STATE DISPATCHES.

Governor Penoyer Calls a Convention of Assessors to Meet in Portland. Special to the Herald.

SALEM, Jan. 9.—Governor Penoyer to-day issued a circular to the various county assessors of Oregon respecting the holding of a convention of assessors of the state for the purpose of securing, if possible, a more uniform and equitable assessment of property throughout the state.

Sent a Letter to His Brother. A dispatch from Washington City concerning the death of the late Professor Lane says: "According to Dr. Dorchester, superintendent of Indian schools, who recently returned from a visit to Oregon, Lane always claimed to be a brother of James G. Blaine. He had entrusted Dr. Dorchester with a message to his brother, the secretary of state, which the superintendent had promised to, and did deliver. The truth of the story is vouched for by officials of the Indian bureau."

Tendered His Resignation. It is understood that A. A. Schenck, divisional engineer of the Oregon Pacific railroad, has tendered his resignation. He has recently made about \$100,000 by investments in real estate in Astoria and will now look after his interests down by the sea.

CITY ELECTION AT LEBANON. LEBANON, Jan. 8, 1890. Considerable interest was shown in the city election here last Monday. There were two tickets in the field—the Citizen's Ticket and the People's Ticket. The entire citizen's ticket was elected except J. A. Beard, who was defeated for chairman of the council by fourteen votes.

Following are the officers elected and their majorities: For mayor—David Andrews, 14. For councilmen—W. B. Donica, 44. J. S. Courtney, 42. J. J. Swan, 98. C. C. Hackleman, 98.

For recorder—W. C. Peterson, 1. For marshal—F. M. Miller, 81. For treasurer—A. J. Roberts, 99. J. J. Swan, C. C. Hackleman, F. M. Miller and A. J. Roberts were on both tickets. There were 102 votes polled. Some forty who were entitled to votes did not vote, making the voting population of about 150, an increase of over fifty over last year's vote.

They had to wade through the snow from Coe Station to Gates, a distance of 18 miles.

The suit was brought by M. V. Bilyeu and others, who had been working the mine against Dr. E. O. Smith. The plaintiffs won the suit in the lower courts. The case was argued and submitted in the supreme court yesterday.

The Weather Moderating. The U. S. signal service weather indication for to-day is rain, warmer. It froze again last night, but it seems fair to believe that the backbone of the "cold spell" is broken. Steamboats, who were beginning to realize what it is to be caught in the ice on the river, and Oregonians generally, will gladly welcome a warm rain.
