Annual School Meeting Held at the Court House Last Night.

CLERK BURKHART'S REPORT.

Tax-Payers Will Be in Good Humor, as No Tax Levy Is Required—The School's Prosperous Condition.

The regular annual school meeting of district No. 5, this city, held at the court house last evening, was not largely attended by citizens. The patrons of the school undoubtedly feel that it is in good hands, as few men besides the directors and clerk were present.

The meeting was called to order by John Foshay, senior director.

C. G. Burkhardt, district clerk, read his annual report as follows:

Seattle Property.

Mr. Joseph Sage, an Oregon pioneer and an old and well known citizen of this city, died at 5 o'clock Sunday evening at the advanced age of 81 years. He was born in Baden, Germany on March 17, 1809. He came to America in 1850, and remained in Kansas City, Mo., until 1852, when he came to Oregon, and has resided at this city and at Brownsville ever since. He was an industrious and upright citizen, and had acquired a comfortable fortune. He leaves a wife and two daughters, Mrs. Chas. Kiefer of this city and Mrs. H. Haley, of Jacksonville. The funeral services will be held at the Catholic church at 2 o'clock to-day.

FROM BROWNSVILLE

Stock in Poor Condition and Dying—California and Narrow Gauge Railways.

BROWNSVILLE, Or., March 1.

A colder January and February was never known here and all kinds of stock are poor and many dying. The cold freezing nights are hard on winter wheat and grass, and will kill all grain in this part of the state if there is not a change soon.

Part of the California has been temporarily bridged, and the main stream just below the old bridge is shallow, so a good ford has been found, and the teams are now crossing.

A company of home capitalists have purchased J. P. Galbraith's farm above town. It is expected the terminus of the California railway will be somewhere in this neighborhood.

The news of the narrow gauge road being purchased by the Southern Pacific has cheered up this section of the country greatly, and as soon as the road is changed to a standard gauge, and the Willamette bridge, giving direct connection with Portland, we will not change places with any town in the state.

Railroad Along the Coast.

At no far distant day a railroad will be constructed along the Oregon coast from Yaquina bay to San Francisco, meeting the Donahue road that now runs from San Francisco bay to Ukiah. This road will enjoy advantages possessed by no other road in the United States. It will run the whole distance along the foot of a great and picturesque range of mountains and always close to or in sight of the broad Pacific ocean; it will be entirely free from snow blockades and very rarely impeded by floods, washouts and landslides. It will be the road par excellence for tourists to travel, and withal just about as short a line from San Francisco to Chicago as will be built. It will be a paying road from the start. Who knows but what this route is not in the plan of the railroad interests now being concentrated at Yaquina bay.—Newport Republican.

Not Silcott.

The man arrested at Toledo on suspicion of being Silcott, had on his person a letter written on an O.R. & N. letter head, signed H. A. Moss, and recommending C. F.
