A Tramp Assaults and Ravishes a Young Girl.

SENATOR STANFORD'S SCHEME

He Wants the United States Government to Become a Great Savings Bank

—Congressional.

PLEASANT HILL, Mo., March 13.—Yesterday afternoon a tramp way-laid Allie Atkinson, the 18-year-old daughter of a wealthy farmer. The brute ravished, bound and gagged her, cut off her hair and cut her clothes from her body, inflicting several severe wounds.

When she recovered consciousness she dragged herself home and told her story. An alarm was at once given and the whole country turned out with dogs and guns to hunt the scoundrel down. A tramp named Collins was arrested at Greenwood this morning and is awaiting identification. A mob of 1000 men surrounds the house in which he is being held threatening to lynch him.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.—A Washington special says: Senator Stanford now thinks very seriously of extending the financial scheme to make the government a great savings bank as well as a lender of money upon real estate security, and he has employed a number of financial experts and eminent lawyers to ascertain whether the plan he has in view to accomplish this is feasible and constitutional.

A RUSSIAN PRINCESS.

She Says the Stories of Russian Horrors are Much Exaggerated.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.—Martha Engelitz, who is traveling in this country was entertained by the ladies of the Corsica club yesterday. In the course of an informal talk she said that the stories of the life in the Siberian prisons that are told in this country are much exaggerated. Political prisoners in Russia, she says, are tried in the same manner as persons accused of ordinary crimes and the mode of procedure assures the accused a fair treatment as they would have here.

EVILS IN ALASKA.

Selling Indian Children to Lustful White Men.

TALK WITH DOCTOR JACKSON.

Girls Leased to Miners for Immoral Purposes and Boys the Husbands of Old Native Women.

New York, March 12.—Dr. Sheldon Jackson, United States General Agent of Education in Alaska, is visiting friends in Brooklyn. In an interview this evening he painted a vivid picture of the wickedness and immorality in that country.

Said he: "For the first time I have a good report to make as to the attitude of the Government officials in Alaska.

"President Arthur sent there a set of drunkards and gamblers. President Cleveland removed those officers because they were hostile to the missionaries, and then appointed another set just like them.

"One District Judge has fled to British territory under charges of forgery, and two of his successors were drunkards. With such an official atmosphere in the Territory the missionaries have encountered serious obstacles in pleading the cause of right and morality.

"The condition of the natives is nevertheless still deplorable. Missionary work encounters serious obstacles in the native customs, which are demoralizing, especially to girls. Miss Willard, one of the teachers, has, at the request of the Senate investigating committee, prepared a letter.

"The letter asks for Government protection for girls who are sold by their parents to white men for immoral purposes, protection for children who are married against their will and for orphans who are sold in slavery.

"The custom of the natives is to buy their wives. Since the white trader has come this custom has been extended to sales or leases to white men, and girls are such a source of income that their parents will not allow them to go to the mission schools.

"The courts sustain the right of parents to control their children, and girls who beg to be let into school cannot be taken without their parents' consent.

"The letter specifies an instance of a girl who was being saved for a white man who had offered \$250 for her when she was better grown. Native husbands and wives have adopted young children and raised them for the position of a second husband or wife when the first dies.

"In this way boys of 15 or 16 become husbands of crippled old women and young girls become the wives and frequently the plural wives of old men. The letter declares that scores of people are murdered as witches under Alaskan superstition.
