A BOMBSHELL.
Over Commercial and Coasting Privileges in Canadian Waters
STANLEY IS MARCHING HOME.

A Young Pedagogue Guilty of Seducing His Pupils—Armed Polanders Surgeon—To the Authorities.

The Herald's Special Despatch.
OTTAWA, (Ont.), Oct. 23.—In response to strongly worded memorials from British Columbia vessel men, the commissioners of customs have ordered that all freight sent from Canadian points through the United States to British Columbia points must be carried from the Pacific port of transshipment to their destination in British vessels, or in vessels of foreign countries who possess coasting privileges to Americans. The vessels have heretofore been honored in breach, and the order is in the shape of a bombshell to British Columbia importers, as it practically gives a monopoly to the Canadian Pacific navigation company.

PERSECUTING CHRISTIANS.
The Heathenish Turks to Be Punished for the Offense.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 23.—A stir in official circles has been caused by the discovery that the Russian officials have been gathering evidence of the persecution of Christians in Armenia by the Turks. The Sultan has given orders looking to the redress of their grievances.

Moussal Bey, governor of Armenia, will be punished.

STILL MARCHING ON.
Stanley and Party Will Reach Uwapua in November.

BERLIN, Oct. 23.—A cable has been received from Captain Wissman, stating that reliable information has been received concerning Emin Pasha, Henry M. Stanley, Signor Cosani and six Englishmen. They are all expected to arrive at Uwapua the latter part of November.

DESERVES TO BE LYNCHED.
A Young School Teacher Who Seduced Several Pupils.

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—The residents of the Alberts settlement, in Hastings county, have been thrown into wild excitement over the discovery that for upwards of a year John T. Blondin, 22 years old, who has been teaching one of the schools, has reduced a number of his pupils.

THE EPISCOPAL CONVENTION.
The Colored Question Still Under Discussion by the Committee.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—At the session of the Episcopal convention in the house of deputies today the colored question was reopened by the committee on conference appointed by the house of bishops, who recommended the deputies to accede to the desires of the upper house and pass resolutions defining the attitude of the Episcopal church towards the negro race. The deputies declined to reconsider the action.

THE PAN-AMERICANS.
They Are Wined and Dined on Milwaukee Beer.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 23.—The Pan-Americans left Chicago this morning. On their arrival here they were taken in carriages and shown the business and residence section of the city. The party was in charge of Captain Burke, U. S. A., temporarily, in the absence of W. E. Curtice, representative of the state department, who is ill in Chicago.

ARMED POLANDERS.
The Trouble at Wilkesbarre Is Not Yet Over.

WILKESBARRE, (Pa.), Oct. 23.—The armed Polanders who have been holding possession of the Polish priest's house at Plymouth, surrendered to the authorities this morning. Father Busbo, the new priest, then took possession of the house. The Polanders are still very bitter and say they will prevent the priest from saying mass Sunday.

Died from his Injuries.
LOUISVILLE, (Ky.), Oct. 23.—Van Dyke Heiser, 18 years of age, who was injured in the wreck at Norton station on the Louisville & Nashville railroad yesterday morning, died this afternoon. He met his death through bravely stopping to assist a woman. About twenty more were injured.

Amusing Incidents Which Are Not on the Programmes.

Incidents that are out of the stage order of things are very amusing to theatre audiences, and especially to the gallery boys, who are more highly entertained by them than by the play. In a recent performance of "Faust" the tender in the garden scene brushed against a large palm, which was not properly balanced in the pot. He set it up several times, growing more and more agitated, to the inclination of the plant to lie down was so strong that finally, in desperation, he took it by the trunk and pitched pot and all at the stage manager, who was standing in the wings.

"During the last performance of 'Cass' the dead Roman turned tears of sorrow to tears of laughter by prising his head from the collar-pillow before the curtain shut off the scene. Assemblages of 'supers' rearing from the stage occasionally cause mirth by stumbling backward over some piece of stage machinery, and the scrobbled perambulation across the stage is an uncommonly interesting occurrence. A door leading into the stage, and swinging both ways, the other evening revealed the stage manager in his shirt sleeves, standing behind it, and the audience laughed; but the greatest accident that has befallen a player for a long while was that which interrupted the performance of 'Partners' at one of the theatres in this city this season.

Mr. Salvini, as Bergfeldt, overwhelmed with possibilities of business ruin and domestic dishonor, raises himself to his full height in the strained attitude of desperate grief, and, with an exclamation, sits down suddenly on a patent revolving chair, buries his head in his hands and shakes his body with emotion. Just as he dropped his 200 pounds into a state of quivering emotion the chair broke. The actor quickly mastered the situation, caught himself from falling, flung the chair away, drew up another heavy leather chair, and went on as though nothing had happened.

INDIAN RELICS.
A Great Demand in Chicago for Indian Scalps.

A Monroe street hair dealer: "If you know where I can get any Indian scalp I shall be obliged to you for that information. Indian scalps, like buffalo heads, are becoming mighty scarce. You never can account for people's tastes. Now, about the last thing in the world that some want is an Indian scalp, and yet there are people who want just that sort of a curiosity. I had an Indian belt not long ago which had nine scalps hung to it, and I sold it to a man on the North Side for \$35. I have a bunch of hair here—it isn't a scalp, as there is no skin attached to it, just a handful, as it were. It is worth \$5. Indians are not scalping as much as they used to, and that is why scalps are high. In fact, everything which Indians used to make are becoming scarcer and more valuable.

"Take the common Indian basket that used to sell for \$3 a dozen, now you can't get one for that money. There are two reasons for this. One is that travelers buy them first hands as curiosities and pay the Indians just what they ask. Another reason is that since the Government has got to taking such interest in Indians, taking care of them, the Indians are lazier than ever, and make less than formerly."
