The New States Awaiting the President's Proclamation.

CATTLE STARVING TO DEATH.

Will the Apache Indians Be Removed to North Carolina?—Five Notorious Murderers to Be Hanged.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Dispatches from prominent citizens of Olympia and other cities of the new state of Washington are being received here daily, asking when President Harrison intends to issue his proclamation admitting the four new states.

GERONIMO'S BAND.

Will the Apaches Be Removed to North Carolina?

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—It will be remembered that some time ago the secretary of war proposed to transfer Geronimo and his band of Apache Indians, now in confinement at one of the Southern military posts, to a reservation in North Carolina, whereupon Gov. Fowler of that state wrote a very sarcastic letter to Secretary Proctor, in effect discouraging the proposed transfer.

GUILTY OF MURDER.

Five Notorious Kentucky Men to Be Hanged.

KNOXVILLE, (Tenn.), Oct. 29.—The state supreme court has affirmed the verdict of the lower court in finding John Anderson, John Barnard, H. Barnard, Elisha Barnard and Clinton Barnard guilty of the murder of Henry Sutton last January. They will be hanged on December 25th.

SLAPPED A CONGRESSMAN.

A Row Over the Visit of the Pan-Americans.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 28.—Mayor Davenport this afternoon slapped Congressman Tarsney in the face, and narrowly escaped being shot. It was all on account of the entertainment of the All-American tourists.

KILLED HIS BROTHER.

A Tragedy Results From a "White Cap" Outrage.

NORTHVILLE, N. Y., Oct. 28.—A tragedy occurred near here late Saturday night. Oscar Barclay made himself notorious by visits to two women at the house of Samuel Covington. Barclay's father, two brothers and a dozen neighbors, disguised as "White Caps" went to Covington's house, took Covington out, tied and

feathered and rode him on a rail, going back for young Barclay, he met them at the head of the stairs with a gun. As the party came on he fired, killed his youngest brother, Fred. Barclay made no effort to escape, and was arrested yesterday afternoon. Four of the "White Caps" are under arrest.

COAST DEFENSES.

General Miles Makes Some Recommendations on the Subject.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 28.—A large part of Gen. Miles's forthcoming report on the division of the Pacific will be devoted to the subject of coast defenses. The needs of this coast will be concisely stated, and a number of recommendations made. The general estimates that \$100,000,000 would put the coast in a fairly defensible condition. Of this sum \$25,000,000 would be required on the Pacific coast.

THE DAKOTA SUFFERERS.

An Appeal Made to Secretary Proctor for Relief.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Representative Hansbrough, North Dakota's new congressman, called upon Secretary Proctor to-day in the interest of the residents of Ramsey county in that state. Crops have been had for the past two years and they are in a destitute condition, as winter is approaching and they are not able to purchase fuel.

Starving Cattle.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 29.—A special from Wichita, Kas., says: S. M. Ferenon arrived here to-day from Beaver City, No Man's Land. He reports a bad state of affairs in the neutral strip. Trouble has been brewing between the settlers and the Scotch cattle syndicate. Last week the settlers set fire to the syndicate range, which destroyed every vestige of food for the cattle. Ferenon says the cattle have already begun to die of starvation, and he anticipates an enormous loss.

WEALTH OF THE U. S.

Men Who Own Twenty Million and Over.

SOME INTERESTING FIGURES.

Who Own the United States?—The Wealth of the Coast of Europe and America.

In spite of rapid increase in the number of millionaires in the United States in recent years, the popular notion is that wealth is yet very much more evenly distributed in this country than in England. Mr. Thos G. Shearman, the well-known New York statistician, has been engaged for some time in collecting facts to show as precisely as possible the proportion of the wealth of the country held by a few rich men and families; and he finds a greater concentration of wealth here than in any other country. The results of his investigation will appear in The Forum for November, from advance sheets of which the following enumeration of owners of more than \$20,000,000 each: \$150,000,000: J. J. These 70 names represent an aggregate wealth of \$2,700,000,000, an average of more than \$37,500,000 each. Although the average annual income in making this estimate, did not look for less than twenty millionaires, he discovered incidentally fifty others worth more than \$10,000,000 each; and he says that a list of ten persons can be made whose wealth averages \$100,000,000 each, and another list of one hundred persons whose wealth averages \$25,000,000. No such lists can be made up in any other country. "The richest dukedom of England," he says, "fall below the average wealth of a dozen American citizens; while the greatest bankers, merchants, and railway magnates of England cannot compare in wealth with many Americans."

The average annual income of the richest hundred Englishmen is about \$450,000, but the average annual income of the richest hundred Americans cannot be less than \$1,200,000, and probably exceeds \$1,500,000. The richest of the Rothschilds, and the world-renowned banker, Baron Overstone, each left about \$17,000,000. Earl Dudley, the owner of the richest iron mines, left \$20,000,000. The Duke of Buccleuch (and the Duke of Buccleuch carried half of Scotland in his pocket) left about \$30,000,000. The Marquis of Bute was worth, in 1872, about \$28,000,000 in land; and he may now be worth \$40,000,000 in all. The Duke of Norfolk may be worth \$40,000,000, and the Duke of Westminster perhaps \$50,000,000.

Mr. Shearman's conclusions are that 25,000 persons own one-half the wealth of the United States; and that the whole wealth of the country is practically owned by 250,000 persons, or one sixtieth of adult male population; and he predicts, from the rapid recent concentration of wealth, that under present conditions 50,000 persons will practically own all the wealth of the country in thirty years—or less than one in 500 of the adult male population.
