THE CITY COUNCIL.

The Grading of Washington Street to Be Prosecuted.

HOW IT WILL BE DONE.

Judges and Clerks Appointed for the City Election—Hillsboro Has Paid for the Hand Fire Engine.

The regular meeting of the city council was held last evening, all officers and members being present except Recorder Henton.

The committee on fire and water recommended that no business signs or advertisements be allowed to be suspended across the streets of the city.

The special committee to whom was referred the matter of the sale of the hand fire engine reported that the amount of \$300 had been received from the city of Hillsboro in payment for the engine, and that the same has been turned into the city treasury.

A petition from property owners for a new sidewalk on the east end of First street was read and referred.

A petition for the prohibition of cesspools and for an order requiring property owners to make proper connection with sewers was read and referred to the committee on health and police.

The recorder was ordered to give the proper notice for the city election to occur on the first Monday in December.

The following judges and clerks of election were appointed:

1st Ward—Judges, W. C. Read, David Froman, M. Payne; clerks, C. W. Watts, T. J. Stites.

2nd Ward—Judges, Strauder Froman, Ellis Knox, L. Senders; clerks, C. G. Rawlings, J. R. Wyatt.

3rd Ward—Judges, E. A. Parker, Wm. Huston, John Isom; clerks, G. F. Simpson, F. A. Barkhart.

Various sidewalk improvements were ordered made.

On motion, J. Whitesides, the contractor for furnishing the city with dirt and gravel, was instructed to proceed with the grading of the square at the junction of Second and Washington streets, the dirt and gravel to be placed on other streets of the city, under the direction of the committee on streets and public property.

It was ordered that the work of grading Washington street be prosecuted at once, under the direction of the street commissioner, and the committee on streets and public property, and that when the property owners refuse to carry on the work that such city officers shall commence the work immediately and prosecute the same until the entire street is graded, also that the side streets be properly graded.

Mr. S. W. Ross was present and offered to remove all the dirt on the street without cost to the city, but no contract for the work was let.

THE SANTIAM MINES.

Ground Purchased for Smelting Works to Be Established at Gatesville.

GATESVILLE, Nov. 12.—Don Smith, of this place, has sold to the Dry Gulch and Gold Mountain Mining Co., of Salem, a tract of land between the railroad and the Santiam river at that place, embracing about 75 acres, for the purpose of establishing smelting works for the Santiam mines. The price paid for the land was \$4000. The company, it is announced, will erect smelting works and a concentrator early next year.

This company has a force of surveyors at work locating the route for a flume for the placer mines. The canal will be over twenty miles long.

The proposition to establish smelting works here has caused no little interest among the people of Gatesville, who hope it will be more than talk.
