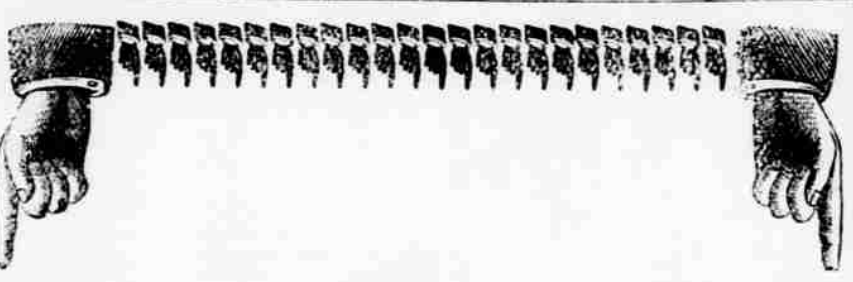

OVER THE WIRES.

The Office of Inspector of Foreign Vessels Abolished.

U. S. FORGERS IN EUROPE. Arrested for Circulating Wholesale Amounts of Counterfeit Money—News East of the Rockies.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.]

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Numerous applications have been made to the secretary of the treasury for the position of inspector of foreign vessels at the different ports in the United States, and upon examination of the subject the secretary has found that the controlling reason in most instances for the anxiety to secure these places is the limited amount of work inspectors have had to perform. Several of these places have for a number of years past been sinecures and not more than a thousand foreign vessels would in a year take advantage of the law permitting their examination by the officers of the United States government. The secretary has, therefore, decided to dispense altogether with the services of the inspectors of foreign vessels at Philadelphia, New Orleans and San Francisco, and to have what slight duties they would be called upon to do performed by local inspectors. The salary of the inspectors who have been dropped is \$2000 per year each.

AMERICANS ARRESTED

For Circulating Counterfeit Money in Russia.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—The Russian police at Odessa late Saturday night arrested two men, said to be Americans, charged with circulating large amounts of new and dangerous forged 25-rouble bills of the bank of Russia. Two packages purporting to be bales of cotton cloth, which arrived from New York last week, were consigned to one of these men and upon examination by the custom officials were found to contain nearly 1,000,000 roubles of these counterfeit bills.

South American Affairs.

GUAYMAS (via Galveston), Oct. 21.—The Elglobo publishes a long editorial in support of the refusal of the Ecuadorian government to accept the proposals of the agent for the European syndicate for an arrangement touching upon the national external and internal debt, also for the construction of a railroad to Guayaquil and the establishment of an official bank. The government rejected all proposals not acknowledging that the agent had sufficient power to act in the name of the foreign bondholders.

The Episcopal Convention.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—In the general convention of the Episcopal church to-day Rev. D. Hancok moved that the order of the day be suspended and the report on the memorial presented by the colored clergy taken up. After some discussion the motion was lost, 100 to 121.

The Contract Awarded.

LIMA (via Galveston), Oct. 21.—The Grace bondholders' contract with all the modifications was finally approved Saturday at a joint session of senators and deputies. Both houses also approved the extensive irrigation scheme for Piura and the water service for Piata.

The Pan-Americans.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—The Pan-Americans this morning inspected the McCormack reaper and stockyards. They then proceeded to Pullman.

Presidential Appointment.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The president has appointed Oscar F. Williams United States consul at Havre, France.

FOR A NATIONAL PARK.

Representative Californians Wish a Partition of the Sierras Set Aside. FRESNO, Oct. 19.—Representative citizens from Kern, Mariposa, Merced, Fresno and Tulare counties met at Hughes hotel this afternoon. Tipton Lindsay was elected chairman, and Hon. E. J. Griffith, of Fresno, secretary, and a committee was appointed to memorialize congress to withdraw all government lands embraced within certain boundaries in the Sierra mountains from sale and create a reservation, or national park.

JUNKETING SENATORS.

The Pacific Railroad Investigating Committee Having a Good Time. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.—Six of the seven United States senators who compose the Pacific railroad's investigating committee, and who arrived here last Thursday, spent to day at Monterey. They are expected to return here to-morrow. Their plan this is to leave soon for Los Angeles and Yuma and carefully look over the road. This will take some time, for they will probably stop a few days in Los Angeles, and also trend from the road in order to see San Diego. It is not improbable, too, they will

stop at Riverside, Colton and San Bernardino. Returning here and possibly stopping for a brief time, they will take the California & Oregon road to Portland. Here they will make another stop, after which they will go to Tacoma, and thence to Spokane Falls on the Northern Pacific. Shortly after they will disband at Denver, each senator pursuing the course he deems best until the assembling of congress early in December. The senators appear to be enjoying their trip in California very much.

AN INFANT TERRIBLE.

Now a Little Miss of Five Years Overwhelmed the Pastor. Harriet Beecher Stowe's son, Rev. Charles B. Stowe of Hartford, Conn., met with an experience the other evening which completely nonplussed him, says the Chicago Herald. One evening quite recently he dined with Mrs. J. W. Boardman, proprietress of the Hotel Woodruff. Visiting Mrs. Boardman is a cute little niece about five years old. She is a regular chatterbox and makes many bright remarks during the day. Fearing lest the child would astonish the preacher by some outlandish saying, her aunt warned her to keep mum during the dinner.

The admonition was listened to with awe, and at the table the little one scarcely dared look at Mr. Stowe, not wishing to commit a supposed sin. While the servant was absent from the room, the little girl noticed that there was no butter on her small pink dish. WASHINGTON NEWS.

Notes and Comments From the National Capital.

PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTMENT

The Movements of the Three American Congress. The Next Census—Political Gossip.

Special Correspondence.]

The President has made the following appointments: A. W. Smythe of Pa. to be superintendent of the U. S. Mint at New Orleans; C. A. Cook of North Carolina to be U. S. Attorney for the Eastern district of that state; S. S. Matthews, of Miss. to be U. S. Marshal for the Southern district of that state; B. W. Walker, of Ala., to be U. S. Marshal for the Southern and Eastern district of that State; E. C. Leech, of the District of Columbia to be District of the Mint; J. W. Blackburn to be associate justice of the Supreme Court of Utah; and a number of postmasters. Secretary Blaine states that the members of the Three America's Congress will be taken on a tour through the South in January. The only reason that they were taken through the other sections first was that there was more to be seen, and it was desired to give them as favorable impression as possible of our manufacturing resources before the work of the Congress was begun.

The October term of the United States Supreme Court was formally opened to-day, though the justices did nothing further than to make the customary call on the President. All the justices were present and considerable surprise was expressed around town that a successor to the late Justice Mathews had not been appointed before this term began. The court has a docket of 1,325 cases and under the most favorable circumstances is not expected to dispose of more than 400 during the present term. It is believed that the appointment to the vacancy would have been made long ago if it had not been for the continued opposition to the appointment of Attorney General Miller. If this opposition was united in favor of any one man Mr. Miller would have no show at all, but divided as it is between five or six, it would not be surprising if he captured the much coveted appointment.

Representative Samuel J. Randall, who has recently been reported as being dangerously ill, has arrived at his Washington residence. His health is not very good, but he is not ill. It is probable that Mr. Carlisle will find him well enough to assume the leadership of the minority in the next House of Representatives.

The Knights Templars had a high old time here last week. They were given the freedom of the city, and they enjoyed it to the fullest extent.

The gun boat "Petrel" has been accepted by the Government and is now at the Norfolk navy yard being fitted out for a cruise.

Secretary Noble has received many communications from labor organizations asking that he have the facts collected for the census next year, showing what percentage of the people occupy their own homes, and what percentage are tenants. Also what percentage among the owners of realty have their property clear of debt. Such a table carefully prepared would certainly be very interesting, and it is hoped that the Secretary can see his way clear to having it prepared.

On Wednesday the International Maritime Conference will meet in this city. The newspapers have not had much to say about this conference, nevertheless it will be one of the most important International meetings ever held. Its principal object is to arrange an International code of navigation signals to be used all over the world. That the universal adoption of such a code would result in a large saving of life cannot for a moment be doubted.

Many of the Knights Templars while here last week engaged quarters for the opening week of the Worlds Exposition in 1892, so confident are they that it will be held in Washington.

Secretary Rusk continues to grow in popularity. He is never too busy to see a caller no matter how humble he may be, and already many people are asking themselves why he would not make a good President. One thing he never forgets is that it is the people, and not the accidental office holders that control the country.
