INTO THE UNION.

Washington Is at Last Admitted as a State.

THE CATHOLIC CELEBRATION.

Mrs Frances E. Willard Re-Elected President of the National W. C. T. U. A Steamship Wrecked.

NORTHWEST PASSAGE.

Captain Stockton Thinks It Could Have Been Made Last Summer.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—It is expected that the president will this afternoon issue a proclamation admitting Washington as a state of the Union.

LATER—Washington was admitted as a state by the president's proclamation this afternoon.

OLYMPIA, Nov. 11.—The news of the issuance of President Harrison's proclamation admitting Washington as a state of the union, was received here with wild enthusiasm.

A GRAND GATHERING. The Catholic Centennial at Baltimore.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 11.—The celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the founding of the first Roman Catholic diocese in the United States began in the old cathedral here on Sunday.

In opening the ceremony the Pope was represented by Archbishop Satolli of Lepanto, the Church of England and Ireland by Bishops Vertue of Portsmouth and Vaughan of Salford, the Canadian hierarchy by Cardinal Taschereau, six Archbishops and six Bishops of the dominion, and Mexico by Bishop Montez de Oca and E. Gillan.

The foreign prelates do take any part in the discussion of the congress which begins to-day and will continue three days.

When Bishop Carroll was elected to the charge of the See of Baltimore, the first diocese in the country, there were less than 40,000 Catholics in the United States.

Cardinal Gibbons says there are now 80,000 clergy and 9,000,000 adherents to the tenets of the faith, 10,000 churches and chapels and 650 institutions of learning.

The one hundred delegates of the first congress of Catholic laymen of the United States were called to order a little before noon to-day by W. J. Onahan, of Chicago.

Archbishop Ireland briefly invoked divine blessing, and in a few remarks introduced Carroll as temporary chairman and mentioned the name of Pope Leo. Instantly there was hand clapping and cheering, soon growing into tumultuous enthusiasm.

The following cablegram from Rome was read: "Cardinal Gibbons, Baltimore: Having made known to the holy father expressions of devotion evinced toward him on the part of the Catholic congress, the greatest ever held in Baltimore, his holiness graciously bids me say that he most affectionately imparts his blessing to all members." Signed, M. Cardinal Rampolla.

Daniel Dougherty, of New York, was invited by the chairman to address the congress, pending the appointment of committees, etc. As the orator was in his best form and elated, he was given a perfect ovation by congress.

SOME DAMAGING EVIDENCE AGAINST BURKE AND OTHERS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—In the Cronin case this morning witnesses were introduced who testified that Kung last spring went under the name of Kaiser. Other witnesses testified to acts showing intimacy between Kung and Coughlin, and Kung and Osburn.

Gus Dare, a tinner, testified to having soldered up a galvanized zinc box, 14x20 inches, for Burke two days after the murder. Burke objected to the witness removing the cord from the box which held the top on. In the course of the conversation Burke said Cronin was a spy and ought to be killed.

NATIONAL W. C. T. U.

Miss Frances K. Willard Re-Elected President of the Union.

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Miss Frances E. Willard was re-elected President of the National W. C. T. U. The vote was practically unanimous, since Mrs. J. Ellen Foster, of Iowa, who represents the non-partisan element, received but nine votes.

A DISAPPEARING PASTOR.

For the Second Time a Clergyman is Missing From His Pulpit.

BOSTON, Nov. 10.—Rev. C. J. Smith, pastor of the Pilgrim church, Dorchester, whose mysterious disappearance last spring, subsequent discovery in San Francisco and return to his pastorate in the fall formed a fruitful theme for gossip and wonderment, has again disappeared without giving any intimation of his departure or leaving any clue by which to trace him.

MANY HOME SEEKERS.

Oregon's Population Is Increasing at a Rapid Rate.

SOME INTERESTING FIGURES.

The Steady Accessions to the Agricultural, Mechanical and Manufacturing Population of Oregon.

The Portland Journal refers to the fact that the secretary of the state board of immigration says in his recent report that the number of visiting immigrants at the rooms of the board during the month of October, including families, was 1844, and that the number of reduced rate railroad tickets issued by the board was 1611.

Now, it is entirely safe to say that at least 1000 of these reduced rate tickets were issued to heads of families in search of homes, and it cannot be very far from correct to estimate the number of persons composing each family at four persons. Even cutting the number down to three persons for each family, this gives a probable increase of population of 3000 per month or 36,000 per year.

Allowing four persons to a family and thus you have an increase of 40,000 souls a year, and then multiplying the remaining 611 reduced rate ticket holders by twelve and nearly 7500 more souls are added, making a grand total of nearly 50,000.

But the secretary says in his report that October was a dull month. Taking these figures as a basis of calculation, the Journal thinks that if the operations of the board were properly seconded and their hands duly strengthened they could add 100,000 souls to the population of Oregon in the year 1890.

This increase of population is needed to create and furnish a home market for the constantly multiplying manufacturing industries which are being inaugurated in the state to plant the fruit and grain which are needed for home consumption and foreign exports; to develop the mines, the fisheries, the dairies, the stock ranges, the lumber interests of the state; to give the state that pre-eminent position in the great sisterhood of states to which her wonderful resources entitle her.

In one of his recent reports, the secretary and statistician of the Portland Board of Trade, referred with peculiar emphasis to the influence for good which the accessions of population, clearly traceable to the labors of the state board of immigration has had. This fact of itself should operate as a powerful factor in leading every citizen to the conclusion that his best interests lie in the state of lowering up this work and accelerating its movement. If proper energy is manifested the close of the year 1890 ought to see Oregon with close on to a population of 400,000 souls, if not with more than that number. And the year 1892 ought to be ushered in with a population of fully half a million.

In this connection the HERALD desires to call attention to the fact that much benefit might accrue to this portion of the state through the influence of the Albany Board of Trade, if the organization would resume business. These are progressive times in this city as well as in the entire state, and the Board of Trade ought to be an important working factor in the city's growth.
