THE OREGON PACIFIC. The Union Pacific and Chicago & Northwestern Deal and the Oregon Pacific.

The people of Malheur county and the citizens of Vale, its principal town are enthusiastic over the Union Pacific and Chicago & Northwestern deal. In announcing the new alliance, the New Atlas says: "It means suspension of further Northwestern extension in Wyoming and consequent abandonment of the famous connection 'at Boise City' with the Oregon Pacific. It is the latter fact that interests all of us. The Oregon Pacific, no longer to connect with the Northwestern direct, will never cross the Snake; it will strike the Union Pacific between the bridges, presumably and without a doubt at Ontario. The Sand Hollow survey must therefore be abandoned in favor of the survey through Vale. The road land people must have had this in view when they withdrew from the market all their lands around Vale 'until the railroad location is made,' they said. They have recently refused big money for ground around here. All this is good news to those who have waited, hoped and prayed for it. It assures Vale of the permanency of the county seat and it assures Ontario a bright commercial future."

The above from the Malheur people is simply speculation based on erroneous grounds. The H. A. is in possession of information from a highly reliable source that this deal will not prevent the Oregon Pacific road from making its eastern connection. The Oregon Pacific company has now among its stockholders and directors some of the wealthy financiers of New York City, and they are pushing the road eastward with more vigor than ever. The Chicago & Northwestern may not build their road west to Boise City to meet the Oregon Pacific, but is learned from a high official source that the latter road will be aided in its eastward extension, instead of being delayed, by the new deal, as many have supposed.

The Senatorial Committee.

The senatorial committee on Pacific railroads which left Sacramento Tuesday morning en route to Portland, reached this city at 11 o'clock yesterday. They travel by special train and are making their way leisurely along, stopping here and there to take in the sights. The party is accompanied by A. N. Towne, Creed Haymond and Senator Stanford. This is the committee of the United States senate on subsidized railroads, and is composed of seven members. The work of the committee is to inquire into the extent of the business of the Central and Union Pacific railroads, to learn to what extent they are dependent upon their branch lines and to formulate a plan for wiping out the indebtedness of the roads to the government.

The Train Wreckers.

Referring to the trial of the three train wreckers in this city, the Salem Statesman says: "The three scoundrels who displaced the switch near Albany, resulting in the train wreck and death of Engineer Jack Miller and Fireman Quint Guthrie, have been indicted by the Linn county grand jury for murder in the second degree. The prosecution should be vigorous and justice swift in this case. An exemplar should be made of the scamps to serve as a warning to such fellows who have no regard for property or human life."

The State Tax Levy.

From assessment rolls already received by the secretary of state, judging by the rate of increase over last year, indicate that the total taxable valuation of property for the state will be over \$100,000,000, compared with \$85,000,000 last year. Washington shows a valuation of \$125,000,000, and is inclined to look down upon Oregon. The last named state has the valuation on but by her assessment system the figures do not show it. The tax levy, it is estimated, will be less than six mills this year.—Salem Statesman.

OREGON'S NEXT WEST POINT CADET. Congressman Hermann Appoints a Board to Examine Applicants for the Position.

Congressman Hermann has appointed Professor I. W. Pratt, Gen. William Kaps and Dr. R. Gilson, of Portland, as a board for the competitive examination of applicants for the appointment as cadet to the United States military academy at West Point. The board will meet at the Park street school building at 9 o'clock A. M. of November next, at which time and place the examination of applicants will be held. Congressman Hermann suggests that applicants appear at the office of Dr. R. Gilson on the Friday previous at 3 o'clock P. M. to obtain the physician's opinion as to their physical requirements and qualifications. The body must be sound, feeble constitution, symptoms of scrofula, chronic catarrhs, deafness, impaired vision, deafness, loss of several teeth, or general unsound teeth, impediment of speech, any indication of a liability to pulmonary disease, will either of them disqualify the applicant. The candidate must be between 17 and 22 years of age, unmarried, not under five feet in height, must be a resident of the state and must be well versed in reading, in writing, including orthography, and in arithmetic, and must have a knowledge of the elements of English grammar and descriptive geography, and of the history of the United States. No superficial knowledge in these will pass him through. He is expected to be thorough. No friendly aid can avail the candidate if he is found deficient in these; and any young man in Oregon can apply for the position. The applicant certified by the board to Mr. Hermann will be recommended by him to the secretary of war for appointment. He will then be required to report at West Point not later than June 14 next, where he must submit himself for the entering examination, and in case of a failure of the nominee to pass this ordeal, Mr. Hermann has requested the board at Portland to certify to him a qualified second candidate as alternate, who must be willing to report at West Point and be examined at the same time as the regular nominee.

The Oregon cadet to graduate in June, 1890, is Milton F. Davis, of McCoy, who now stands high in his class and is reported to be one of the brightest young men of the academy. Mr. Hermann selected this young man from Polk county four years ago. He was a poor boy, the son of a widowed woman. His father had been a Union soldier, was terribly wounded in battle, and died, leaving this boy to support his mother. This, with her efforts, he did by working out on the neighbors' farms in summer and fall, and then attending school in the winter months. In this toilsome way the little fellow finally succeeded in reaching the junior course in the State university at Eugene City, when he was selected for West Point, and he has so far passed all the rigid examinations of the military academy, there, and next June will graduate with high honors and take his place as an officer in the United States army, a credit to the state of Oregon, and a pride and joy to the devoted widowed mother, to whom he has been an affectionate and dutiful son.

Married.

At the residence of the bride's parents near this city on Wednesday Mr. Horace Powell and Miss Kate Price were united in marriage. Rev. E. N. Condit officiating. The groom is well and favorably known in Albany and vicinity, being one of Linn county's enterprising young men, and the bride is an accomplished young lady, having recently been engaged as a teacher in the Albany public schools. The happy couple were the recipients of hearty congratulations from their many friends.

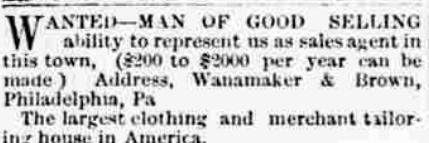
