ON THE OREGON PACIFIC.

An Additional Plant for Renewed Work in the Spring—Deep Snow.

COE STATION, Dec. 27.

Hennes Bros. have moved into their large new store at this place. The snow is thirteen inches deep here now, and it has been freezing hard.

Dr. G. A. Whitney, the Oregon Pacific surgeon, is erecting hospital buildings at the side-track near the old tunnel.

J. S. Antonelle is removing his plant from his finished work to La Grande, where he has a contract on the Union Pacific road.

Track-laying has been stopped only temporarily on account of the snow, and it is expected that the entire force of tracklayers will go to work again soon after the holidays.

The turn table here is now completed. The depot buildings are also completed. Coe is one mile and half above Breitenbush, and will be one of the chief towns on the road.

There is two feet and a half of snow at the tunnel, and four feet at the upper end of Orman & Crook's work. The snow is so deep on the upper work that P. Brady's force of men, which was to have gone above, will be laid off for the present. Messrs. Orman & Crook have enough heavy work to keep their force busy all winter.

Orman & Crook are now making their main headquarters at Boulder Creek, the extreme end of the track. J. B. Orman has gone to Denver. It is understood that his trip is for the purpose of shipping out an additional plant for renewed work in the early spring. The first five miles of their contract will be finished to-morrow. About 150 tie-makers are at work between Boulder Creek and the abandoned tunnel.

A large and enthusiastic gathering of citizens was held at the court house at Dallas on Thursday to discuss ways and means for co-operating with Albany and Sheridan in building the Albany & Astoria railroad. Judge Stoffer presided over the meeting, and Hon. J. J. Daly, J. F. Groves, R. J. Riley and W. C. Brown were appointed a committee to confer with like committees from other towns. A committee of Dallas citizens, consisting of Messrs. W. C. Brown, John J. Daly, J. F. Groves and R. J. Riley arrived in this city last evening to confer with the Albany and Astoria Railway Co. relative to the question of running the road through Dallas. A meeting will be held this evening when the matter will be discussed.

Last Night's Play.

The presentation of "Ignomina, the Barbarian," by the John S. Lindsay Dramatic Co., was not attended by as large an audience as it should have been. NORTHWEST NOTES.

Snow has fallen to the depth of twelve inches in Grant county, and the thermometer ranged to 8 degrees above zero.

Lebanon has decided to organize a board of trade, and a set of by-laws and constitution will be reported in a few days.

Murderer Blanton in jail at Colfax, is on the high road to become a raving maniac. He is in fear of lynching and every sound startles him.

The U. S. land officers at Burns took in \$13,000 the first three months that the office was in running order. The above figures show the extent of the Eastern Oregon country.

The merry jingle of sleighbells has been heard on the streets during the past week, says the Baker City Blade, but the snow is not plentiful enough yet to afford good sleighing.

The line between Mullen, Idaho, and Missoula, Montana, is being rapidly pushed. When completed it will give the Coeur d'Alene mines direct communication with Montana.

La Grande has succeeded in selling \$20,000 of its bonds for the purpose of providing the city with water works. They sold at par bear six per cent. interest, and run for twenty years.

The Eugene papers are ably seconded by the Junction City Pilot in their demands for new county buildings. The Pilot shows good sense in assisting the proper upbuilding of the county seat.

A yetition has been circulated and numerously signed asking the governor to pardon young Putnam from the county jail, who was committed for 250 days for exhibiting obscene pictures to girls. The petition cites that he is weak mentally, says the Eugene Guard.

Says the Gold Beach Gazette: A sea turtle weighing 80 pounds was captured on the beach, near the Lone Ranche by Dr. Cooper and Geo. S. Harris last week. Three hundred eggs were found in the animal. This is the first turtle we have ever heard of having been found along the Curry county coast.

Says the Oregon Blade: There will be about 7000 head of cattle, 2500 head of horses and 25,000 head of sheep fed in Eagle valley this winter. The valley is very small, but it can furnish more alfalfa and timothy hay than any other spot on earth, and is just as good for fruit and vegetables. There has been 4000 tons of hay sold there this fall.
