THE LESSON TAUGHT.

It is a commendable habit to calmly and dispassionately view all facts and conditions of questions of importance, before coming to conclusions, and to not allow previous bias or conception to warp judgment in giving decisions.

A conclusive observation of recent elections, coupled with the recollection of two of the last general elections, cannot but give food for reflection to temperance and equal suffrage people. From the start it was an acknowledged fact that if success attended, in a political application of these two subjects, aid must be drawn from adherents of the republican party.

Such results were inevitable. No man was ever won over to give his free adherence to any cause by the doubled up first under his nose and the epithet of knaves lavishly applied. Most men can be led if reasonable and conclusive argument is rightly applied, but no one can be driven by threats and epithets when he knows that he is the stronger of the two.

The facts evolved, if the elections are taken as indications, are that prohibition and equal suffrage have retrograded, and are not as near fulfillment as they were several years ago. But the election, simply indicate a condition attained by the attrition of a political fight, a condition that should never have been invited in either question, and if the leaders are wise will be divorced from all future considerations of the questions.

PRESIDENT HARRISON will soon issue a proclamation, declaring the formal admission of Washington, Montana and the two Dakotas to the Union of states. The legal process of state making has been going on ever since the last congress passed the enabling act. The states all had to make themselves before admittance to the Union. First, the territorial governors called elections to choose delegates to constitutional conventions. All these conventions began their work on the appropriate date of July 4. They were all required to adopt the Federal constitution and to make state constitutions republican in form, without distinction in civil or political rights on account of race or color, securing religious freedom and providing for public schools. Within these limitations each convention has made a constitution to suit itself. The next step was the ratification of these constitutions by the people on October 1. At the same time state officers and representatives in congress were elected. This done, the president has only to proclaim that the law has been obeyed and the four new states became a part and parcel of the Union.

The Christian Advocate says there is but one lunatic asylum in all Egypt. To that is devoted one of the unroofed palaces, which, with its surrounding gardens, is admirably adapted to the purpose. Up to comparatively recent date the Mohammedans did not regard insanity so much as a disease as a proof of divine inspiration. Lunatics were allowed to do almost what they pleased; to

run naked through the streets, to assault persons; and not until their actions became absolutely dangerous to human life were they restrained. This was traced to the early notions of the Christians, who thought all lunatics were either inspired of God or possessed of the devil.

SECRETARY PROCTOR recently suggested to the governor of North Carolina that there was a thought of transferring the Geronimo band of Apaches, from the Florida prison to a reservation in the western part of North Carolina. The governor in his reply denied that this reservation was waste land, declared it would soon be purchased by the state and improved and ended by calling attention to the large area of abandoned land in Vermont, Proctor's own state. He delicately hinted that the nearness of the Green Mountain state to all the centers of philanthropy fitted it peculiarly for the home of the Apache. Considered as a bit of official repartee this letter is about the best that has recently been given to the public.

The San Francisco Examiner thinks that the Atlantic is working over towards the Pacific. Attraction, we suppose. It says that the eastern half of our continent is slowly foundering in the Atlantic is a fact well-known to science. This is a matter that should receive prompt attention. The railroads should look after it themselves, and if they do not the law makers should oblige them to look after it.

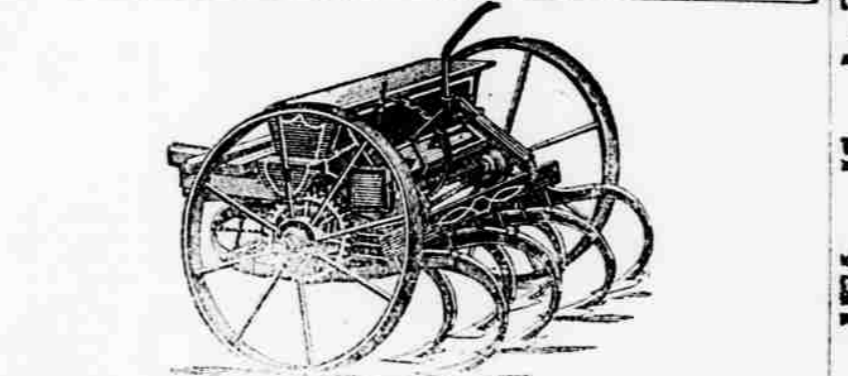
