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OVER THE WIRES.

The Cold Wave Continues Throughout the Northwest.

ICE BLOCKING THE COLUMBIA

News from the R. R. and from the Old Work—How-Plows Busy in California.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.

PORTLAND, Jan. 3.—Reports from various points throughout the Northwest show that the cold wave is general.

There is about six inches of snow in Portland, and it is freezing hard. The storm seemed to center about the mouth of the Columbia river.

The river at and below the mouth of the Willamette is blocked with ice, and vessels cannot ply on the river.

The crisp air resounds with the sound of sleigh-bells throughout the city. It is feared there will be a general ice blockade up and down the Columbia.

AMERICAN VESSELS SEIZED.

Three Trading Schooners Detained by the Colombian Government.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Assistant Secretary of State Nathan was today questioned in regard to the authorized seizure and detention by officials of the government of the United States of Columbia of three trading schooners belonging to New York merchants.

Wharton says that some days ago a letter was received at the state department from Foster & Co., complaining of the detention of one of their schooners. The department immediately telegraphed the American consul at Carthagena for an explanation, and in reply received a message stating that was necessary for trading vessels to clear from the port of Carthagena.

The situation is not fully understood, owing partly to the brevity and haziness of the consul's message. The case will not be fully known nor any official action taken, until the consul's dispatches in full, which are in all probability on their way now, are received at the department.

SNOW-PLAWS VERY BUSY.

Great Storm Along the Central Pacific—California Roads Open.

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 2.—The snow-plows of the Central Pacific railroad company had to be called into use last night, owing to the great storm. The storm raged at all points along the line, and nearly all passenger trains are delayed. Early this morning rain commenced falling and has continued steadily all day.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2.—The trains on all lines entering the city were behind time today. The last Central Pacific overland was five hours late, the slow overland was two hours, and the Oregon train three hours late on account of the storm. The Southern Pacific train from Mojave was an hour late.

SAN DIEGO, Jan. 2.—The first train in seven days from Los Angeles arrived this morning. The bridge at Riveria has been repaired, and trains will run regularly after tomorrow.

A TRIBUTE TO GLADSTONE.

Sentiments Expressed by Prominent Americans.

BUFFALO, Jan. 2.—For several months John G. McElree has been securing photographs of statesmen in sympathy with home rule for Ireland, to be presented to President Gladstone on the occasion of the English statesman's eightieth birthday. Delays have occurred and the book, which is a large volume, will be sent to England to-morrow.

Harrison, Vice-President Morton, several Cabinet officers, half of the United States Senators and most of the Congressmen signed the book when it was presented to them.

The closing inscription in the volume is written by Chauncey M. Depew, who, under date of December 27th, indites this sentiment: "Mr. Gladstone holds a place in the veneration and affection of the American people never occupied by any other European except Lafayette. His attitude upon the Irish question receives the almost unanimous approval of our citizens. His half a century of eminent public service is the pride of all English-speaking nations. His successful efforts for the liberty and welfare of mankind are contributions to the peace and prosperity of the peoples of the world which have given him a permanent and conspicuous place in the history of the century."

Senator Ingalls said: "Gladstone is one of those great men who, with the peaceful weapons of truth and justice, has revolutionized the age in which he lives."

A PECULIAR MARRIAGE.

A Spirited California Girl Takes A Man on Six Months Trial.

FRESNO, Jan. 2.—Among the many handsome young ladies who pass into the principal streets of Fresno none are trimmer, neater and prettier than Mary Wilson. She has a splendid form, is above medium height, with large brown eyes, brilliant Auburn hair, elastic step and vivacious manner. She is highly educated, being a clever performer on many musical instruments. Mary is in her twenty-second year. She is the daughter of a late wealthy rancher in Stanislaus county. When her father died he left her \$10,000 in her own name.

This handsome legacy did not make Mary flighty, as it would most girls. She said: "I will keep my property and add to it. I'm not above work."

Mary became an apprentice to a dress-maker Modesto. She was very apt with her needle and soon mastered the trade. About a year ago she came to Fresno and went into partnership in the dressmaking business with Miss Kiernan, a worthy young lady now running a similar establishment in the Griffith building. The firm was Kiernan & Wilson. It did a thriving business.

Her heart at last thawed, and she consented to become Mrs. Campbell for the brief period of six months.

"Joe," said Mary in her most bewitching way, "I will marry you for six months. At the end of that time, if marriage is a failure, we will find it out and we can go our ways."

Without her knowledge a few traces of her blonde hair had escaped from under her bonnet, and had fallen over the shoulder of the man behind her, and had in some unexplained manner become fastened around one of the buttons of his coat. He made no or two delicate attempts to remove the wandering tresses, but was so timid that he only entangled them the more. He sat there with a frightened but meek expression upon his face, not daring to move. A climax was put to his predicament by the young woman's arising or rather attempting to do so, at Fourteenth street. She had only got half way out of her seat when she felt a violent tug at her hair. She resumed her seat and turned around to learn the true situation. A TORTURED BULL'S REVENGE

Mexicans Chilled and Stamped and Brought Down the House.

CITY OF MEXICO, Jan. 2.—Telegrams from Villa Lerdo give particulars of the fall of the plaza Tuesday while a bull fight was in progress. Ten thousand people were crowded into the building. When the second bull was being killed nearly everybody rose, applauding and stamping.

Suddenly one side of the plaza commenced to give way. A rush followed, which helped to bring about the fall of the structure. The collapse precipitated the inmates to the ground, ten to twenty feet below. Hundreds were buried beneath the debris, among them many ladies of the best families. The crowd in other parts of the building, numbering several thousand, became panic-stricken and fell and trampled on one another.

The bull fighters were also seized with fear and made an exit with the bull closely following. The unfortunate victims were finally released. Many physicians were called and the wounded attended to. The number of wounded will reach into the hundreds, but none were fatally hurt.

Rough Weather on the Atlantic.

New York, Jan. 2.—Captain Lord, of the British steamer Corona, which arrived to-day from Middleboro says: "We experienced the roughest weather I have ever known. Up to December 17th we had a succession of furious gales. The ship was blown off the trough of the sea, although going at full speed, and became unmanageable. We stopped the engines and used a plentiful supply of oil, which materially aided in breaking 'the crests of the waves. However, we shipped one fearful sea which carried everything before it, smashing one boat and damaging the others, washing away part of the flying bridge and injuring several of the crew. The engineer says that part of this sea fell down the funnel, the top of which is fifty-three feet above water. The water came rushing through the tubes in such volume as nearly to put the fires out, and caused great commotion among the men below. On the 18th it blew a heavy gale, and on the 19th the wind again attained the force of a hurricane. During the night we shipped a tremendous sea over the bows. It swept away everything in its way, carrying the wreckage from the main deck over the bridge, about twenty-five feet high, and finally making its exit over the stern."

THE NATIONAL GUARDIANS.

The National Guard Association to Hold a Convention.

WASHINGTON, December 41.—The National Guard Association of the United States has called a convention to meet in this city February 5th. The call for the meeting says each State is entitled to be represented by five officers or ex officers of its National Guard, to be selected in such manner as shall be directed by the adjutant-general. The names of all delegates must be forwarded to the corresponding secretary of the association before January 25th. The prime object of the convention is to induce Congress to increase the militia appropriation for next year to \$1,000,000. With this aim in view statistics are presented from each State showing the service performed by the National Guard for the good of society, with the number killed and wounded, if any, during the performance of such service. Each State will also be requested to prepare a schedule of arms and accoutrements required by the militia.

Likes Home Customs Best.

At the Isles of Shoals they tell the tale that a lecturer went thither to lecture to the assembled guests upon the character and characteristics of the Japanese, and in the course of his remarks he dwelt upon the two facts that the self-contained people do not use explosives, profanity being unknown in their land, and that equally are they ignorant of the gaudy fashion of kissing.
