REMOVAL.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

It is likely that active work will be done during the coming season in the development of the coal mines of the Santiam region.

THERE is strong talk in Portland of putting a free bridge across the Willamette River. Such a proceeding should have been inaugurated long ago.

P. H. WINSTON of Spokane Falls has been appointed United States District Attorney, and Thomas K. Brown of Tacoma, marshal for the new state of Washington.

A HORSE and a man were the victims of the deadly electric light wires in New York yesterday. The rain had saturated the insulating coating of the wire until it was practical useless as an insulator.

SECRETARY WINDOM'S silver bullion bill, will soon be placed before congress. The discretionary provisions of the bill are carefully drawn, and limit the powers of the secretary more than was originally proposed. He is distinctly forbidden to buy silver bullion when the value of the silver in a standard dollar in open market is more than one dollar. He is only permitted to suspend purchase when he is satisfied that an artificial and fictitious price has been created for silver by a ring or combination.

It seems certain that many thousands of dollars worth of stock will perish in the Northwest as a result of the prolonged severe weather. The largest ranches of Klamath county, Or., and Siskiyou county, Cal., are those of Jesse D. Carr, about Clear lake, and Dorris, of Butte creek valley, Cal. Owing to the unusual dry season of 1889, they put up much less hay than usual from their meadowland, and the deep snows of this winter will cause them heavy losses. It is reported by the Ashland Tidings that Carr has turned out about 5000 head, and Dorris about 4000 head of cattle to shift for themselves in the deep snow—live on browse if they can, or die if they must. They each have some hay at their ranches, of course, but will need it all to winter their improved Shortorns and other valuable stock. Carr, Dorris and some other ranchers are offering to give half the cattle wintered through to any one who will feed them.

In the astronomical field of research it has been a custom to give credence to what is known as the star of Bethlehem, which was calculated to have an orbit requiring a period of 312 years to complete. Recently a Vienna report said that the star is to be visible again this year. But Prof. Fickering of Harvard University says that the report is probably an unauthorized revival of the old rumor that this star, erroneously called the Star of Bethlehem, was to make its appearance, but as the statement has been made several times since 1878, when the star was looked for by some astronomers, there is doubtless nothing in it. The star referred to was one discovered by Tycho Brahe in 1572, and was named for him. It appeared quite suddenly in the constellation of Cassiopeia and had a brilliancy greater than that of any of the planets, so much so that it was visible in the daytime for several seconds. It appeared in the same position 312 years before, or in 1260, and assuming this interval of appearance to be correct, it would have been visible about the time of the Christian era, and it was thus termed the "Star of Bethle-

hem." The 312 years' time of its reappearance would have been in 1884, but nothing has yet been seen of it, although many observers watched for it at that time. Such a phenomenon at the present day would have the highest value to astronomical science.

FROM AGRICULTURE TO MINING.

The mining interests throughout the entire Northwest are increasing even in the agricultural districts, or those which have been considered such, the Rocky Mountain Husbandman says of White Sulphur Spring and Meagher county, Montana what is true in many portions of Oregon: Steadily the mining interests of the county are increasing. Ten years ago Meagher was designated as the cow county which cognomen clings to it to this day, its chief interest at the time of christening being leaf and wool. And even five years ago our people were devoting their energies almost exclusively to rural pursuits. But a marked change is now becoming apparent. The town which was once supported by its live stock and wool is now largely supported by the mines, our town's people and valley residents are becoming mine owners. The stock and wool interest is not depreciating, but the valley has about reached its capacity under the present modes of husbandry, and our people are investing in mines, and the town which was purely a rural town in the beginning, is fast becoming a mining center, and while our flocks and herds continue to flourish and broad meadows and grain fields stretch out over our bench lands, the wealth of these everlasting mountains that hedge us around, are being unearthed and are assuming quite as important a feature of our commonwealth as the industry on which the town was founded.
