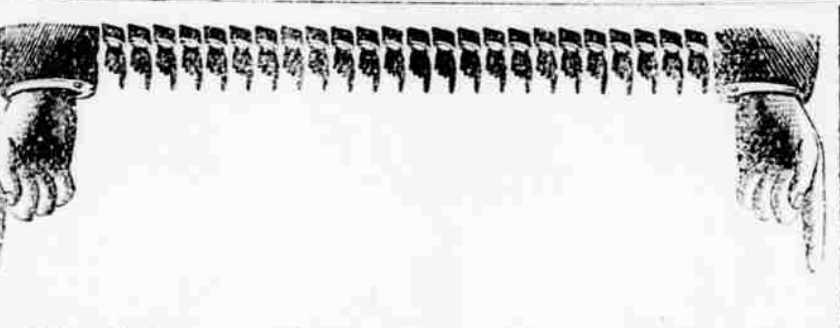

### OVER THE WIRES.

The Daughter of C. P. Huntington Marries Prince Hatzfeldt.  
 A SCHOONER DRIVEN ASHORE.  
 Only One of the Crew Survives—A Light-house Wrecked by an Earthquake—Several People Killed.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.  
 LONDON, Oct. 28.—The marriage of Prince Hatzfeldt to a daughter of Collis P. Huntington took place today in the Catholic oratory at Brompton. The ceremony was performed by Bishop Emmons. The wedding was private, only the relatives and a few friends of the bride and groom being present. The wedding breakfast was served at the German embassy, after which they started for Italy.

**SCHOONER WRECKED.**  
 Only One Survivor Left of the Entire Crew.  
 NORFOLK, (Va.) Oct. 28.—Last Wednesday night a schooner went ashore where the false cape breakers are so bad, and rescue was impossible until this morning, when a picked life saving crew rescued R. I. Grant, the only survivor of a crew of five. The others had succumbed to exhaustion and exposure.

**A LIGHTHOUSE WRECKED.**  
 An Earthquake Causes Much Damage and Loss of Life.  
 LONDON, Oct. 28.—Milvyns lighthouse was wrecked by an earthquake yesterday. Considerable damage was done in Constantino. The shock in Sicily caused serious damage and some loss of life at Gallipoli.

**The Cronin Trial.**  
 CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—At the opening of the Cronin trial this morning Napier Moreland, employed in Dinan's livery stable, testified to the facts of the hiring of the white horse testified to by Dinan Saturday. He said when the horse came back at 7:30 he was puffing and gave evidence of having been hard driven. The buggy was covered with sand and mud.

**Chinese Affairs.**  
 LONDON, Oct. 28.—The Standard's Shanghai special says that Li Hung Chang is actively working to secure the ratification of the Che Fook telegraph convention. The American minister earnestly protests against the convention, and it is hoped he will defeat the proposal.

**Rain has destroyed rice and cotton crops in Yangtze Kiang valley.**  
 Why Blaine Declined.  
 NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—The World's Florence, Italy, correspondent gives the statement by a physician who attended Mr. Blaine in 1888 to the effect that he was partly paralyzed and was suffering with paralysis and melancholia, and for this reason he wrote the letter declining to be a candidate for the presidency.

**The New Cruiser.**  
 BALTIMORE, Oct. 28.—M. P. Walsber, president of the Columbian Iron Works, the lowest bidder for two of the new cruisers, says Secretary Tracy assured him that his company would receive the contract for both the vessels, and told him to return home and prepare for work.

**Status of General Lee.**  
 LONDON, Oct. 28.—Lord Wolsey has accepted an invitation to be present at the unveiling of the statue of General Lee at Richmond.

**AN ASPIRING WOMAN.**  
 Mrs. Emma Beekwith Will Run for Mayor of Brooklyn.  
 NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—The latest for mayor of Brooklyn is Mrs. Emma Beekwith, a prominent church and society worker, who has declared her intentions of running on an independent ticket. When asked what she proposed to do, she replied: "If I am elected mayor of Brooklyn, I will see that there is women on the school board, in every police court, police station and prison in the city. I will have women on the board of health and on the board of public works."  
 "Don't you think there are women in this city who would sweep our streets quicker and cleaner than men who are now employed and who pretend to do that work?"  
 "I could rally a staff of five hundred in fifteen minutes. They would be glad to get a job and they'd be worthy of their hire too."

**Twelve Hundred Millions.**  
 The Estimated Population of the Entire World.  
 There are statisticians in several countries, the best known of whom is the learned German, Herr Schem, who endeavors to present from time to time statistics of the population of the entire world. Inasmuch as many populous countries have no census and often nothing like a census these world statisticians can only put together, as to these countries, the best attainable guesses.  
 Nevertheless, they probably make a tolerably near estimate of the population of the entire world, which they put at twelve hundred million. The

### WASHINGTON NEWS.

Great Satisfaction Over the New Pension Commissioner.  
 A MEXICAN SILVER-LEAD.

New Army Regulations—Wanamaker and the Virginians—The World's Exposition and Washington.  
 Special Correspondence.  
 General Green B. Raum, the newly appointed Commissioner of Pensions, is in charge of the Pension office today. Gen. Raum is a man of national reputation; he served one term in the House of Representatives from the Thirteenth Illinois District, but his greatest reputation was gained as Commissioner of Internal Revenue, a position he ably filled from 1867 to 1883. His acceptance of the office is a great surprise here, as it is well known that he gave up a law practice worth more than double the salary of the office. It is generally believed among republicans that he accepted the office to relieve the President from a very embarrassing position.  
 Gen. Raum has a splendid war record, and is an enthusiastic working member of the G. A. R. His appointment has, I honestly believe, given more real and general satisfaction here than any one made by the President. The following may be taken as specimens of the way it is received by prominent republicans: Senator Mitchell—A good appointment, I should say so. Like it? Why I am delighted. Senator Manderson—An excellent appointment. It is a happy solution of all our woes. Gen. Raum is a good lawyer, a good soldier and a good citizen. Representative Bayne—There could have been no better solution of the question. Gen. Raum is a man of great executive ability. His judgment is sound, and having confidence in it, he is never afraid to do what is right. Representative Anderson (of Kansas)—Gen. Raum was a gallant soldier. There is no doubt of where his sympathies lie. At the same time he is a man of good judgment and of long experience in a department of the Government where he was trained in the execution of the law. Ex-Commissioner Tanner—I think it is a splendid appointment. Representative Burrows—It is capital! capital. It could not have been better. Ex-Representative Goff—It is a superb appointment. Ex-Senator Bruce—An excellent appointment. The local G. A. R. men are tickled almost to death over the appointment. Gen. Raum was not a applicant for the position. His name was presented to the President by Secretary Rusk and Senator Mitchell, at different times, and unknown to each other.  
 Secretary Windom has settled the dispute over the admission of silver-lead ores from Mexico by deciding to stand by ex-Secretary Sherman's classification, which admits them free.  
 The Secretary of War has adopted several amendments to army regulations, with a view to getting a better class of men to enlist, and stopping the present high ratio of desertions from the army.  
 Postmaster General Wanamaker incurred the ill-will of some Virginian republicans. This is how: In 1886 a colored laborer from Virginia named Hunter was removed and his place given to a white democrat from the same state named Wrenon. Some Virginian republicans called on Mr. Wanamaker to urge that Hunter be put back into his old place, and were thunderstruck when the Postmaster General replied as follows: "I appreciate the interest shown in behalf of Mr. Hunter, and I regret that I have not the time to go over the case with you. But so far as Mr. Hunter's republicanism is concerned, that alone shall not weigh in his favor, nor shall the democracy of Mr. Wrenon operate against him." "But," remarked one of the delegation, "Wrenon's politics got him in." "I know," replied Mr. Wanamaker. "They (the democrats) would turn us out, but I shall not pursue that course." "Nice sort of a republican Wanamaker is," said one of the Virginians as they came out.  
 Senator Quay has leased Senator Sawyer's house, and the family are now here for the season.  
 Republicans are enjoying the Hill-Cleveland feud which has broken out again with great bitterness. It's a great waste of time as it is about as likely that either of them will be King of England as President of this country.  
 Thirty States will be represented at the meeting here this week of the national board of promotion of the World's Exposition of 1892. This shows the percentage in favor of Washington as the place for holding the Exposition.  
 Senator Dolph thinks the adoption of a comprehensive system of Coast defense one of the most important and necessary matters for the next Congress to look after.
