A NEGRO LYNCHED BY A MOB

Boulanger Threatens to Suddenly Enter
France and Demand a New Trial—
Result of the Election is Hayti.

THE HERALD'S SPECIAL DISPATCHES.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—It is re-
ported that the minister to Hayti,
Fred Douglas, is commissioned by
Blaine to try and convince the
powers in Hayti and San Domingo,
while maintaining their independ-
ence, to put themselves under the
protection of the United States.
Furthermore Minister Palmer is to
see what he can do at Madrid in a
quiet way to secure the severance
of Spain's relations with Cuba.

A NEGRO LYNCHED.

Strung Up Until Nearly Dead and
Then Spritely Away.

COLUMBIA, Tenn., Oct. 17.—A
negro, whose name is unknown,
under arrest for striking another
man, was taken from an officer
yesterday by the man's friends and
strung up, but was cut down be-
fore he was dead and was taken
away. The officers have been
searching for him all night. It is
believed he has been lynched.

ADVICES FROM HAYTI.

Hypolite Elected President of the
Republic—91 Votes Cast.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—The steam-
ship Athos arrived here to-day
from Hayti ports. The Athos,
from Port au Prince, Sept. 21,
brings the intelligence that Hypo-
lite at that time was engaged in
arranging for the presidential elec-
tion. Hypolite expects that he
will be the unanimous choice of
the people. The election takes
place this month.

HYPOLITE ELECTED.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—A cable to
the Maritime Exchange announces
that Hypolite has been unanimously
elected president of Hayti.
Ninety-one votes were cast.

SULLIVAN'S CLERKS.

Some Sensational Developments
Promised at an Early Date.

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Henry S.
Statenberg, Alexander Sullivan's
private secretary, who was arrested
last night, was taken before the
grand jury this morning. When
he came out he was released. In
an interview he said he did not go
before the grand jury willingly,
but declined to state the nature of
the evidence given by him. Fol-
lowing him Henry J. Micallef,
another clerk in Sullivan's office,
was taken before the grand jury.
When he came out he said he had
revealed nothing because he had
nothing to reveal. It is predicted
that there will be sensational de-
velopments before to-morrow
evening.

BOULANGER WILL NOT DOWN

He Proposes to Swoop Down on
France for a New Trial.

PARIS, Oct. 17.—A committee
sent to Boulanger by Naguet
assures the general of the fidelity
of the party to him and his cause
and their confidence in his ultimate
success. It is stated that Boulanger
will go from Jersey to Brussels,
from there to France and then
suddenly enter France and demand
a new trial.

King Mafao's Political Troubles.

BERLIN, Oct. 17.—The North
German Gazette says it is not un-
likely that Germany will refuse to
recognize Mafao as King of Sa-
moa, and that it must be assumed
that other powers, parties to the
American treaty, have similarly
expressed themselves, because at
Berlin all representatives agreed
that Mafao should be king.

East Africa.

ZANZIBAR, Oct. 17.—Thomas
Stevens, the cyclist, who, after
making a tour of the world on his
wheel, was sent to Africa to "dis-
cover Stanley," has returned here
and has failed to find any trace what-
ever of Stanley. His mission is a
complete fiasco.

A man who was employed by the
Church Mission Society, who left the
southern end of Lake Victoria Nyanza
on March 30th, has arrived here, and
is positive that Stanley has not been
anywhere in that quarter. The
church mission believe this man's in-
formation is completely trustworthy.

The impression here is that Stanley
feels that he has done enough for
glory and that this time he proposes
to avail himself of the large boodle of
ivory that exists in Central Africa.
When he does come he will appear
with enough ivory to support
him during the rest of his life.

THRIFTY BEGGARS.

A Thriving Profession Followed by
Many Families.

Beggary throughout the East is a
thriving profession, says a writer in
Good Words. There are guilds of
beggars, besides the numerous com-
munities of dervishes, who are semi-
religious mendicants. Many families
have been beggars for generations,
and are mendicants from choice.
Some of these professional beggars
are actually wealthy. Four and
twenty years ago the writer well re-
members a case. The Chief Beggar
(the title was not conferred in
decision) gave his daughter in mar-
riage to a substantial farmer. The
girl's dowry consisted of two free-
hold houses, the rooms of which were
entirely filled with dry pieces of
bread, and the sale of these begged
crusts subsequently realized a con-
siderable sum, being disposed of as
food for cattle. It must be remem-
bered that in the East there is no
organized charity, and that most Mus-
sulmans are exceedingly charitable,
many giving away a fifth and some
a third of their income. Under such
circumstances it is not to be won-
dered at that the professional beggar
thrives.

OREGON SCHOOL LANDS.

A Decision in Favor of the State
Regarding Indemnity Selections

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Assis-
tant Commissioner Stone to-day
rendered a decision in a case which
involved the question of proof in
the school indemnity selections in
Oregon.

Oregon was granted every six-
teenth and thirty-sixth section of
land for school purposes. The law
also provided that, in case any of
these lands had been entered under
the public land laws prior to the
date of the grant, the state should
be entitled to indemnity therefor
and might make indemnity selec-
tions from any unoccupied public
lands. In pursuance of this
authority the state, it appears,
selected in the aggregate a large
tract of land upon which expired
pre-emption filings were on record.
The question at issue was whether
the burden of the proof of the fact
that the filings had expired rested
with the state or with the parties
who made the filings. The assis-
tant commissioner holds in favor of
the state, and has directed that in
all such cases the pre-emptor shall
be required to appear before the
local land office within twenty days
after receipt of the notice and
show cause why the entry has not
been canceled, thus throwing the
burden of proof upon the entry-
man.

It is said that there are a large
number of cases in the general
land office which will be disposed
of thus.

SOON TO CALL ON BLAINE.

Panucofete Now Ready to Discuss
the Fishery Disputes.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Sir Julian
Panucofete, the British minister, said
this evening that he expected within
two or three weeks to call upon
Secretary Blaine, when he would
broach the Canadian fisheries and
Behring sea seal questions. His pre-
vious visit had been such a trying
one that he had not communicated
with the American state department
with regard to the diplomatic differ-
ences between the two countries, but
he was now prepared to do so.
