THE SEALING CONTRACT LET. For Taking Seals Upon Islands in Alaskan Waters.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Secretary Windom has decided that a lease be made with the North American Commercial Company of New York and San Francisco, J. Liebes, president, for the exclusive privilege of taking fur seals upon the islands of St. Paul and St. George, Alaska, for 20 years from May 1. This company made three proposals for the privilege. The one accepted by the secretary is known as bid No. 2, and differs from the other two in being an offer without conditions. Among other things the company agrees as far as may be practical to do consistent with their interests, to encourage the drying, dyeing and marketing of seal skins within the United States. The annual revenue to the government under the lease on a basis of 100,000 seal skins annually, will be about \$1,000,000 as against about \$300,000 under the present lease to the Alaska Commercial Co.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Brown Washington, a negro who raped and murdered the 9-year-old niece of Alfred Horton, confessed the crime before the coroner's jury yesterday. Last night he was taken from the jail by a mob and lynched.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—An amendment was proposed by Senator McPherson today to have the bill increase the naval establishment of battleships being built there for coast and harbor defense vessels of the motor type, having not more than eighteen feet draft, with twin screws and sea speed of not less than seven knots, the cost of the vessel and armament not to exceed \$250,000 each.

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RAILROAD BUILDING IN 1890. More Than Five Thousand Miles in Process of Construction.

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—The Engineering News this week says: The work of railway extension the coming season promise to be greater than during and year since 1887. At the present time in the United States there are 5038 miles in process of construction, 7074 miles surveyed and 2831 miles projected, making a total of 14,910 miles. In Canada the figures are: In construction 914, surveys 438, projected 215, total 1567 miles. Principal enterprises under way are in the South and Southwest, on the coal roads of Pennsylvania and Ohio, and in Montana and Washington. Almost all the lines in prospect are rather short and generally furthered to develop comparatively local interests. There is practically no paralleling.

MRS. OLIPHANT'S NEW PLOT. Endeavored to Delude Her Father Into Signing Away His Property. CHICAGO, Feb. 27.—Amos Liveredge, aged 70, has won \$14,000 from his children, after having against their wishes married a beautiful young English woman, Mrs. Eliza Mayber. Liveredge claimed that when his children, Joseph Liveredge, Mrs. Louisa Oliphant, the authoress, and Mrs. Emma West, learned that he had become engaged to Mrs. Mayber, whom he met while traveling in England, they hoodwinked him into deeding his property to them, pretending it was a will he was signing.

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MURDERED HIS WIFE TO OBTAIN THE INSURANCE MONEY.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 28.—Charles Vail was arrested by Sheriff Schneider, of Charles County, recently on the charge of shooting and killing his young wife in order to obtain some \$20,000 accident insurance money. He was taken to St. Charles. Vail is a shipping clerk and six months ago married Miss Fannie Slatery. He did not like her and contented himself with supporting her. Since the marriage he took her \$20,000 on her life, \$5,000 of which he secured two days before her death. This policy was good for only three days. A week ago Monday he visited his wife at her mother's home, in Missouri, St. Charles County. She started to accompany him to a train, and while he was assisting her in a carriage a pistol-shot was heard and Mrs. Vail fell mortally wounded. He said it was an accident; that the revolver was in his outside overcoat pocket and struck the wheel. The woman died in a few hours and the next day Vail notified the insurance companies. Suspicion was aroused and detectives have completed a strong chain of circumstantial evidence against the husband. The body will be exhumed and a searching investigation made. It is said that Vail has set fire to several buildings, which he has owned at various times, in order to get the insurance on them.

How the Courts Help Him to Squeeze the People. SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 27.—It was reported in commercial circles today that Claus Spreckles had refused to sell sugar to L. Sarani & Co., candy-makers, because the latter formerly patronized the American Sugar Refinery, which was recently closed down. Sarani when seen stated that the California refinery had refused to sell to him, but had assigned no reason therefor, though his credit was good. In order to keep his employment at work he had been purchasing sugar through brokers, often paying as much as two and one-half cents more per pound on this account.

At a meeting today of the directors of the Retail Grocers' Protective Union, resolutions were adopted stating that "whereas, some 500 men have been thrown out of employment by closing a refinery; and whereas, there exists a scarcity in the sugar market, the California refinery being either unable or unwilling to supply the demand, the directors protest against the closing of the American refinery by the superior court, as unnecessary for the furtherance of justice or the legitimate purposes of law. They ask that the refinery be reopened for business."

Twenty-five Thousand Laborers Unemployed. SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 27.—Seventy hundred unemployed workmen decided at a meeting today to hold a monster parade on some day yet to be chosen. The object of their parade will be to show that their necessities have not been exaggerated, and especially to prove the truth of their claim that there are no less than 25,000 laboring men out of employment in San Francisco.

THE PANAMA CANAL. A Dubious Opinion Among Engineers Sent to Inspect the Work. CHICAGO, Feb. 28.—M. C. Crumlin, Cousin and Lagout and Chatenet, French engineers, have arrived in this city from San Francisco, and will sail for New York for France on Saturday. Upon their decision rests the question of whether or not the Panama Canal will ever be finished by French enterprises. M. Crumlin, who is called the president of the quartet, was reserved in talking of their report. "How I tell you about our opinion," he explained, "when it interests France? If I stated that we were to make a favorable report, we would have all the shareholders of the canal stock before we reached France. It would be equal to your Mr. Gould telling about railroad deals he had made. The young engineers were so politic as their president. While they did not state positively that the report would be unfavorable their declarations were equivalent to that. M. Lagout said: 'The Panama Canal is a bad deal. So much money has been wasted that I don't believe the enterprise will ever be revived.'"

M. Cousin said: "If the canal is finished I am to be engaged in the work, but I don't think I ever see the Isthmus again. People have not the confidence in the vast amount of money required to finish the work."
