is no more like 1839 than the hand-loom is like a cotton factory. "Better fifty years of hope than a cycle of Cathay."

Better one year of the life that's lived under the new conditions than any number of years of the hard existence that was drudged out under the old conditions. It is only the hopelessly pessimistic soul, the constitutionally incurable grumbler, who does not recognize the blessings that have come with the march of invention. For all those, let it be borne in mind, we are indebted to the system that has fostered invention and secured to inventors the right to enjoy the products of their own brains and hands.
