COAST NOTES.

The towns of Oregon, without exception, are enjoying a healthy growth.

Dr. Alonzo Cleaver, of Baker City, has been appointed register of the land office at LaGrande.

In Seattle 142 building permits were issued in February. The cost of these structures will be \$226,225.

The people of Polk and Marion counties are moving in the matter of replacing the bridge across the Willamette at Salem. The bridge proved itself to be a great public necessity, and will be rebuilt.

Last Wednesday morning the thermometer registered 17 degrees below zero at Heppner. The loss of cattle and sheep was not large until the last cold weather, but it is apprehended that many will die now, as feed is very scarce.

Frank Glover, the well-known pugilist, arrived in Portland Monday night from San Francisco on the Oregon. It is understood that he will challenge the winner of the Conley-Flaherty fight which comes off at the pavilion Saturday night.

In Seattle during the month of February there were 11 fires in tents which 20 were destroyed and one damaged twice. The total loss resulting from these fires, as estimated by the department, is \$18,650. The losses as estimated by those burned out is greatly in excess of this.

Hon. H. B. Miller, of Josephine county, is reported as having a boom for congressman. Mr. Miller is a republican and a shrewd politician and it is stated that he has claims on the party managers at Portland. This enlarges the list of republican candidates for congress in the republican ranks to four: Hermann, Leasure, Ellis and Miller.
