### OVER THE WIRES.

#### The Overthrow of the Brazilian Monarchy.

#### FATAL RAILROAD DISASTER.

#### A Big Advance in Coffee—A Chinese Murderer Takes Up Gun and Cheats the Gallows—Eastern News.

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.**—Nothing has been received at the state department to-day concerning the revolution in Brazil. The failure to receive additional information adds the department officials to think that the cables have been seized. Among the navy officers no surprise was expressed at the news of the revolution. One officer said that twenty years ago when he was in Brazil there was a general feeling that when Dom Pedro's reign ended a republican form of government would be instituted. Lieutenant Barry, who recently returned from Brazil says that the change which had come to pass was only talked of among Brazilians as probable to occur, and they expected it at any time. To the people of Brazil he said it could not appear to have been sudden.  
**RIO JANEIRO, Nov. 18.**—The new government has announced that it will firmly maintain order. It is preparing a circular to foreign governments relative to the overthrow of the empire, which will be telegraphed to them through the Brazilian representatives abroad. The province of Bahia has signified its adherence to the republic. News from other provinces show that they are also in favor of a republican form of government.

#### RAILROAD DISASTER.

**A Passenger Train Wrecked—Engineer and Fireman Injured.**  
**PITTSBURG, Nov. 18.**—The limited mail on the Western Pennsylvania ran into a landslide near Bessemer last night. The engine and baggage car were wrecked. Fireman John Good was fatally injured. The engineer was badly hurt, but will recover. Had the engine fallen to the right instead of the left the train, with its 200 souls, would have gone down an embankment 100 feet high.

#### A BIG JUMP.

**Up Goes the Price of Coffee in New York.**  
**New York, Nov. 18.**—There was great excitement and a big attendance at the coffee exchange this morning, due to the interest felt in the Brazilian situation. Up to 11:30 the usual cable had not yet arrived, and all attention was centered on the news it was expected to bring. Coffee advanced from 15 to 55 per cent. over Saturday's closing. On the first call 20,750 bags were sold.

#### THE NATIONAL MILITIA.

**A Request That the Annual Appropriation Be Increased.**  
**WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.**—Captain Taylor, who has been charged with the appropriation for the purpose of providing arms and camp equipage for the national militia, in his annual report makes a plea for an increase of the appropriation. It was 200,000 in 1898, and has only been doubled once since for providing for the needs of nearly ten times as many people as then. Captain Taylor recommends that it be increased to \$1,000,000 annually. Nebraska and a few other States have not made the returns required by law, and Captain Taylor recommends that after January 1, 1899, no issue of stores be made to any State which has not rendered returns.

#### THE LATEST NOVELTY IN PANTALOONS.

#### THE RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT AT LAST SUCCESSFUL TO PUBLIC OPINION.

**New York, Nov. 18.**—The Post's cable special from Kiel says the Russian government has at last succumbed to public opinion, and is going to abolish banishment to Siberia, so long a terror to humanity and a blot upon civilization. Such, at least, is the current report.

#### THE NEW NAVY.

**Report of the Chief of the Bureau of Ordnance.**  
**WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.**—The report of Commodore Sigsbee, Chief of the Naval Bureau of Ordnance, makes estimates for the ensuing fiscal year amounting to \$4,545,724. Bids have been advertised for \$200,000 worth of armor-piercing shells, in the hope that

projectiles equal to those made abroad, namely, of power and strength sufficient to penetrate targets of one and a half calibers thickness without material deformation, may be produced. During the year the six-inch armaments of the Charleston, Yorktown and Petrel were completed and sent to the vessels, and the armament for the Baltimore is ready. The eight-inch guns for the Charleston and Baltimore will be ready within the current year. The armaments for the Philadelphia, Bennington, Concord and San Francisco will be completed as soon as the vessels are ready for them.

#### THE PANAMA CANAL.

**It Will Be Investigated by a Committee of Engineers.**  
**PARIS, Nov. 18.**—The committee of five engineers appointed to report on the Panama Canal will sail for the isthmus on the 10th of December by the Americ. They are Germain, Charvet, Laget, Duchatenet and Cousin, all Frenchmen with the exception of the last named, who is a Belgian, and was selected for the mission by Brunet, liquidator of the company. These gentlemen have been charged to conceal no unfavorable facts, and not to underrate anything that is of a hopeful nature. If they find the canal to be an impracticable undertaking they will decrease a loss of fifty or sixty millions sterling of French money. If, on the other hand, they say the work ought to be persevered in, they will have perhaps added further to the responsibility of their position.

#### NATIONAL GRANGE.

**Election of Officers and Other Business.**  
The National Grange which met in Sacramento on last Wednesday, on Saturday elected officers as follows: J. H. Brigham, of Ohio, master; Hiram Hawkins, of Alabama, overseer; Mortimer Whitehead, of New Jersey, lecturer; A. J. Rose, of Texas, chaplain; E. W. Davis, of California, steward; F. M. McDowell, of New York, treasurer; John Trimble, of Washington, D. C., secretary; L. Rhone, of Pennsylvania, J. J. Woodman, of Michigan, L. Chortleres, of Virginia, and J. H. Brigham, of Ohio, executive committee. Resolutions were adopted to the effect that most agricultural colleges connected with the state universities are failures, and that such colleges should be separated from the universities. A number of changes were made in the ritual. An able annual address was delivered by Worthy Master J. H. Brigham.

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#### KILLING OF A DESPERADO.

**ST. LOUIS, Nov. 17.**—A special from Birmingham, Ala., gives the details of the killing of a desperado in Marshall county, presumed to be the noted robber Rube Burrows. When the outlaw fell mortally wounded he said, "You think I am Rube Burrows, but you are mistaken; my name is Smith." The dead desperado wore a shirt of mail.

#### AN IMPORTANT QUESTION.

**Has the United States Pre-emption Law Been Repealed?**  
**BISMARCK (N. D.), Nov. 18.**—The point was formally raised today by F. M. Dudley of the legal department of the Northern Pacific Railway in the United States Land Office that the pre-emption law had been repealed by the act of Congress providing for the admission of the new States. It looks as if it was intended to repeal the eighth section of the act of 1841 as to the donation of 500,000 acres of public land to the new States for public improvements, but the text includes not only the repeal of that section, but of the whole law.

**Salem is organizing a concert company that will soon visit Independence, Dallas, Albany, Eugene and Monmouth during the season.**

**The assessment roll of Tillamook county received shows \$583,593 taxable property, 374 polls. Estimates based upon the certified assessment rolls of seventeen counties, and reliable information from the other counties of the state show a clear gain over last year in taxable property of \$16,000,000.**

#### PORTLAND NEWS.

**PORTLAND, Nov. 18.**—The Swiss residents of this city gave an entertainment and ball at Turner hall last evening, under the auspices of the Portland Grutli Verein, which was largely attended. The occasion was the anniversary of the independence of Switzerland. The hall was densely crowded, and the evening was passed in music, instrumental and vocal, and interesting addresses by members of the society. After the programme was exhausted the floor was cleared for dancing, and the light fantastic was tripped until a late hour this morning, when the company dispersed.
