NOTINGS ABOUT TOWN.

Circuit court convenes next Monday. Choice mixed pickles at F. L. Kenton's. Fresh Eastern white and yellow corn meal at F. L. Kenton's.

The state printer is turning out for general distribution twenty-five thousand copies of the Resources of Oregon. The work contains a new map of Oregon, corrected up to date, which will be an invaluable guide to the home seeker.

During the past ten days real estate transfers reaching over half a million dollars have been recorded in the office of the county recorder of deeds in this city.

Several important cases will come before the grand jury at the term of circuit court next week. Among them is the case of three young men who wrecked the train at the Lebanon junction.

A Kansas paper, the Osborne Journal, gives the following prices on farm products. The quotations are of a late date: Wheat, No. 2 hard, 50 cts; No. 2 soft, 55; No. 3, 50; oats, 12 1/2; butter, 8 to 10; eggs, 15; potatoes, 25.

On the arrival of the overland train last evening a report reached this city that a disastrous train wreck occurred yesterday afternoon on the Oregon Short Line, and that a number of persons were killed, and that physicians and surgeons had been sent for from Portland.

An official of the Southern Pacific Co. requests us to contradict the statement that there was any narrow escape from death among any of the passengers in the Pullman coaches at the recent wreck at Junction.

ON THE OREGON PACIFIC.

Orman & Crook's Plant arrived - The track laid to Breitenbush.

The plant of Messrs. Orman, Crook & Co. arrived yesterday from Portland, or rather the first shipment arrived, consisting of seven carloads, and another shipment will arrive within a few days.

These gentlemen will ship their plant to the front to-day and begin work at once. They purchased a large amount of supplies in this city yesterday which goes to the front with their plant. They will put about 800 men to work at once and will push the work of construction vigorously.

The track is now laid to Breitenbush, which will obviate much of the expensive packing that has heretofore been required of contractors. About six miles of road has been finished at the summit, and next summer will witness its completion through the great wool producing district of Crook county, which will bring all the trade from a large scope of country to Albany.

STATE DISPATCHES.

Obstruction to Salmon Fishing at Yaquina - Newry Notes from Salem.

SALEM, Oct. 21.—Complaints have been made to Governor Penoyer from parties residing at the headwaters of both the Yaquina and Alsea rivers that this season salmon were prevented from ascending said rivers by the building of dams without fishways and by the stretching of nets across the entire rivers.
