The distinguished foreigners who are in Washington attending the pan-American and other meetings, added brightness and attraction to the New Year's reception at the White House.

No wine was allowed at the Presidential New Year's reception at the White House this year. The cordiality between the President and his distinguished guest was not in the least disturbed by that fact.

CHINA'S control of the tea trade of the world has fallen off since 1864 from 97 per cent. to 43 per cent., while India's has grown in the same period from 3 per cent. to 37 per cent. China seems to be subject to decay.

RICHMOND, Atlanta, Montgomery and New Orleans each press their claims for the honor of being the final resting place of Jefferson Davis's remains, upon his widow with such pertinacity and cogent reasons, that Mrs. Davis cannot decide between them and has decided to postpone her decision for one year.

SAN FRANCISCO plumbers seem to be extremely curious in the matter of making finds. One recently on the roof of a house found a human leg. Investigation developed the fact that it formerly belonged to the anatomy of a workman who had been blown up at a boiler explosion, three months before several blocks away. What could be found of him was buried at the time, but this leg was minus.

The Chicago News claims to have made the startling discovery that Kate Field's Washington paper is edited by a man. That is a most wonderful discovery and the News claims great credit for it, which it should have of course, until the wonderful piece of news is proven to be false, which it undoubtedly will. Kate is capable of editing any paper, even to as great a one as the astute Chicago News, which thinks she isn't.

THERE seems to be a diminution of foreign immigration to this country, which will be looked upon with favor. It is said that the immigration to this country during the past year fell off more than 150,000 from the previous year, but the Castle Garden authorities report that it was of far better character. This is what the country wants for the years which saw the greatest influx of foreigners were also marked by the addition of a large number of paupers and imbeciles to our population. The checks to this undesirable class are proving effective, and the prospect is that the nations of the Old World will soon abandon the plan of attempting to make us support their pauper and criminal classes.

EX CONGRESS-MAN MONEY of Mississippi, has a very poor opinion of physical toil, in fact decidedly objects to it. To a group of southerners who were gathered at Washington he recently expressed himself as follows: "I hate work. I think that men who like work for its own sake are either freaks or myths. I don't think any normal man works unless he has to. A man may be of a nervous temperament and so content that he is not happy unless he is working; but a man of sound mind and even disposition works for the comforts and the luxuries which work

will give for him in his leisure hours. My idea of a man's happiness is to be able to do a big job, and read novels. This is what I will do when I get money enough to retire from work. And I will never live again in a country where they have no books, either." Probably quite a proportion of the nominally well-to-do with the honorable work-shaker, but they are not by far the happiest portion of that same human family. Eating peaches and reading novels will do you on the appetite sooner or later.

SECRETARY WINDOM has concluded to accept bids for the privilege of fishing the seal fisheries of Alaska, and the plan is likely to bring out a lively competition from rival companies. The Chronicle thinks it is probable that the only practical way for the United States to derive a profit from the fur-sealing industry is to let the exclusive privilege, under certain specified conditions and restriction; but it is much better that there should be an active competition for the privilege than that any person or corporation should come to believe that it could hold the lease in perpetuity. Secretary Windom has taken a wise course, and the privilege, under the competition which will ensue, will bring all that it is worth. It will be very valuable, even under the new regulations of the Treasury Department, and the bids may be expected to run into high figures.

CHICAGO has taken a long step toward by appointing five ladies upon their sanitary police force, whose duties are to look after the sanitary arrangements of the factories where women are employed. Their work will probably accomplish great good for the working women and for the general health and welfare of the city. The greater the scope given to woman's work the better society becomes and the increase of mortality follows.

A DECIDED movement among the colored population of South Carolina points to the purpose of removing the colored people from Barnwell and such counties as do not accord them a good treatment, and concentrating it in counties where their rights and welfare are better looked after. The result may lead to some complications in the labor market.
