EDITORIAL NOTES.
New enterprises are almost daily
being started in Albany. Some
extensive factories and a larger
amount of building than ever before...

A fresh fall of snow is reported
in the Cascade mountains. The
river is slowly rising and steam-
boatmen anticipate steady business
on the upper Willamette soon.

THIRTY-SIX thousand extra copies
of our Dumb Animals, a paper
published in Boston, and devoted
to the object of ameliorating the
condition of domestic animals as
its name implies, were issued this
month and distributed to the
newspapers throughout the country.

GEN. SCHOLFIELD wants to prevent
desertions from the army by
making easy for the men to pro-
cure discharges upon application.
Probably his plan would accom-
plish the design, but it would
deplete the army more than the
desertions do.

The amount of money attracted
to Paris by the Exposition is esti-
mated at \$250,000,000—\$100,000,000
from the 5,000,000 French people
who came from the provinces and
\$150,000,000 from the 1,500,000
foreigners. There were 380,000
Englishmen, 226,000 Belgians,
163,000 Germans, and 129,000
Americans in the list of those who
attended the great show. These
figures give an idea of the vast
financial benefit of a big exposition.

The stage robber and murderer
Holzhay, in Michigan, has received
a life sentence, which is
eminently correct, providing the
future governors of that state are
forever deterred from pardoning
him out. It will be remembered
that he fired into a stage full of
passengers, because he was shot at,
and mortally wounded a prominent
banker who was a passenger. Such
miscreants should be placed where
it is impossible for them to com-
mit any future depredations.

A brave but useless race for life
was that made by Dr. Jobs of
Union county, New Jersey. The
Dr. was out hunting with a friend
and in attempting to disentangle
his gun from the buggy robe
exploded it, frightfully wounding
himself in the left shoulder, arm
and side. He realized the necessity
of reaching home immediately
and urged his friend to drive the
horse to its utmost speed, which
was done, but without effect as the
Dr. died and the horse was killed
by the furious ride of three miles.

The gratifying announcement
that the Russian government had
decided upon the discontinuance
of penal exile to Siberia, as a pun-
ishment for political and civil
offenses, is supplemented by the
story of the outrageous treatment
of the granddaughter of the Russian
poet Pushkin. As the story goes
the young lady is extremely beau-
tiful, and on lately being presented
at court attracted the attention
of the Grand Duke Alexis, younger
brother of the Czar, who paid her
particular attention with the usual
intentions of young scions of
nobility. The young lady received
his attentions with coldness, and
would not even admit his friend-
ship unless he would procure the
release of her most intimate friend,
the young Princess Annie Narish-
kin, who, with her brother, Prince
Narishkin, had been arrested on
May 4th last on a charge of being
implicated in an attempt to
assassinate the Czar. This the
perfidious prince promised to do,

although he knew that Prince and
Princess Narishkin had both died
in prison six weeks before, a fact
that had not yet been made known
to Mlle. Pushkin. On the strength
of this promise the young lady
agreed to and did meet Alexis, and
the very next morning she was
arrested and thrown into a dungeon
by the police, on a charge, made
by Alexis himself, of being implic-
ated in the nihilist plot to assass-
inate the Czar. Certainly if
Russia is to be complimented upon
the edict doing away with Siberian
exile, she is to be execrated for
allowing a condition of affairs to
exist that will make possible the
working of such a dastardly game
by a member of her royal family,
providing the story be true.

A WEST POINT, Neb., policeman
recently took occasion to gratify an
old grudge under the guise of per-
forming his official duties. He
entered a saloon against whose
proprietor he held the grudge, and
instead of complying with the re-
quest to depart, opened fire on the
proprietor, reducing him to a mere
lump of clay with two shots. A
bystander who attempted to pre-
vent the bloody work was fatally
filled with the balance of the lead
in the policeman's little gun. If
that policeman escapes punish-
ment all any man will need to aid
him in plans for murderous
revenge is to get appointed upon
the police force of that town, and
inveigle his victim within range of
his gun.

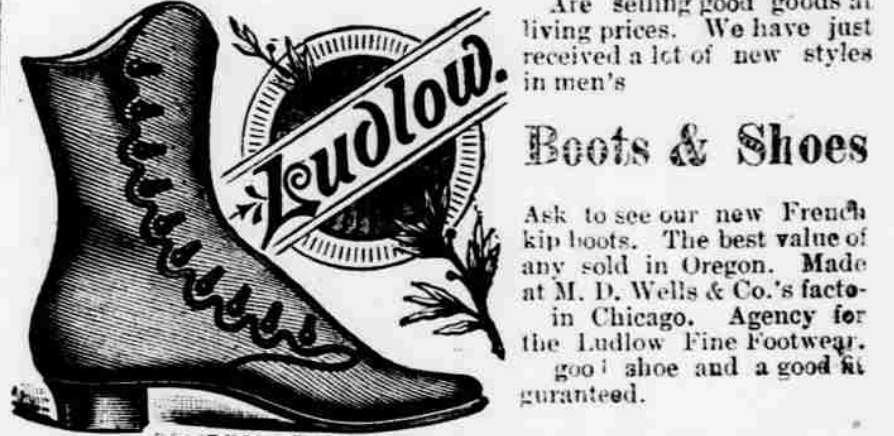

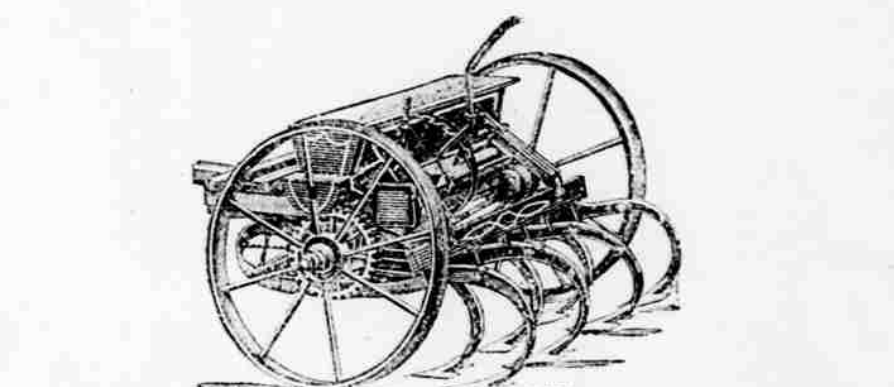
