EDITORIAL NOTES.
The president has interposed a
pardon for one of the Mormons
convicted of adultery.

The French government proposes
to establish a monopoly of the
business of match making, the
regular brimstone on the end
of a stick match business of course.

It seems that the New Zealand
colonists are slow about taking up
with Australian federation scheme,
as it is advocated and being organized
by Sir Henry Parkes. They
refuse to participate in it until after
it is in operation and its policy has
been promulgated. They are a
cautious people, and propose to
follow out the Davy Cockett advice,
to be sure you are right and
then go ahead.

It is proposed to alter the arma-
ment of the coast-defense vessels
now under contract at the Union
Iron Works by substituting two
12-inch rifled guns for the one 16-
inch gun in the forward turret, and
to reduce the size of the gun in
the after turret from twelve inches
to ten. It is said that the experi-
ence of England and other Euro-
pean countries shows that a 15-
inch gun is too large for any ves-
sel that floats.

It appears to be positively cer-
tain that the congress just prepar-
ing to meet will enact some mea-
sures in reference to the silver ques-
tion, and the lords and nabobs of
Wall street money controlling busi-
ness have become permeated with
the idea, and in consequence the
heretofore despised white metal is
beginning to assume more impor-
tance. They have no feeling on
the subject, however, except the
money-making instinct, for they
would speculate in coin lids if the
market would only fluctuate
sufficiently.

The colonization of the Mormons
in the Winnepeg district of the
British Dominion in our northern
boundary, it seems is really as-
suming proportions that indicate a
reality of possession. If the Saints
are allowed full liberty there they
will soon found a colony that will
be practically independent of the
Dominion government. If un-
checked by laws which all civilized
people have passed against poly-
gamy, the Mormons will reproduce
in that remote region all the iniqui-
ties of the system of government
and morals that has struck such
deep root in Utah.

The recently inaugurated San
Francisco fast mail train from New
York through, is likely to prove a
permanent institution and one of
great benefit. Not only is the train
of benefit to people along the
route between the termini, but also
to points reached by lateral lines
of communication. The San Fran-
cisco fast mail has already resulted
in bringing about changes on other
postal routes, and one of the trunk
lines of railway is now contemplating
an improvement in the time of
transporting the mails that may
possibly save seven or eight hours
more on the trip from New York
to San Francisco.

A good showing is made by the
Niagara canal company. The
canal commissioners report that
since the landing of the construction
party on June 3d, the Ameri-
cans have succeeded in building
up the foundations of a town, which
will be called America; landed
material for and commenced the
construction of a twelve-mile aqueduct;
laid a mile or more of broad-
gauge railroad; placed thirty-five
miles of telegraph in operation;
crossed the San Juan, Juanillo,
Descada and Silico rivers; built

twenty or more permanent camps;
cleared the first part of the route
of the canal; organized a perfect
supply and transportation service;
a hospital service and an ambu-
lance corps; perfected sanitary ar-
rangements, and have done every-
thing possible to win the good will
of Nicaragua and show the world
what American push and intelli-
gence can do under the most diffi-
cult circumstances.

The Astorian reports that the
Columbia river and Sauvie's
Island slough are full of catfish
and says: "The idiot who intro-
duced them into the Columbia
river should be condemned to live
upon them for the remainder of his
unnatural life." The Oregonian
refutes the report by the statement
that the fish are bullheads and not
catfish, and that no catfish has as
yet been caught in the river, and
that the bullheads harm no other
kind of fish as they live only in
muddy water and never ascend
streams where trout or salmon go.
Probably the Oregonian is correct.

The ways of the Chinese con-
tinue, as of old, to be dark as well
as extremely enter. It is said that
the boldness and ingenuity of the
dealers in Chinese women know
no bounds. No sooner is the mer-
chant's wife device blocked than
they try a new scheme. They sup-
ply a woman with papers declar-
ing that she is a sole trader, a mer-
chant in her own right, and that
she actually hires her husband to
aid her in business. The absurdity
of this plea lies in the fact that
no Oriental would recognize a
woman in any transaction, but
these fellows count on the favor of
the commissioners, to whom every
Chinese admitted means a good
fee.
