THE NEVADA LINE.

A New Survey Gives California a Large Strip of Land.

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 23.—The report of the commissioners appointed by Surveyor General Reichert to re-survey the boundary line between Nevada and California has made their report. By it California gains a strip over 200 miles in length and three-quarters of a mile wide, cutting through Lake Tahoe and going south till it strikes the You Schmidt monuments of 1873 on the Colorado river, which is found to be correct. The report will be submitted to Congress, when it will probably take measures to establish a correct line according to the recent survey.

THE NICARAGUA CANAL.

Rapid Progress Reported by One of the Stockholders.

CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—C. P. Treat, one of the largest stockholders in the Nicaragua Canal, now here, says: "I have just received news from Nicaragua that the preparatory work on the canal is being pushed as rapidly as is possible. The first trouble with which we meet is the difficulty in landing ships at Greytown. We are working with every energy, and are now building a breakwater and docks. The contract for the construction of the canal from the Caribbean sea to lock 1 is to be let in a few days. "The talk that trouble between Nicaragua and Costa Rica is likely to endanger the construction of the canal is all wrong. There is no trouble between the countries, and the relations between the canal company and Nicaragua are most cordial."

THE MONTANA LEGISLATURE.

Three Thousand Barrels of American Whisky Smuggled into Canada—A Young Girl's Abductor.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Mail advices from San Jose, Costa Rica, dated Nov. 11, says: On the afternoon of the 7th Rodriguez took possession of the city and is well supplied with arms. The followers of Esquivel are in the minority. The firing began from the presidential palace. The guns acted high, however, and no one was hurt. All night long the fight was kept up, with no greater loss than four killed and four wounded. A demand was made on President Soto to turn over the presidency to Dr. Duran, third vice-president. About midnight Soto concluded to go so, and Dr. Duran immediately named Ricardo Jimnes minister-general, in the place of Don Mauro Hernandez. Rodriguez will step into power and Esquivel will quietly accept his defeat.

SMUGGLED WHISKY.

Enough American Whisky to Make All of Canada Drunk.

MONTREAL, Nov. 23.—C. A. Corneille, who investigated the whisky smuggling at Quebec for the government, states that as far as can be traced there have been smuggled into Canada, by way of St. Preier and Miguelon, this year 3000 barrels of American whisky, and as each gallon should have paid \$2 duty, the government has lost \$300,000 in revenue from that source alone.

IN MONTANA.

The Republicans and Democrats Hold Their Caucuses.

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 23.—At the caucus of the republican members of both houses of the legislature this morning, it was decided to stick to the certificates of the state board. Witter of Beaver Head, was nominated for speaker. A democratic caucus is being held with closed doors.

A KIDNAPED HEIRESS.

Found in a House of the Good Shepherd at St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 23.—Alice Jackman, the sixteen-year-old heiress who was kidnaped in front of W. H. Brunker's house and taken to the house of the Good Shepherd and thence spirited away, is in the house of the same order at Norman.

During her removal she did not struggle or scream. She entered and left the carriage without the slightest objection. Although the sisters of the House of the Good Shepherd claim that Mr. Spink placed the girl in the institution, Mr. Taylor, who has knowledge of her whereabouts, says that if either of the Spinks—Charles C., his son-in-law, or Al H., the brother of his son-in-law—placed Alice there or had anything to do with her kidnaping, they never acquainted him with the facts and acted without his knowledge or consent.

Mr. Brunker and Mr. Estes, his attorney, are very much exercised over the girl's absence, and have determined to make every endeavor to regain possession of her. The law against kidnaping in this State provides a punishment of imprisonment in the penitentiary for a term not exceeding ten years.

It will be of greater advantage to Astoria than to Albany, as Albany now has, by the Oregon Pacific, a shorter and cheaper route to the ocean at Yaquina. Salem has no direct line to a seaport except the inland port at Portland and therefore no competition. The most feasible route for the capital city—shorter, more easily constructed, and a nearer point to San Francisco—is to build a road through Kings valley down the Siletz to Newport, tapping the Astoria & Albany road and the west side system of the Southern Pacific. A large subsidy could be secured for the construction of this road in Polk county and on this basis the road would pass through a fine country abounding in timber, stone and coal, that would insure the road a profitable business from the start.

AMERICAN INTERESTS.

Two United States Vessels Ordered to Rio Janeiro.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 22.—A Washington special says: Admiral Gillis commanding the South American squadron, has been ordered to go with the Richmond and Tallapoosa to Rio Janeiro to protect American interests. A curious story connected with the Brazilian revolution is obtaining currency in diplomatic society. Dom Pedro was, it is said, himself the prime mover in his own deposition. He had endeavored to resist his son-in-law's active hostility to the anti-royalist party and had other reasons to be dissatisfied with him. Furthermore, his Majesty was by no means ignorant of the popular movement. He felt that if he should outlive the republicans advance his daughter would be unable to cope with it, more particularly under the pernicious guidance of her husband. He, therefore, like a wise and philosophical monarch, anticipated the inevitable, and thus at last saved the royal blood which he felt would have come with resistance, if not in his time certainly in that of his successor, hence his easy and calm acceptance of the situation.

VAN TASSELL KILLED

The Daring Balloonist's Drop Into the Pacific Ocean.

HE WAS EATEN BY SHARKS.

Passengers and Crew on a Steamship Witnessed His Parachute Jump, but Were Unable to Aid Him.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 23.—The Oceanic steamer Zealandia arrived from Sydney and Auckland via Honolulu at noon to-day. She reports that as she was entering the harbor at Honolulu on Nov. 16, Prof. Van Tassel, the balloonist, made an ascension from the shore and dropped from his balloon in a parachute. He fell into the ocean about two miles from the shore and one mile from the steamer. He was then seen no more, and it is supposed that he was eaten by sharks. Van Tassel recently gave performances in Oregon and left San Francisco a few weeks ago for Honolulu and Australia, where he expected to give exhibitions.

SANTIAM MINES.

Improvements to the Gold Mountain and Dry Gulch Property.

An Oregonian reporter recently came across E. H. Flemming, general manager, and R. H. Miller, vice president and treasurer of the Gold Mountain & Dry Gulch Gold and Silver Mining Company in Portland.

"The improvements to our property are progressing finely," said Mr. Flemming, in reply to the reporter's query, "and I am confident that the development of our mine will surprise even those who have had the highest opinion of Oregon's mineral resources. The mine is located on Dry Gulch in the Santiam district. We have just completed the survey of an eight mile flume to extend from the Santiam river to the mouth of Dry Gulch, up the gulch, and over the top of Gold Mountain. The flume will have a fall of 340 feet.

"We have everything in readiness for setting up the sawmill. The machinery is bought, and we are only waiting for the completion of the toll road between Gates and Quartzville, to get it to the mines. The mill will have a thirty horse power engine, a daily capacity of 15,000 feet, and will cost a little over \$8000. As soon as spring opens, we intend to put in a stamp mill, hydraulic pumps, and other improvements, costing in the aggregate from \$25,000 to \$30,000. We will also increase our working force then to 150 or 200 men.

"We are negotiating with Eastern parties for the construction of a narrow gauge railway to run between Gates and Quartzville, and the probability is that some agreement, having that end in view, will be reached soon.

"As we are certain that we have one of the most valuable mining claims in the state, we intend to operate it extensively and prove to the mining men of Idaho and Montana that Oregon's mineral wealth entitles her to a just recognition as one of the great gold and silver producing states of the Pacific Northwest. Oregon's mineral resources are yet but little developed."

The Gold Mountain and Dry Gulch Company has already sold \$1,250,000 worth of stock, and only \$750,000 worth yet remains on the books. Mr. Flemming exhibits to the reporter a piece of quartz about the size of a duck's egg, that contained about \$40 worth of free gold. The specimen was found on the surface near the diggings, and one side of it is still covered with moss. The gold occurs in small veins or threads. A ton of such ore, were it obtainable, would assay about \$100,000.
