Gleets, not Glanders.

There are afloat rumors of the existence of glanders and gleet among horses and stockmen. Were animals in Oregon afflicted by glanders due publicity of that fact in the interest of every body would be demanded, but as no case of glanders has come to light in this state it is imperatively demanded that damaging reports be contradicted. It is given out by the Oregon Domestic Animal Commission, made up of the governor, secretary of state and president of the state board of agriculture, created by the last legislature, which has ordered killed since March over one hundred gleety horses, scattered evenly over the state, that not one was suffering from glanders. That ordinarily posted men might readily accept gleet for glanders symptoms applicable to either ailment furnish probable cause. It is not difficult, therefore, to see how the idea of glanders gained currency in some quarters. But when many symptoms point indefinitely there are radical variations in the progression of the maladies. Gleet may fasten on a horse without unfitting it for service in a year or more and is not so contagious among horses as glanders and not poisonous to human kind. Glanders, on the contrary, quickly spreads among horses and breaks them down in a few weeks, besides fatally affecting man. Probably no state is so free from gleet as Oregon, and that which is here to-day will, under the intelligent direction of the commission, be stamped out to-morrow.—Statesman.

A Dam Breaks at Ontario, Malheur County.

LOSS OF LIFE AND PROPERTY.

Bridges, Mills and Residences Carried Away and the Inmates Drowned—A Requisition for the Murderer Gibbs.

ONTARIO, Or., Nov. 13.—This morning the dam at McClullin's flouring mill, one mile west of here, broke and the water swept down toward the town, carrying away six mill dams and four bridges, and wrecking half a dozen mills and several dwellings. The house of an old couple named Harris was carried away, and both the occupants were drowned. Many other residents had narrow escapes.
