RUMORS FROM BRAZIL.

Recent advices from Brazil speak
of reports of trouble in that country
at the time of the change of govern-
ment which will be news to the
world if true. It is asserted that at
one place 150 sailors were impris-
oned and shot for cheering for Dom
Pedro, and that at another place
there had been a fight between the
militia and the imperialists and
that 500 persons had been killed. These
things are said to have taken
place between the 20th and 30th of
last month, and it is claimed that they
were not made known sooner because of the rigid censorship ex-
ercised over the telegraph lines by
the new government.

It is best to receive these rumors
with a considerable degree of cau-
tion. Possibly there may have
been some local disturbances here
or there, but it is hardly credible
that 150 men could have been shot
down in one place and 500 killed
in another and no news of it have
reached the outside world. Such
news will leak out in spite of all
the watchfulness that can be ex-
ercised, for there are always plenty
of vehicles for the transmission of
unfavorable news.

Probably these rumors emanate
from the imperialist faction in
Brazil, whose object is to make the
republic unpopular, and thus pave
the way for the restoration of the
exiled emperor. The imperialists
are not strong enough to venture
upon any overt acts, but if they
can sow the seed of dissension in
the minds of the people they will
be working quite as effectively as
though they stirred up an armed
revolt against the newly born re-
public.

SCIENCE brings out strange
theories and gives the moon almost
as strange and occult powers as do
they weather prophets who look to
the moon for rain and the bean
and potatoe crop. For instance it
is said that some twenty years ago
Herr Falb, an Austrian scientist,
first suggested the possibility that
the moon may act upon the great
ocean of molten matters beneath
the earth's crust exactly as it acts
in producing the tides of the exter-
nal ocean of water. He now con-
siders that the reality of such
action is proven, and that the
earth's crust is severely strained
more or less warped and broken
at the times the theory would in-
dicate. It is during the periods of
greatest strain resulting from the
moon's attraction that earthquakes
appear to be most likely to occur
and the gases seem to be forced
into coal mines to such an extent
as greatly to increase the explo-
sions.

TASTES are said to differ and in
fact they may be matters of cul-
tivation. For instance when Par-
isians were forced to eat horse meat
during the German siege we pitied
them. When it came out that Berlin
had thirty horse meat markets, we rather sneered at their taste.
Put not only have we gotten over
that in this country but in New
York city we have a horse sausage
factory at our own doors, for the
product of which purchasers are
readily found, but Consul Dillon,
of Florence, reports to the State
Department that the Bologna
sausages which we import largely
are also said to be made of horse
meat. There is nothing especially
astounding in this fact, as horse
flesh has been pronounced excel-
lent food, and, if healthy, as
nourishing as beef and pork. It is
more a matter of sentiment and
habit than anything else.
