PORTLAND, Feb. 3.—Manager

Richard Koehler, of the Southern

Pacific railroad company, returned

with a reporter after his arrival,

Koehler said, "We have made

great progress on the temporary

around which the track has been

built. We are now commencing

to put in trestle work and a bridge

every day and in a few days more

our entire operating force will

number 4500.

THE GERMAN ELECTION.

The Second Ballot Results in a Riot

with the Socialists.

BERLIN, March 3.—The returns

have been received from all districts

in which the second ballot for

members were held, with the ex-

ception of twenty-six. These re-

turns together with the returns in

those districts where the election

occurred on the first ballot show

the election of 104 members of the

center party and seventy-four

liberals, sixty-two democrats,

thirty-nine conservatives, eighteen

national liberals and thirty-five

socialists. When the result of the

second ballot was announced at

Dortmund, the socialists engaged

in a riot. When the police at-

tempted to disperse them they

were stoned. The police then

charged on the rioters with drawn

swords and scattered the crowd.

Thirty rioters were arrested.

The Behring Sea Fisheries.

OTTAWA, Ont., March 3.—Can-

adians whose capital is invested

Steele to put canvas on a shed at

Steele's quarters. He objected,

saying that he had not enlisted for

The matter came to the attention

of the War Department and to-day

Secretary Proctor, by direction of

the President, sent an order to

General Ruger remitting the unex-

pected portion of the sentence.

The order says in part: "No

action appears to have been taken

against Lieutenant Steele, whose

breach of discipline was of an

aggravated nature. It is also

grossly improper that he should

have been detailed as Judge-Advo-

cate of the court. The President

does not believe the case to be a

fair illustration of the adminis-

tration of military justice.

CANADA WILL YET BE FREE

A Secret Organization Formed to

Throw Off the British Yoke.

New York, March 1.—A Mon-

tré special says: A league has

been formed here to bring about

the independence of Canada by

1892. All the American powers

are to be asked to exert their moral

influence, and if needs, by con-

certed action to free the country

from the last vestige of European

rule on the Continent. The league

will have united with it all the

liberal clubs in the country.

American universities are to be

invited to co-operate as well as

political bodies that have for their

object the bringing about of the

final triumph of democratic insti-

tutions throughout the world.

The league will be under the

control of a supreme council whose

actions shall be kept secret. This

new departure, coming after the

recent actions of liberal clubs in
