OVER THE WIRES.

Three New War Vessels for the United States.

THE DAY IN CONGRESS.

Indian Scouts Wanted in the Regular Army to Pursue the Hostile Reds—Eastern News.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.

PHILADELPHIA, March 8.—Within a month three war vessels for the United States navy will be launched from the ship yard of the Delaware river, and after that for the first time in a number of years there will be no government vessels on stock in these yards. The first of the new boats to take water will be the gunboat Concord which will be launched at Chester today. On the 18 inst. the cruiser Newark will receive her baptism at Cramp's yard in this city and soon after the gunboat Bennington will be launched at Roach's yard. In addition to these important events the official trials of the Philadelphia and also of the Dynamite guns of the Vesuvius will take place soon.

THE DAY IN CONGRESS.

Indian Scouts Wanted in the Army to Pursue the Hostile Reds.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—In the house McCreary, of Kentucky, from the committee on foreign affairs, reported a resolution requesting from the president a correspondence with the Mexican government in regard to employment of Indian scouts for the purpose of pursuing hostile Indians in their raids into the territories of the United States, and any correspondence in regard to the proposed transfer of the Apache and Chiriquia Indians from Mount Fort Barracks, Alabama, to Fort Sill, Indian Territory, which was adopted.

The morning hour was consumed in the discussion of a bill for the compulsory attendance of witnesses before the registers of land offices. It passed the house and then the committee of the whole resumed the consideration of the public building measures.

THE PRIZE RING.

A Match to Be Arranged Between La Blanche and Dempsey.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 8.—W. S. Spicer a Canadian and townsman of George La Blanche announces in a letter that he will back La Blanche against Dempsey to the extent of \$15,000. He makes the following proposition: "First I will wager that La Blanche can knock Dempsey out in thirty rounds at the rate of one to two, for the sum of \$5,000. Second, I will wager that La Blanche beats in the sum of \$15,000 or upwards. Marquis of Queensbury rules to govern, in a club or out of a club.

OAKES AND PARTY.

The Lease of the Wisconsin Central Will Be Signed Soon.

CHIPPewa FALLS, Wis., March 8.—President Oakes of the Northern Pacific who is here, states that the lease of the Wisconsin central to the Northern Pacific will be signed very soon. He denied the report that the Northern Pacific is negotiating for the control of the road. Oakes and party left this morning for the Pacific slope.

BRIBERY.

Money Used in Large Sums to Pass the Lottery Bill.

BISMARCK, N. D., March 7.—A private letter on the lottery scheme written by Attorney General Goodwin to a newspaper friend in Lisbon, has been brought to light. The document states definitely that \$3000 was paid to members to support the lottery bill, with the understanding that the amount will be doubled when the bill has passed. It says that the attorney general's political rival held out for \$10,000. It is said that an attempt will be made to impeach Goodwin.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

A Car Derailed, Causing the Death of Twenty Beef Cattle.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 7.—A car on the west-bound freight train was derailed near Cisco this morning and struck the heavy supports of a snow shed, causing seventy feet of the structure to collapse. The car was completely crushed. It was loaded with twenty-one beef cattle, and twenty of these were killed. A car filled with plows was also wrecked.

THE GROWTH OF CITIES.

350 Cities in the United States Have a Population of 16,000,000.

The growth of cities in the United States is not the least of the marvels of modern civilization. There are now 350 of them, and nearly 16,000,000 people live in them. This statement implies such an aggregation of interests, problems and possibilities as the world has never before seen. In more dimensions the cities of other countries surpass them, but in no other country does the city

idea signify as much as it does here. Our city population is made up of all nationalities, and out of this strange mixture a new type of character is gradually being evolved. The foreign element is at present in the ascendancy in most of them, but the process of assimilation with the native stock is constantly going on, and the ultimate result must be the complete removal of the lines of distinction. This does not signify that European habits and tendencies will supersede those of American origin and meaning; but only that the latter will be so modified as to combine with the former and to produce new advantages in that respect. As the cities grow to wealth and power, they are bound to encounter many additional difficulties—social, political and industrial—and upon their ability to meet all such tests the welfare of the whole country largely depends.

This is only saying that one of the most important subjects of the time is municipal government. The affairs of our cities have become so extensive and so closely related to the general course of progress that the manner of their management affects all classes and localities. It is in the cities that there is the greatest demand for political ability and integrity. The men who make municipal laws and control municipal taxation and expenditure are those to whom we must look for a degree of practical wisdom and honest devotion to the public interest which shall equal to the solution of coming issues involving the gravest general interests. It is no longer safe or proper to seat weak men in the city councils. The community which does that may expect to pay dearly for it. No risk is justifiable where there is so much at stake. The people should make it a point to place all city business in the hands of thoroughly competent and reliable men—citizens of recognized commercial and moral excellence, who can neither be bribed nor deceived. It matters little who goes to congress or to the legislature, but a great deal who is elected to participate in city legislation. Federal and state laws touch the daily interests of life merely in a passing and hardly perceptible way, but the influence of municipal government is constant, and not to be escaped under circumstances. Every voter and taxpayer is personally concerned in the matter. It is a question of actual dollars and cents, of business prosperity, of social order and safety. And it is only by incessant vigilance on the part of the people that any city can secure good and profitable service from those who administer its affairs.
