THE MORMON OVERTHROW.

The general comment upon the
situation on the Mormon question,
as established by the recent elec-
tion in Salt Lake, with the excep-
tion of the actual Mormon press,
is that the final fatal blow has
been given to the Mormon hier-
archy, and the death blow given to
polygamy. The Tribune sums it
up by saying that it is impossible
for any one who has not seen for
himself the withering, blighting
effect of Mormon rule in Utah to
appreciate the causes which the
Gentiles of that splendid territory
have for the rejoicings with which
they are celebrating their victory
in Salt Lake City. Utah is a
wonderful country. Its climate is
delightful, its atmosphere deli-
cious, its land as rich as the valley
of the Nile and its mountains
supremely grand. There is scarce-
ly any valuable mineral which
can not be profitably gleaned from
its rocky beds. These noble re-
sources, capable of supporting a
nation, have been held since their
discovery in the tenacious grasp of
the Mormon hierarchy, which has
permitted no development of them
except for its benefit. It has
brought into the territory a com-
pany of 150,000 people, of whom
the vast majority are densely
ignorant foreigners. It has placed
these people upon farms of 160
acres each, people in whom the
actual ownership of a square foot
of soil produces a delirious idea of
wealth, and has assured them that
their new possessions are the gift
of the Mormon God through his
servants, the hierarchy, to whom
in return they owe a tenth of their
earnings and implicit faith and
obedience. With this class of
people to work upon, removed as
they are from all American influ-
ences, it has until recently been
easy for the Saints of the Home
State to control the entire terri-
tory, to annul all such congress-
ional laws as were deemed hostile
to their interests, and through
their territorial legislature effectually
to hold in check the enter-
prises of the Gentiles.

One of the greatest projects of
the world is the bridge across the
English Channel. Plans have been
formulated, and the project de-
clared feasible by civil engineers.
It will span twenty-four miles of
deep sea water, starting from near
Folkestone on the English side and
placing its Continental end at
Ambleuse on the French coast.
piers will number 125 and will be
sold masonry, built in caissons
and floated out to sea and sunk in
their respective places. They will
project 60 feet above low-water
mark, and will each sustain a steel
cylindrical column 120 feet in
height, making a clear elevation
of 180 feet above low water. The
spans will vary in length from
1,500 feet to 3,000, each span rest-
ing on two piers. Over 1,000,000
tons of metal will be needed, and
the cost of construction is esti-
mated at from \$175,000,000 to
\$200,000,000. Ten years of steady
work will be required to complete
this magnificent undertaking.
The political and commercial im-
portance of this channel bridge to
Great Britain and Europe will be
simply beyond conception. Such
a sagacious and eminent authority
as Gladstone has been reported as
saying "that by either bridge or a
tunnel, the peace of Europe would
be assured." This optimistic
opinion may be, perhaps, open to
question, but the historic facts in
its favor, that the commercial
relationships of nations are large-

ly contributory to peace. Of
course a few lines of historical re-
cord will be accorded to this great
work when it is completed, but
not a thousandth part as much
mention as is accorded to the hu-
man butcheries called battlefields,
and yet how much more real im-
portance is conveyed to human
beings by such immense peaceful
achievements.

NEBRASKA farmers petitioned for
a reduction of railway freight rates
upon corn, so that they could be
enabled to market their principal
crop, without absolute loss. The
railroads granted the reduction,
and then the produce speculators
put down the price of corn in ex-
act proportions to the reduction in
freight, which simply establishes
the fact that somebody is bound
to take every cent there is in the
traffic, and let the farmer hold the
empty sack. Sometime the tables
will be turned and the farmer will
say you can buy by paying my
price, instead of as now here are
my products, I must sell, how
much will you give.

SENATOR DOLPH is preparing to
oppose the building of any more
cruisers for the navy, in the inter-
est of his coast defense bill. He
has introduced a resolution, which
was adopted, calling upon the
secretary of the navy to furnish
an estimate of the cost of sending
a cruiser around the world, the
time occupied in the trip to be
three years. Senator Dolph thinks
that he will be able to show that
cruisers cost more and are useless
compared with the system of coast
defenses which his bill contem-
plates.

Chicago, and a new town covering
some 700 acres is to be planned to
engage in the work. They will
not be likely to make food for the
flames when the collision over-
turns the train.
