HARRISON'S MESSAGE

His First Message to the Fifty-First Congress.

IT IS ABLE AND SENSIBLE.

Summary of the Important Questions Discussed—A Liberal and Progressive Policy Outlined.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The president's message was delivered to congress to-day. In it President Harrison refers in terms of satisfaction and as a cause for national pride to the fact that all the states of North and South America have met together to consider the measures that bind them together. He also alludes to the assembly of the maritime congress, and recommends that Hawaii and Hayti be included in the invitations to the nations. The Samoan conference is also pleasantly spoken of.

Our relations with England are assigned to the existing treaties, and the president expresses to the people that they will be equitably adjusted.

The revision of the tariff is recommended.

The circulating medium of the country is discussed at length.

Regarding rivers and harbors he says the improvement of our important rivers and harbors should be promoted by the necessary appropriations. Care should be taken that the government is not committed to the prosecution of works not of public and general advantage, and that the relative usefulness of work of this class is not overlooked. Looking to the completion of this work, there is no doubt that the end would be reached if fewer separate works were undertaken, and at the same time those elected for their great general interest were more rapidly pushed to completion. A work once considerably begun should not be subjected to risk and detriment which interrupted or insufficient appropriations necessarily occasion.

In conclusion the president says: "I am an advocate of economy in our national expenditures, but it is a mistake of the term to make this work dependent upon appropriations that withhold the expenditures for the purpose of extending our foreign commerce. The enlargement and the improvement of our merchant marine, the development of a sufficient body of trained American seamen for the promotion of rapid and regular mail communication between the ports of other countries and our own, and the addition of large and swift American merchant steamships upon the naval seas in time of war are public purposes of the highest consideration.

The enlarged participation of our people in the carrying trade, the new and increased markets that will be opened for the products of our farms and factories, the fuller and better employment of our mechanics, which will result from a liberal promotion of our foreign commerce, insure the widest possible diffusion of benefits to all the states and our people. Everything is most productive for the present inauguration of a liberal and progressive policy upon this subject, and we should enter upon it with promptness and decision. The legislation which I have suggested, it is sincerely believed, will promote the peace and honor of our country and the prosperity and security of the people. I invoke the devoted and serious attention of congress to the consideration of these and such other measures as may be presented having the same great end in view.

LOVE AND GRAND LARCENY.
An Alleged Thief Marries the Prosecutor's Daughter in Court.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Dec. 2.—A preliminary trial to-day before a justice's court, in which J. Ortes was charged with grand larceny, had a peculiar and unexpected ending. Defendant was accused by Martin Trainer of stealing his daughter's clothing from his country residence, Ida Trainer, the daughter, aged 17, testified that she had given Ortes the clothing, having intended to elope with him, because her father had refused his consent to their marriage. The trial lasted nearly all day, and ended with the judge dismissing the grand larceny case and pronouncing them husband and wife.

A POLITICAL EVENT.

Gladstone Will Define the Position of the Liberals.

LONDON, Dec. 3.—Next week a great and momentous forward step will be taken in British politics, the influence of which will be felt for years to come. Its crowning feature is to be a speech. One would think, at first blush, that speeches enough had been made already, and that it was an exaggeration to attach great importance to any new oration, from whatever source, but it is true that Tuesday's speech at Manchester will mark a distinct epoch in the history of Great Britain and Ireland.

Gladstone, standing on the threshold of his eighties, is to define the whole position of the Liberal party toward not only Irish home rule, but disestablishment, the abolishing of the House of Lords, electoral reform, ground rent taxation, free education and the entire list of political aspirations which burn here in progressive minds. No such pronouncement has been made since the Home Rule bill was beaten in the summer of 1886.

THURMAN'S DAUGHTER.

After Enjoying Her Divorce a Few Days She Remarries.

SAN DIEGO, Dec. 3.—Marie P. Thurman, daughter of Allen G. Thurman, the late Democratic candidate for the Vice-Presidency, who resumed her maiden name upon the granting to her of a divorce four or five days ago from Lieutenant Cole of the United States navy in the Superior Court of this city, was married this evening at the Catholic church by Rev. Father Ubach to Thomas C. Gifford. After the ceremony an elaborate banquet was served at a leading hotel, to which about thirty intimate friends of the bride and groom were invited. Mr. Gifford is the head of a Customhouse brokerage firm in this city and has lived here for two or three years, being a native of Spain.

A CLEVER THIEF.

How He Secured Four Packages of Bank Bills.

CLEVELAND (O.), Dec. 3.—J. W. Brainerd, messenger of the Commercial National Bank, was to the credit of the bank this morning and was paid \$2800. There were four packages of \$500 each, and the remainder in bills. While he was counting the money a stranger standing by him called his attention to a certain check in the pile. While the messenger was answering the question his eyes for a moment were off the pile of money on the desk before him. When he commenced counting again he discovered the loss of the four packages containing \$2000. The stranger had also disappeared, and there is no clue to his identity beyond the meager description the messenger is able to give.

PROMENADS PROHIBITED.

Army Officers at Vienna Ordered Off the Ringstrasse.

Consternation prevails among the officers of every rank of the Vienna garrison. Recently an order was issued by the General in command of the city and home district, prohibiting officers in uniform from promenading up and down the Ringstrasse, except when on duty. In order to realize what this means it is necessary to explain that the Ringstrasse, like the Fifth Avenue of New York, the Champs Elysees, or rather the Boulevard des Invalides of Paris, and the Pall Mall and the Ladies Mile of London. Regularly every afternoon between the hours of 3 and 5 the whole of Vienna society can be seen sauntering up and down the Ringstrasse, chatting, laughing and with friends and to exchange the gossip of the day. As civilian clothes are not permitted to be worn by officers except on rare special occasions, the number of handsome uniforms was very great and lent much brilliancy to the scene. Indeed, there was not a court beauty or a clubman or an officer who would have considered the day complete without the stroll on the "Ring."

Unfortunately, however, the assemblage was not altogether confined to the "beau monde." The ladies of the "demi-monde" speedily realized the advantages to be obtained by an afternoon appearance on the fashionable promenade, since at no other place or time in the day could the Sons of Mars and the "jeuneuse dorée" be met in such large numbers. Accordingly, all flocked down on the Ring every afternoon, and by their gorgeous display of raiment added still further color and picturesqueness to the gay and merry crowd. To such proportions did the latter grow that the beautiful and spacious thoroughfare—one of the finest in Europe—became almost impassable during the afternoon, and at length attracted the attention of the Emperor, who, since the tragic death of his only son and the sad affliction of his beautiful consort, has become exceedingly strict, both toward himself and those about him, and likewise exceedingly bigoted and even morose. He never laughs or even smiles, and apparently does not like to see other people do so.

At any rate, it is known that he attributes the painful circumstances which attended Crown Prince Rudolph's death to the easy and thoughtless gaiety and the lack of moral stamina which constitute both the charm and defect of Austrian character. His majesty, therefore, came to the conclusion that since the advent like the "demi-monde" the "Ring Parade," as it is called, had become something of a public scandal, and that means must be adopted to put a stop to it. Accordingly he gave the instructions, which were issued in the form of a general order, being convinced that the disappearance of the military uniforms from the scene would deprive it of all further attraction. It is needless to state that the order has given widespread offense to all classes of the population, most of all, of course, to the officers, whose sentiments of discipline and loyalty are put to a severe test thereby.
