The Bloody Revolution in Guatemala at an End.

TAKEN PRISONERS AND SHOT.  
A Once Wealthy Mexican Dies in Poverty.—The Pan-American Tendered a Reception at La Oroya.

The Herald's Special Despatch from City of Mexico (via Galveston), Nov. 1.—Another telegram from Guatemala states that the revolution has ended. The government has triumphed and many revolutionists have been taken prisoners and shot. Cervantes advises the government that the difficulty with the Yucui Indians will probably be settled peaceably.

AN INTERESTING CAREER.  
An Aged and Once Wealthy Mexican Dies in Poverty.

SANTA ROSA, Nov. 1.—Julio Corrallo, a Mexican, and the founder of Santa Rosa, died of asthma in this city Wednesday afternoon, aged 63 years. Deceased was a cousin of General Vallejo, and at one time owned nearly all the land in Sonoma county. He gambled and gave away nearly all his possessions, and during the last five years of his life has been in almost destitute circumstances. He presented years ago to the county a number of lots in this city, and on one the present court house stands and now of great value. He has been kept from actual want by the county supervisors who have paid him a salary as janitor of the court house, although he has been able to perform but little work. He was a Mason, Odd Fellow, Mexican war veteran and a member of the Native Sons of the Golden West.

The Times Suit.  
LONDON, Nov. 1.—Sir Henry James continued to speak for the Times to-day. He endeavored to show that Davitt associated in America and elsewhere with persons engaged in treasonable acts, and in seeking to separate Ireland from Great Britain. He charged the leader of the nationalists with trying to keep affairs in Ireland in an unsettled condition.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 1.—The Pan-Americans arrived this morning. After breakfast the party was taken by train to the works of the large milling, machinery companies.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 1.—The brig Alice and Romania, with the Navassa rioters on board, arrived here this morning.

### INDIANS STARVING.

A Sorry Condition of Things on the Wind River Reservation.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 31.—Two thousand Indians, occupying the Wind River reservation just south of the Yellowstone National park, in this territory, are actually in want, and many will die of starvation before spring. Their beef ration is but three-fourths of a pound per capita, as against a pound and a half issued to each Sioux. Then these Indians receive their meat on hoof in the fall, subject to shrinkage, which is often fifty per cent. And, again, trices on this reserve one year ago agreed to waive coffee and sugar rations if the issue of beef and flour was increased, but only one portion of the deal was consummated was the withdrawal of coffee and sugar. Their allotment of flour is insufficient, and contractors invariably delay to deliver. At Wind River agency are remnants of two great Indian tribes, Shoshones and Arapahoes. They have agriculture, implements and horses, and many would farm but they cannot run irrigating ditches, and have no money to buy seeds. This year a number cultivated small tracts, but defective ditches and early frosts caused the loss of their little crops. Even now the Indians are reduced to desperate straits. Game has left the country, and they eat diseased carcasses of domestic animals. But for Chief Washake of the Shoshones; raids upon ranges of cattle would be frequent. Governor Warren verified these facts by a visit to the agency, and will place them before the interior department in a supplemental report.

ELOPERS MARRIED AT SEA.  
A Bridal Trip Begun Silently at Four O'Clock in the Morning.

A San Diego, Cal., dispatch says the oft-told tale of the stern parent and two young and romantic lovers accounts for the fact that John Minton and Iva Davis were compelled to charter a yacht and sail out on the high seas yesterday to get married. Miss Davis is only a little over 17 years old, and her father wanted her to marry a much older man and one she did not care for.

Minton and the girl have been engaged for some time, and in spite of the vigilance of Mr. Davis the young man managed to smuggle the girl away from her home at Old Town yesterday morning at 4 o'clock. The yacht Sappho was engaged. It was several hours before a minister could be found who would consent to tie the knot, but eventually a small boat put out to the vessel with a clergyman and the voyage began.

The Sappho is a tiny craft, and the whole party was deathly seasick, but they managed to have the knot tied between the swells, and the newly married couple reached the shore late in the afternoon and took the first motor to sue for parental forgiveness.

A BOOMERANG.  
British Columbia Hurt by an Order Issued From Ottawa.

From Victoria B. C., comes the report that the Board of Trade held a meeting on Wednesday to consider the recent order from Ottawa in regard to American steamers coasting in British Columbia waters. It was resolved that a telegram be sent to Ottawa, asking that the order be modified at once, so as not to interfere with American steamers now plying regularly between British Columbia and United States ports. As at present worded, this order would prevent the handling of Canadian bonded freight sent over American lines by regular steamers of the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company plying to Victoria, and would also put an end to the business now rapidly increasing between that city and Portland by the steamers Michigan and Idaho. It is expected that the regulation will be modified without delay so as to permit American steamers now running regularly to provincial ports to enjoy the same privileges as heretofore.

### BEN HARRISON BABIES.

The President's Collection of Photographs of His Namesakes.

Washington Letter.  
The country has been informed how loud President Harrison is of children—especially of babies. His reputation in this respect has resulted in his having a rare collection of photographs of babies. Nearly every day's mail brings the White House a number of letters enclosing photographs of infants. They represent babies in variety enough for a modern baby show. The photos are all of boy babies, and the letters announce that their names are Benjamin Harrison Smith, James or Robinson, etc., etc. Sometimes there are a pair of twins. Then the name is either duplicated between them or one is named after the President, and the other after the Vice-President. The other day I picked up a bundle of these photos of the nuzzle in the White House and counted them. They were just a few that had been snapped together with a rubber band. They were twenty-three of them and two pairs of twins. None in this collection was colored, but I believe several little charcoal sketches from nature have been received. Of the photos I have seen it must be said, at the risk of offending a large community of mothers, that but few are in any way remarkable for good looks, though in more than one case the mothers have fancied their little ones resembled Baby McKee. They are represented in a variety of attitudes, and in various stages of nakedness. They vary in apparent age from a few months to but a few days. Sometimes the infant's photograph is accompanied by that of the mother, or of both father and mother. One infant is chewing the end of an American flag. Another is dressed in a Continental uniform, though he has to be held in an upright position to show it. Another has not anything on worth mentioning, and is making a critical examination of the soles of both his feet at the same time—a thing he accomplishes by bowing the legs on and turning the feet inward. There is nothing especially fancy about any of them. They are a matter-of-fact lot of youngsters, who appear to be entirely irresponsible for either their existence or the ambitious journey of their photographs to the White House. The fact of those that are seen by the public being so truly explained by the statement that the President has saved out some of the best-looking ones to keep. The others are lying around, so that you are liable to find a bundle of them in almost any room in the house. The mothers who name their youngsters after the President and send him their pictures probably expect some recognition, but the most they get is a card with an engraving of the White House and the President's autograph.

CARRIES HIM OFF.  
Cruel Hearted Commissioners Seek To Part Them.

A Chronicle special from New York says that cases of a Romeo stealing away his Juliet from the paternal domicile frequently occur, but cases where the Juliet does the stealing are scarce. Such a one came to light yesterday in Castle Garden. Mary Casey, a comely Irish lass, and John Dolan, arrived in port on the Cunard steamer Servia. John is a light-hearted, rosy-checked boy, 19 years of age. He came from Kilkenny, Ireland, where his father keeps a general store.

Miss Mary, who is dark-eyed and cherry-cheeked, confessed to 21 years and exhibited \$277 cash. She said it was part of a legacy of \$317 left her by her grandfather, who died three years ago. She is a graduate of Baggot College, Dublin, and since her grandfather's death she has been teaching school at Mullinavat, an agricultural town near Kilkenny.

Young Dolan was one of her pupils. She confessed she induced him to elope. They met at Waterford, Ireland about a week ago by agreement, and taking a train for Queenstown embarked on the Servia. Mary's mother is dead and her father is in Australia. The commissioners decided to allow her to land but to recommend the boy's return to Ireland. Mary says that if he goes back she will go with him.  
Young Dolan has not a cent of money and his sweetheart paid his passage over. She says his father would never consent to the match and she determined to marry him over here.

Grangers to Be Entertained.  
The Chronicle says the visiting delegates of the National Grange will arrive in California in a body on the 12th inst. After the adjournment of the convention at Sacramento the delegates will be taken in charge by a committee of the State Board of Trade and escorted through all the counties that are affiliation with the board. They will also be shown the agricultural facilities and possibilities of California. As these visitors represent the class from which the State will draw its greatest immigration, the State Board will do its utmost to entertain and impress the Grangers.
