EDITORIAL NOTES

The matter of our circulating

medium interests every citizen. As

good an authority as the Cincinnati

Commercial Gazette says that

there are now in circulation six

kind of currency, viz., gold coin,

gold certificates, silver coin, silver

certificates, greenbacks, and National

bank notes. Silver coin and silver

certificates have a basis of

their own, while the rest have gold

or an equivalent thereto. The

greenback currency is fixed in

volume. It can not be changed,

except by act of congress. The

National bank circulation is steadily

and rather rapidly diminishing.

During the month of September

\$1,432,469 of this circulation was

withdrawn, and during the year

\$37,779,000 was retired, and on the

1st of October the total National

bank circulation was \$199,779,000.

There was on the 1st Oct. \$277,-

951,457 silver certificates in circula-

tion, and \$2,582,205 held in the

treasury as cash. There was at the

same time \$118,280,762 gold certifi-

cates in circulation, and \$41,218,-

740 held in the treasury as cash.

Silver dollars in circulation, \$58,-

370,817, and in the treasury,

\$282,820,332. This latter amount

is represented almost entirely by

silver certificates, which circulate

as money. The amount of fractional

silver in circulation is \$52,-

931,352. The total amount of paper

and coin in circulation on the 1st

of Oct. was \$1,435,000,018.
