OVER THE WIRES. Several Important Measures Introduced in Congress.

AN OREGON APPOINTMENT. Disastrous Train Wreck—Oarsman Ditton, Who Was Blown to Sea in an Open Boat, Was Drowned.

THE HERALD'S SPECIAL DISPATCH. WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—In the senate a house joint resolution donating the fixtures, furniture, etc. heretofore belonging to the territorial governments to the states of Washington and Montana, was presented and passed.

Among the bills introduced and referred was one by Hoar to establish a uniform system of bank currency throughout the United States.

Plumb offered a resolution, which was agreed to, calling on the secretary of the interior for a statement of the cause of withholding patents for land within the limits of the Union Pacific land grant, which are all free from claims and not recorded at the date of the definite location of the road.

A senate bill to amend the census act by making the maximum pay of supervisors \$1000 instead of \$500 was taken up, and a letter from Superintendent Porter read, to show the inadequacy of the compensation now provided.

The president has nominated Milton Avedler collector of internal revenue for the district of Oregon.

IN AN OPEN BOAT. Oarsman Ditton Was Run Down by a Steamer and Drowned.

New York, Dec. 21.—A week ago Friday last Dave Ditton, the battery boat man, who was at one time champion oarsman of Australia, disappeared in a boat down the bay.

THREATENED RIOT. Trouble Arising from Elections in Oklahoma.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 21.—The cause of the apprehended riot feared last night was the renewal of the trouble between the Seminole and Kickapoo factions, the latter indulged in threats of lynching some of the Seminole leaders and of burning the building occupied by the Gazette, the organ of the Seminole party.

DISASTROUS TRAIN WRECK. Two Trains Collide—Fireman and Engineer Killed.

LINCOLN, Neb., Dec. 21.—Meagre particulars have arrived of a train wreck at Hastings, 100 miles west of here this morning.

Still After Powderly. SCRANTON, (Pa.), Dec. 21.—Col. Washington, of West Moreland county, arrived in this city this morning with a warrant for the arrest of General Master Workman Powderly.

Affairs in Brazil. LONDON, Dec. 21.—A private dispatch received here from Rio de Janeiro states that Marshal Deodoro Da Fonseca, chief of the provisional government of Brazil, is dying.

Damage Suit Dismissed. LONDON, Dec. 21.—The motion for a new trial in the action for damages brought by William O'Brien against Lord Salisbury for slander has been dismissed.

O'Brien charged Salisbury with making a speech accusing him of inciting murder and arson. The ground on which a new trial was asked was that the jury which returned the verdict for Salisbury was misdirected.

WITH A HORSEWHIP. How a Woman Avenged Her Sister's Wrongs.

NEWARK (N. J.), Dec. 21.—Frank Miller, a young saloon-keeper, was publicly horsewhipped this afternoon by Eva Hayes.

The man seemed paralyzed for a moment, and then realizing the situation, started on a run with the woman in hot pursuit.

TOOK HIS SQUAW. An Indian Shot and Robbed of His Wife.

Chief Joe of the Puyallup reservation, opposite Tacoma, has a squaw who is the belle of the tribe and noted for her beauty.

DESTROYED BY FIRE. The Loss of Valuable Timber in the Northwest Territory.

WINNIPEG (Manitoba), Dec. 21.—A practical lumberman, who has explored the whole northern region, is authority for the statement that the government has lost \$1,000,000 in timber since 1882, through fires set out by Indians.

FIVE BODIES WASHED ASHORE. LONDON, Dec. 21.—The bodies of five of the thirteen persons belonging to the steamer Cleddy, which was sunk off the Isle of Wight yesterday, has been washed ashore.

COMING TO OREGON. The Pacific Coast's Advantages Over the Atlantic.

MOST AGREEABLE CLIMATE. The Willamette Valley Is the Paradise of the Fruit and Grain Grower—Immigrant.

Prof. R. H. Willis of The Dorr Academy in a recent letter—published in the Virginia Orange Observer—says: I see your Texas correspondent showing a letter about the advantages of the "Lone Star State," and it suggests to me to write something about Oregon.

There is now an immense tide of immigration to Oregon and Washington, several thousand per day for some time during the summer, but probably a little less now.

The cold climate of the northern tier of states from Dakota east drives thousands of persons to seek the sunny breezes of the Pacific slope, and really it is hard to find a climate more pleasant than this.

The Pacific coast is not low and swampy, like the Atlantic, but the mountains come right down to the ocean, and hence there is scarcely any malaria.

Oregon is a fine state for grain, fruit, and stock-raising; and a great deal of money is made here from each of these occupations.

There is an immense profit in these lands, when the fruit is produced; and people are now taking advantage of this here and setting out large orchards of peaches and apples.

The same profit can be made in Oregon from the fruit, and in the increased value of the land a far greater profit, because lands in Oregon are so much below California prices.
