FACTS ABOUT CIGARETTES.

The new law in Oregon prohibiting
the sale of cigarettes and
tobacco to minors is not as rigidly
enforced as it should be. The consumption
of cigarettes in the
United States is absolutely alarming.
During the last year the
collections of internal revenue from
cigarettes alone amounted to considerably
over a million dollars. The increase of the consumption
of these deadly small articles since
the year before is sufficiently startling.
The added revenue from them for the
year ending June 30, 1889, was \$144,467.63.

Let us look now at the number
of cigarettes this increase implies.
During last year the boys, young
men and a few women and old
men consumed 2,151,515,260
of these little paper rolls. As far as
that is concerned, there are boys
not yet grown who sometimes
smoke as many as sixty cigarettes
in a day. The plain fact is that
while the population of the country
increased perhaps a million and a
half last year, the consumption of
cigarettes increased nearly 300,000,000.
It is shown by the internal
revenue report.

New as to the effects of constant
cigarette smoking. First, as is
sufficiently established, it creates
a thirst for what has been called
"the indiscriminate and useless
consumption of liquors." Next, all
cigarettes contain, according to
Professor Ladin, five distinct and
separate poisons. Three of these
poisons are oils, one in the paper
wrapper, another in the nicotine of
the tobacco itself, and a third in
the flavoring material. The other
poisons are saltpeter and opium.

The cigarette smoker draws the
smoke into his lungs and puffs it
out again through his nostrils. If
he were to blow it through a white
handkerchief before inhaling it it
would stain the handkerchief
brown. This brown stain is left
continually upon his own throat
and lungs, and it is a poison, or
rather the essence of all the five
mixed. In time it stains his complexion,
too.

The cigar is not so bad as the
cigarette, because it contains only
one poison, nicotine. The reason,
however, that the cigarette obtains
so fatal a hold upon boys and young
men is an account of the opium in
it. This must have its effect on
the brain and nerves. The little
burning taper seems to the boy to
soothe and quiet him, while it is
destroying the very fountains of
his life. A youth who has become
a confirmed cigarette smoker in
time exhibits the appearance and
actions of an opium eater. Insanity
and death follow sometimes.

It is rumored that Lord Stanley,
who has been visiting the Pacific
coast, will soon return to his home
in Canada, and in connection with
this rumor the statement is made
that the British government has
instructed Sir Julian Pauncefote,
its Ambassador at Washington, to
negotiate for the settlement of the
Behring sea difficulties and the
Atlantic fishery question. The
Behring sea matter, it is believed
will be settled upon the basis originally
proposed, viz., the appointment
of a commission representing
Japan, Russia, England, Canada
and the United States.

GENERAL MANAGER TOWNE of the
Southern Pacific railroad on being
interviewed the other day relative
to the need of another passenger
train between Portland and San
Francisco, said that "the company
would not put on another through
train until they could fill the one
now running." This is to the people
along the road who frequently have
to stand up in a train of 11 or 15
passenger coaches for 10 miles at

a stretch when traveling would
seem to be intended as a grim sort
of a joke.

ABOUT SILVER.

President Knox of the National
Bank of the Republic of New York
says that "the silver dollar is the
poor man's dollar, and the poorest
money, and if it is worth only 70
cents the poor are made to suffer."
But there's the rub, Mr. Knox. If
it were made worth only 70 cents
the poor man might suffer, but as
it happens to be worth a gold
dollar in this country the silver
dollar is necessarily as good as the
gold dollar. Mr. Knox evidently
regards the legal tender greenback
with approbation, but no one has
heard him urge that a paper dollar
should have a dollar's worth of
paper in it. It is about as sensible,
though, to insist that the legal
tender paper dollar should be a
bale of paper worth a dollar in gold
as to demand that the silver dollar
should contain as much silver bullion
as a gold dollar will buy.

The fact of the business is that
under the present condition of the
money system of the country a
silver dollar, a dollar greenback or
a dollar in gold will each buy just
a dollar's worth of sugar or coffee,
and excessive tinkering in this
direction by the opponents of silver
is not wanted.

some fatality about these matters,
so fast does one bad casualty follow
upon another's heels. In most
cases the general public never get
the facts about the causes of the
accidents, because all the officials
involved are afraid to tell them.

distilleries which are his private
property.
