This vessel is a very fine iron steamer and can make nearly sixteen miles an hour in good water. On her arrival she will be put in service on the Sound to run between Seattle, Tacoma and Victoria.

### BAYARD-CLYNE MARRIAGE.

The Ex-Secretary of State Quietly Married in Washington.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Thomas F. Bayard, ex-secretary of state, and the missionary, Miss Mary Clyne, were married at 1 o'clock this afternoon in the presence of a quiet as possible and invitations numbering about 150 were issued to relations and a few personal friends. Among them were ex-President and Mrs. Cleveland, ex-Secretary and Mrs. Fairchild, Hon. George Bancroft, Justice and Mrs. Field, Justice and Mrs. Lamar and Mrs. M. W. Fuller. A reception and breakfast followed the ceremony and soon after the newly married couple left for a tour to New York and other northern cities.

### A RUSSIAN'S TOAST.

He Declares that America Wants Nothing and Feels Nothing.

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—Count Schouvaloff, the Russian Ambassador, gave a dinner at the Russian Embassy tonight in honor of William Walter Phelps, Minister to Germany. Among the guests were the members of all the European embassies. Count Schouvaloff in proposing the health of Mr. Phelps said that America stood alone among great powers as wanting nothing and feeling nothing.

### Princess Maria Dead.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Princess Maria, wife of Prince Alexander of Battenberg, recently ruling prince of Bulgaria, died to-day at Graz in childbirth.

### Presidential Appointment.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The president to-day appointed William Brewster, of New York, commissioner of navigation.

### Vessel and Crew Lost.

YOKOHAMA, Nov. 7.—The American ship Chesborough from Higo for New York has been wrecked on the northern coast of Japan. Nineteen of the crew were drowned.

Beard, of Scio, referred to Irvine and the question he had sprung in a manner to leave Bro. Ben Irvine in a good natured dilemma on the question.

Hon. R. A. Irvine and President F. M. Kizer made reference to the question of giving aid to the members east of the mountains. The singers of No. 10 gave some fine vocal music to enliven the meeting. A. F. Beard made remarks upon the good of the order that were pertinent to the subject, and of interest.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Ex-President Cleveland was interviewed last night on the election results. "It is evident," said Cleveland, "that the leaven of tariff reform has at least leavened the whole lump. The west which has suffered most from the unjust burden of tariff taxation has awakened. The state platforms of both Iowa and Ohio are abreast of the St. Louis platform on the subject of tariff reform. The people have considered and passed judgment. It was for the people to decide. They are now deciding it. It is enough for me to say they are satisfied with the indications and results of the election. The voters in Virginia indicate that the south is still faithful to the democracy of Jefferson and Jackson."

### SOME HOPE IN OHIO.

CHICAGO, (Ohio), Nov. 7.—The State Journal (rep.) says the republican state committee estimates Campbell's plurality over Foraker for governor at from 10,000 to 12,000. The returns from nine of the leading counties show that Foraker ran 10,365 behind the ticket. In view of this they claim that the rest of the republican state ticket is elected by an average plurality of 5000.

Students Who Refuse to Testify in a Hazing Case.

A report from Madison, Wis., says that the Madison Court Judge Keyes gave a decision in the case of A. M. Long and other students of the State University who refused to testify in the Riley hazing case. He examined the case carefully and decided he has the right to compel them to testify or be punished for contempt of court.

If the boys persist in their refusal to testify he will commit them for contempt of court, and as a commitment of this character is not bailable, and a writ of habeas corpus would not prevail, a great deal of excitement exists in university circles. Some fifteen or twenty students are implicated. Some of them have already left and gone to other colleges.

Attorney Bashford persists in his determination not to permit the boys to testify, and the chances are that the county jail will soon be overflowing with students. The court adjourned until Wednesday, giving the unwilling students until that time to make up their minds whether or not they will testify.
