WILL FENCE THE TRACK.

The Southern Pacific Will Expand \$168,000 for This Purpose.

The recent disasters on the Southern Pacific road resulting from stock upon the track has led to the plan of fencing the track.

Particulars of the Southern Pacific's fences which the company is about to build on each side of their tracks, has been obtained from Superintendent Brandt.

"We are now getting the material and supplies ready as fast as we can for the first installment. This will consist of some thirty miles of road, sixty miles of fence. Part of it will be within the city limits of East Portland, the rest will be scattered along up the valley in the worst places."

"What kind of a fence will you build?"

"It is to be a high strong wire fence, with one board nailed along the top."

"How much is it going to cost?"

Mr. Brandt made a brief mental calculation and said: "That fence is going to cost us, counting the material, labor and everything, no less than 75 cents for every rod put up."

"The whole length which is to be fenced is about 350 miles, making 700 miles of fence."

"We shall probably keep right at the work on other lots as soon as this first sixty miles of fence is up. We cannot let the work stop. It must go right on."

As some of the worst accidents have occurred in Linn county, a considerable amount of the fencing will be done along the road in this locality.

To Improve the River.

The following is taken from the proceedings of the Oregon City board of trade at its last meeting:

"At the request of Binger Hermann, Capt. McCowan said he had four negatives taken of Clackamas rapids, at a cost of \$10. Mr. Hermann will use the photographs in pleading for the river appropriation."

The motion was carried that the photograph be forwarded along with the resolution of the board to emphasize the necessity of deepening the channel at that point. This would indicate that Mr. Hermann has his eye on the interests of his constituency. Of course he will plead for the appropriation above the falls and on to Harrisburg.

The Boat on Fire.

One day last week fire was discovered on board the steamer N. S. Bentley, of the O. P. line, moored at one of the Astoria wharves.

Captain Fisher, of the British ship Dreisfale, descended to the hold of the burning steamer with the laudable purpose of extinguishing the blaze. In the meantime the fire department appeared on the scene and sent several streams into the bowels of the boat, drenching the captain, who came out looking like a drowned rat, but with his British blood boiling, vengeance in his eye and determined to clean out the whole Astoria fire department.
