Heavy Snow Storm.

A special dispatch from Coe Station, on the eastern extension of the Oregon Pacific railroad, published this morning brings the intelligence that all the forces of men engaged in construction have been compelled to stop work on account of a heavy fall of snow.

A force of 150 tracklayers arrived from the front last night and Dr. man & Crook's men will arrive in a few days. The snow may not delay the work many weeks, and the contractors will leave all their supplies at the front in order to go on with the work as soon as the snow goes off. It is now six feet deep at the front and it is still snowing.

Death of Mrs. Prichard.

Mrs. Clara Prichard, wife of Rev. E. R. Prichard, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, died of pulmonary disease, at her home in this city on Tuesday morning, Dec. 31, 1889, aged 28 years. She was a devoted Christian wife and mother, and leaves besides her husband and two children, a wide circle of friends who mourn her untimely death. She was the eldest daughter of Rev. E. J. Thompson, D. D., of Corvallis. She was born in Shorran, Vermont on Nov. 15, 1861. She removed with her parents to Minnesota, residing in the northern portion of the state. Later her parents removed to Minneapolis, where she united with the Andrew Presbyterian church at the early age of 13. A year or two later, though really an invalid, she began studying in the state university and persevered in this work until in the junior class, when by the doctor's advice, her parents removed with her to Castleton, North Dakota. There she married Rev. E. R. Prichard on Dec. 27, 1881. After trying this climate for four years, she, her husband and little George came to Salem, Oregon, where they remained until May, 1886, when Rev. Mr. Prichard was called to the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church in this city.

DAIVEN IN BY SNOW.

Constructors on the Oregon Pacific Compelled to Quit Work for the Present.

Special to the Herald.—On account of heavy snow storms all work has been suspended on the Oregon Pacific for the present. Orman & Crook are breaking their camps and the track laying force, under Superintendent G. V. Stevens, left for Albany to-day. A heavy snow storm has been raging since Sunday noon, and still continues. Messrs. Orman & Crook did not propose to quit work on account of any light snow, but there is now three feet of snow at the end of the track, and six feet on their work, and they have been compelled to stop. They will take their stock to Albany, and leave all their supplies at their camps to resume work as soon as the snow goes off. A heavy engine and a snow plow is expected from Yaguma to open the track to take out their men and stock.

The engineers of the Oregon Pacific and all the men employed in the work of construction will arrive in Albany within a few days. The snow does not extend further west than Mill City, but at the extreme front the scene is most wintry, and the contractors have exercised good judgment in withdrawing their men until the snow goes off, as at present every indication points to a deep snow fall.

J. B. Maher, who went up to remove the outfit of Antonelle & Doe, was compelled to leave it in three feet of snow at Boulder Creek.

The force of bridge men, under Superintendent E. J. Miller, are at Boulder Creek, awaiting the engine and snow plow to take them out. All the men have plenty of provisions and the camps are supplied with good horses, so that they will not suffer.
