THE CITY COUNCIL.

Saloon Licenses Granted—Bridge Contract Awarded and Bills Allowed.

An adjourned meeting of the city council was held last evening, all members present except Councilman Parker.

The committee on streets and public property reported in favor of a petition for a sidewalk on the north side of Sixth street, also on Jackson street and a cross walk, and the walk was ordered done within ten days.

The street commissioner recommended the repair of the sidewalk on Jefferson street, between First and Water streets, which was adopted and the work ordered built.

A crosswalk was ordered built across Main street on the south side of Third street as soon as the joining sidewalk is constructed.

A communication from the 4th of July committee to the effect that sufficient funds had not been collected to meet the bills and requesting the council to assume the indebtedness was referred to the committee on accounts and current expenses.

Saloon licenses were authorized issued to Peter Schlosser, Charles Keifer, H. M. Williams and Max Baumgart.

The contract for building the foot bridge on Eighth and Broadbald streets was awarded to S. W. Reese for \$30, the time for construction being fixed at 30 days.

The Willamette & Calapooia Railroad Incorporated with a Capital Stock of \$100,000.

SALEM, Dec. 30.—Gov. Penoyer in speaking to a reporter today in regard to the appointment of a judge for the 6th judicial district to fill the place made vacant by the death of Judge Ison, said that before making such appointment he desired an expression of opinion from attorneys and other citizens of that district, which, when given, would be treated by him as entirely confidential.

Prof. Melville Gillespie Lane (or Blaine), principal tutor of the Chemawa Indian training school, died this evening, after a short illness. He was a very smart man, and claimed to be a brother of Jas. G. Blaine. He took an active part in the Blaine campaign of 1884.
