Farther Particulars.

This is the same girl who became somewhat notorious in this city. She is only about 16 years old.

THE KEMARIC POSSIBILITIES

Of the Northwest—Discovery of Fine Clay—The Dutch Syndicate.

The Oregonian says that Dr. Willis Everette, the well-known mining expert and geologist, is in the city. He has with him sixty-five samples of fine porcelain and fire clays, and articles manufactured from these clays, the most valuable of which was found on the Cowitz river.

These samples have all been carefully tested in the doctor's furnace, and are all arranged in neat boxes on pink cotton, and are now on their way to Holland for the inspection of a wealthy syndicate. If the Dutch syndicate are satisfied with these clays, they may erect an enormous pottery works on the land from which these clays were taken, and proceed to manufacture fire brick, repressed brick, enameled brick, tiles, stoneware and porcelainware. One of the great values of the white "kaolins" is that it makes a clear enameled glaze without the admixture of any other substance; and a common red building brick dipped into a thick solution of this clay, mixed with water and suddenly subjected to the proper heat, will take on a clear, beautiful, smooth enamel, and can be used as an enameled pressed front brick.

The future of the ceramic industry of the Northwest is very great, and it will be of vast benefit to the whole section, should the Dutch syndicate take hold of this property and erect the necessary works.
