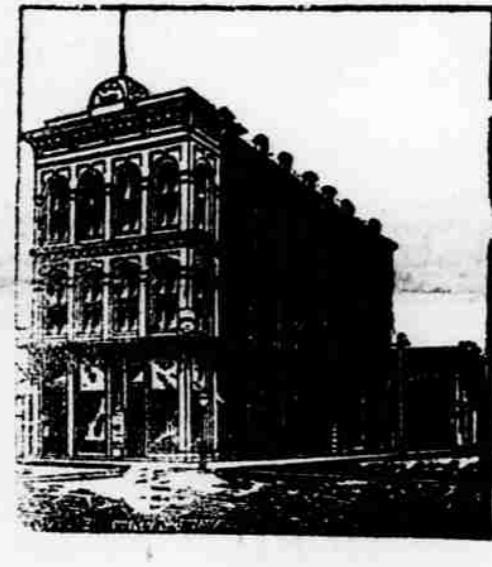

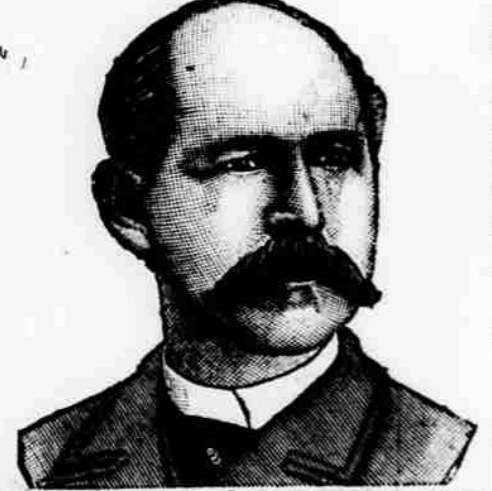

BRICE IS ELECTED.

An Uproar in the Ohio Legislative Hall.

SEVERAL OREGON OFFICES. Thirty Thousand School Children Suffering from Influenza in Chicago--Stanley Meets His Friends at Cairo.

THE HERALD'S SPECIAL DISPATCHES.] COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 14.--Calvin S. Brice was today at noon elected to the United States Senate, receiving a majority of votes in either branch of the legislature. In the senate Shaw, of Lima district, nominated Brice, and Gaumen, of Zanesville, seconded the nomination. Schneider, of Cincinnati, nominated Mura; Halstead, and Massie, of Chillicothe, nominated ex-Gov. Foster. The vote in the senate stood: Halstead 14, Foster 14 and Brice 19. In the house a roll call was demanded to bring in the members. Hancock, who is sick, was carried to the hall in a chair. The only other democrats absent were Troeger of Holmes, and Lawler of Franklin, who is ill. Willis and Blair, republicans, were absent. Hunt, of Sandusky, presented the name of Calvin S. Brice, which was seconded by Badville, of Montgomery. Representative Branin named Charles Foster, who was seconded by Representative Lawtin. On roll call the result of the vote for Brice was received with cheers. Pennell, a strong Brice man and worker, voted for Foster by mistake, and before he could make a correction the house was in an uproar, and threats were made that the hall would have to be cleared unless order was maintained. The vote in the house stood: Brice 57, Foster 52 and Neal 1. Brice was declared the choice of the house, having received a majority of all the votes. The result will be canvassed by the senate and house in joint session to-morrow. The joint result of the two branches is: Brice 76, Foster 66, Halstead 1 and Neal 1.

WASHINGTON NEWS. Several Oregon Appointments Made by President Harrison.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.--The president to-day made the following nominations: Henry J. Heffner, surveyor of customs at Denver; Edward P. Danforth, naval officer of customs in the district of California; William H. Sears, first district of California; Christopher Manner, first district of Illinois. Collectors of customs: Frank A. Stewart, southern district of Oregon (Cous by); Edward A. Taylor, district of Oregon (Astoria). Receivers of public moneys: A. J. Wiley, Humboldt; Otis Perrin, Stockton, Cal.; Charles U. Snider, Lakeview, Oregon. Registers of land offices: Ozra Bowen, of Vancouver, Wa. Indian agents: Egber Nashields at the Lemhi agency, Idaho; Frank E. Sequero at the Pueblo agency, New Mexico.

STATE DISPATCHES. The State Is Out of Cash--Supreme Court Cases.

SALEM, Jan. 14.--In the supreme court to-day, in suit of Penumbra Kelly, sheriff of Multnomah county, app., vs. Multnomah county, resp., judgment reversed and cause remanded to lower court with directions to overrule said demand, and for such further proceedings as may be proper. Opinion by Strahan, J.

Edgar Poppleton, app., vs. Yamhill county, resp., appealed from Yamhill county; argued and submitted.

The state treasurer has just begun to indorse warrants on the general fund for want of funds, and will so continue until the taxes begin to come in from the several counties, which will be in about two months. The banks of the city have been in the habit of cashing such warrants at face value, and will beyond doubt do so again.

NO NEW TRIAL GRANTED. The Cronin Murderers Must Suffer Their Punishment.

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.--In Judge McConnell's court this morning the opening argument of the motion of the Cronin murderers for a new trial was begun by Attorney Wing.

Judge McConnell this afternoon granted the motion of John Kunze for a new trial in the Cronin case, but denied the application to the principal defendants, Martin Burke, Daniel Coughlin and Patrick O'Sullivan.

30,000 SCHOOL CHILDREN. This Number Is Suffering from Influenza in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.--This afternoon a paper reports that 30,000 school children of Chicago are suffering from influenza or complications thereof.

Among the Garmen. TORONTO, Jan. 14.--As far as aquatic matters are concerned Joseph Rogers has severed his connection with oarsman O'Connor. Rogers says: "In paying attention to him I have been obliged to neglect my own work,

and my business is rapidly increasing." In reference to Hanlan's remark that he would yet win the championship, Rogers said: "I don't think that he would have any chance against O'Connor. Hanlan is a great oarsman, but a greater man than he has aspired in the person of William O'Connor."

STANLEY AND PARTY. They Arrive at Cairo and Are Greeted by Their Friends.

CAIRO, Jan. 14.--Henry M. Stanley and his party did not stop over at Suez, as it was reported they would, but proceeded for this city, where they arrived this morning. They were greeted upon their arrival by General Greenfelt, commander of the Egyptian troops, and Barring, British consul general.

TALK WITH A BRAZILIAN. Captain Maurity Returning to the New Republic--Rubber at Para.

Captain Joaquim Maurity, of the Brazilian Navy, arrived in New York from Washington, where he had been attending the Marine Conference. He was formerly commander of the Aquidauan, the largest vessel of the Brazilian fleet. He is on his way to Brazil, and sailed for Rio on the steamer Allianca. In speaking with a Tribune reporter, he said that the Brazilian Navy had sixty ships in all. Six of these were ironclads of the latest pattern. "We are building in Rio now," he added, "a large man-of-war, with power and speed which will make it equal of any boat. We have also ordered two boats in England which will have a speed of twenty knots an hour. Brazil is, however, able to build any boats necessary for the navy in her yards."

In speaking of the revolution, the captain said that Baron Ladario, the ex-Minister of Marine, was one of the severest men in the service, and capable of almost any action. "It was a surprise," he said, "that the Emperor renounced his allowance after accepting it. But I do not believe that it was due to the influence of the house of Braganza in Brazil. The men who moved Dom Pedro to this action were, I think, the Ministers who accompanied him on his journey to Lisbon. Through such a course only could they hope to regain influence at home. Chancellor Redman, of the Brazilian Consulate, when asked what truth there was in the dispatch that Brazil would expel the Russian envoy because Russia refused to recognize the new Republic, said that such a statement was pure nonsense. "Why, it is absurd," he added, because no country save Switzerland, has acknowledged Brazil as a Republic. What would be done if the other Ministers acceded at Rio?"

A dispatch from Para said that the receipts of rubber in Para would be 2,000 tons as against 2,900 tons for the corresponding month last year. W. R. Grace & Co. also received a dispatch saying that exchange was at 25 1/2.

FOUND DEAD IN HIS CABIN. Harvey Padgett's Death on the Lower Stuslaw River.

WALTON, Laue Co., Jan. 10. As the mail carrier was passing Padgett's last Tuesday a week ago the latter requested him to bring him some tobacco, as the young man came back in the evening he hallooed but receiving no reply he put the tobacco under the fence and went on, supposing him to be out on the place somewhere. As he went past again the next Friday with the mail he noticed the tobacco yet under the fence and thought it strange that it had not been found, and resolved to make the trip as quick as he could and search for the old man as he came back in the evening. But before he got back he met a man that had been to Padgett's and found him dead in his chair with a newspaper in his hand and glasses in position showing that he had been reading when his light went out on the last day of 1889.

Padgett was 58 years old and was born in New York, he was a sailor by profession; was large and strong in manners, always taking the law in his own hands to punish an offence, and was wont to the offender. He was a bachelor but his love for little children was remarkable, as was his kindness to dumb animals, he was very generous, kind in distress and all things considered was a very good man.

ELEVATOR BURNED. Loss \$600,000--Steamers Near by Take Fire, With Loss of Life.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 13.--The grain elevator known as Northern Central elevator No. 3, with a capacity of 750,000 bushels, the property of the Baltimore Elevator Company, was burned to-night. The elevator was worth \$300,000, and the loss on corn which the elevator contains is \$280,000. The corn was owned by individual shippers and was fully insured.

The British steamship Sacarabaco, lying near the wharf, was entirely destroyed by flames from the burning elevator. The British steamers Northern and Rio had their masts and rigging and some of their upper work destroyed. Three of the crew of the Sacarabaco are missing and it is believed they were burned to death. Four others were seriously burned. The sailors aboard the Sacarabaco had no choice but to jump into the water and swim for their lives. Some, whose cries were heard, were picked up after being in the water two hours.

CANADIAN UNION.

Growing Sentiment Favoring Annexation with United States

CANADA'S POLITICAL DESTINY. It is Believed that the Iwedge Has Been Entered Which Will Sever Her Government from Great Britain

In the extremely conservative town of Windsor, in the Canadian province of Ontario, an out-and-out annexationist has been elected Mayor. This is the first signal victory achieved by those who are advocating closer trade and political relations with the United States, and there is great rejoicing among them. Many of the Canadians believe this to be the beginning of the end as regards the ultimate political destiny of Canada. They conceive that the thin end of the wedge has been inserted and that a complete severance of Canada from Great Britain is sure to follow.

It cannot be denied that every interest of Canada would be subserved by annexation to add incorporation with the United States. Canada, as regards Great Britain, is only a stepchild at best, and the bond of affection, if it ever existed, was worn out long ago. The British Government regards Canada only as a source of a very doubtful income, and the ruling classes in England think of her only as a convenient place for the shipment of younger sons and the black sheep of the flock who can find nothing to do in England, or who have made themselves more notorious than respected. Canada pays Great Britain a great deal of money each year for the purpose of maintaining that shadow of royalty known as a Governor-General, and all that the Governor-General does, usually, is to regard himself as in honorable exile and to long for the time when he can return to England.

Whenever Canada gets ready to come into the American Union she will find the road smoothed and made easy for her, but that is all. The United States will not move a finger to accomplish the separation of Canada from Great Britain nor to induce her accession to the Union. Should Canada choose to set up an independent Government she will be just as safe from any assault by the United States as though she had the combined armies and navies of Europe behind her. If she wants to become a part of the American republic she will be heartily welcome, if not she will not be interfered with by the United States in any way; and that is the whole question of the so-called annexation of Canada in a nutshell.

ANOTHER STORM. Fall of Snow in California Delaying Trains and Damaging to Stock.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.--Snow at Sissons has delayed the Oregon train, and it is not known when it will arrive.

IN AND ABOUT YREKA. YREKA, Cal., Jan. 13.--A snow storm of twenty-four hours ending last night, covered the ground with eighteen inches of snow. This is the heaviest snow storm ever known in Yreka. Great loss is anticipated to stock in the surrounding country. These short of hay are getting supplies from Sacramento valley. Snow on buildings in town is being shoveled off to guard against danger, as the old and new snow makes a heavy burden.

THE STORM IN GRASS VALLEY. GRASS VALLEY, Cal., Jan. 13.--There was a heavy storm of snow and sleet, rain and wind yesterday. From eight to fifteen inches of snow falling and drifting. The narrow gauge railroad is tied up at Buena Vista.

This morning, at Conway's a large lumber shed succumbed to the weight of snow; loss one thousand dollars. A shed at Murphy's lumber yard fell down; loss \$200. A shed at the gas works fell, wrecking a luggy; loss \$250. A number of other light buildings, porches and sheds are damaged.

The south Yuba canal, supplying water to mines for power, is almost frozen up, and in consequence six hundred miners are idle. Operations at all the principal mines have ceased.

They Were Not Gully. LONDON, Jan. 14.--The motion to commit the managers of the London edition of the New York Herald and Freeman's Journal, of Dublin for contempt of court for publishing certain comments on the O'Shea divorce case, was argued to-day. The motion was dismissed on the ground of informality in the prosecution, but permission was given for a renewal of the motion, if taken within a week.
