A BOOM FOR LEBANON.

LEBANON, Nov. 19.—The citizens of Lebanon held a meeting last evening to take steps toward raising a subsidy of \$5000 for a paper mill. Mr. J. J. Swan was elected chairman and M. A. Miller secretary.

The German steamer Duburg, from Amoy, Flensburg, has been lost with all on board. The report is current at Zanzibar that the camp of Captain Rust, of the Peters expedition, has been burned.

The German consul at Hong Kong telegraphs that a typhoon has ravaged the country between Hong Kong and Saigon. The forgeries of Barrett, missing piano dealer of Cleveland, O., are estimated at \$100,000, nearly all his friends are victimized.

Ninety-three cases, each containing five teels of opium, and a valise containing some of the drug, were seized in a stateroom on the steamer Umatilla at San Francisco Monday.

Ex-Mayor Ward, of Sheffield, dropped dead while running to catch a train. Ward was the largest manufacturer of edge tools in the world.

Geo. F. Kessler, proprietor of the Chicago cheap store of Decatur, Ill., who made a desperate attempt to commit suicide about six weeks ago, by cutting a big hole in his head with a hatchet, has made a second and this time successful attempt, throwing himself in front of a moving train.

The grand jury of San Bernardino has cited Governor Waterman, H. J. Otis, of Los Angeles, Louis Munson, of the Banning Herald, the city marshal, and several other prominent men, to appear before them and testify regarding the charges of bribery made against the commissioners in selecting a site for the Southern California insane asylum.

P. P. Shelby, general traffic manager of the Manitoba railway system, of Montana, states that the Manitoba will be extended across North Idaho to Spokane Falls during the coming year. He regrets the diversion from the Southwest en route to Boise City, believing this route to be the best for economy in building and for developing a paying business.

Gibbs Pleads Not Guilty—A Carpenter's Terrible Fall.

Special to the Herald.—PORTLAND, Nov. 19.—Gibbs, the colored murderer of James McDevitt, was arraigned to-day. He pleaded not guilty, and his trial was set for December 10th.

The prisoner has told his whole story, and until the trial takes place nothing of a very interesting character can be expected to develop in regard to this case, unless Gibbs attempts suicide, and he is regarded as being too much of a coward to do that.

A TERRIBLE FALL.—PORTLAND, Nov. 19.—A few days ago a carpenter employed on a new residence in Holladay's addition fell from the roof of a building to the ground. He was carrying a board and walking on a roof when he slipped and fell down the roof and then to the ground, striking on both feet. He was partially stunned by the fall, but was not injured in any way, which was remarkable, considering the distance he fell.

The residence was two story, and his escape from serious injury or iron being killed was most marvellous. He did not even stop work.
