THE DAY IN CONGRESS.

The Supervisors of the Census for Oregon  
Appointed by President Harrison—A  
Young Girl Murdered.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 23.—Adam  
Forepaugh, the veteran circus  
manager, died late last night at his  
residence in this city. A week or  
two ago he was attacked with in-  
fluenza, which three or four days  
ago developed into pneumonia.  
Forepaugh amassed a fortune in  
the show business, which will go  
to his wife and son.

THE DAY IN CONGRESS.

The Supervisor of the Census for  
Oregon Appointed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Mr. Vest  
presented the credentials of W. A.  
Clarke and Martin Maginnis, as  
senators elect from the state of  
Montana. They were read and re-  
ferred, on Vest's motion, to the  
committee on privileges and elec-  
tions.

On his motion, also, four  
gentlemen, claiming to be senators  
elect, were admitted. Pending the  
contest of the privileges of the four  
the bill appropriating \$500,000 for  
the work at the mouth of the  
Columbia river was passed. As 2  
o'clock approached Ingalls rose to  
address the senate in opposition to  
Senator Butler's bill to encourage  
the emigration of colored people  
from the Southern states.

C. P. Huntington, vice-president  
of the Southern Pacific, appeared  
before the house committee on Pa-  
cific railroads and favored the ex-  
tension of time for the settlement  
of the indebtedness of the Central  
Pacific Railroad Co. and a reduc-  
tion of the interest to be paid the  
government as proposed in the  
Vandever bill. Huntington was  
asked and replied to many ques-  
tions by members of the com-  
mittee.

The house committee on the  
world's fair to-day discussed the  
subject and referred it to a sub-  
committee already appointed.  
Two propositions, one presented  
by Frank, of Missouri, providing  
for the commemoration of the lan-  
ding of Columbus in 1892 and the fair  
the following year, and another by  
Springer, of Illinois, proposing that  
the house proceed to select a site  
for the fair by ballot Monday. The  
sub-committee, which consisted of  
Chandler, Flower and Hitt, was in-  
creased by the addition of  
Weltho, of West Virginia, and  
Frank, of Missouri.

The president to-day made the  
following nominations: To be  
supervisors of census—Nevada,  
George J. Lammon; Oregon, John  
H. Shupe, first, J. W. Strange, second;  
Washington, Will D. Men-  
kies; New Mexico, Horatio W.  
Todd; Utah, Amos L. Condon.

A MURDEROUS VILLAIN.

He Shoots a Young Girl Who Re-  
pulsed His Lulais.

DENVER, Jan. 23.—For over a  
year and a half Bob Scott, a cook  
in a Champa street restaurant, has  
been annoying Nellie Ryan, a  
beautiful waitress of 18 years, with  
his attentions. Two days ago  
Scott insulted the girl. She re-  
ported him to the proprietor, who  
discharged him. Scott swore he  
would be revenged, and as the girl  
and her sister were going to the res-  
taurant early this morning to begin  
the day's work, Scott suddenly  
slipped from a doorway on the cor-  
ner of Fourteenth and Champa  
streets and fired a ball at the girl's  
breast. A corset stay caused the  
ball to glance, when she started to  
run. The murderer pursued her  
and fired two balls into her back,  
one passing through her heart,  
causing instant death. A crowd  
surrounded them, but Scott stood  
them off with his revolver and  
made his escape. The entire po-  
lice force and a posse of citizens  
are searching for him, and if cap-  
tured he will probably never live  
to stand a trial.

CITY OF MEXICO, Jan. 23.—The  
influenza is increasing and develop-

Columbus, Ohio.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 23.—A  
joint convention of the Knights of  
Labor and Progressive Union of  
Miners met this morning. Roe of  
the Knights of Labor was elected  
temporary president and John  
McBride of the other organization  
vice-president. The balance of the  
other temporary officers were di-  
vided.

business reported that no resolu-  
tion of consolidation will be con-  
sidered or adopted unless it re-  
ceives a three-fourths majority  
vote of each organization. The dis-
