ABOUT SEWERAGE.

Proposition to Invest \$75,000 in Sewers in Albany.

COMPLETE SYSTEM PROPOSED.

Full Text of the Communication Recently Presented to the City Council on the Subject—The Cost, Etc.

The communication presented to the city council at the last meeting of that body on the sewerage question, which has already been referred to by the Herald, has elicited no little comment among the citizens of this city. The proposition is from an eastern firm who agree to expend from \$50,000 to \$75,000 in constructing a complete sewerage system.

An order to provide for a system of sewerage for the city, and the inhabitants authorizing—his associates, successors or assigns to construct, operate and maintain a system of sewerage, and for that purpose to use all streets, lanes, alleys, avenues and public grounds as the same now exists or may hereafter be extended within the corporate limits of the city.

Sec. 1. That in consideration of the public benefits to be derived by the construction and maintenance of a system of sewerage the right is hereby granted to—his associates, successors or assigns for the period of 25 years, and until such times as the city shall purchase the right to construct and maintain a system of sewerage, and for that purpose to use all streets, lanes, alleys, avenues and public grounds as the same now exists or may hereafter be extended within the corporate limits of the city.

Sec. 2. That the said—his associates, successors or assigns may organize a corporation under the laws of any state, and may assign such corporation all the rights and privileges herebefore granted, and this ordinance shall be binding with equal force and effect upon any such corporation and said city.

Sec. 3. That the system shall be what is known as the separate system, and in use as follows: First, Flit and Little, second, Ark., and Natchez, Miss., and all of the best salt glazed vitrified pipes, and of maple size to meet all requirements with sufficient flush tanks, manholes and lamp holes to make the system complete.

Sec. 4. That in consideration of the building and maintenance of said sewer system, the city agrees to pay annually, during the continuance of this franchise the sum of \$200 per mile or fraction thereof, for all sewers constructed or extensions made, payable semi-annually, and the city further agrees to furnish and maintain the right of way for outlets and hold the said—his associates, successors or assigns harmless from any and all damages by reason of the construction of the same.

Sec. 5. That the said—his associates, successors or assigns shall make all extensions required by resolution of the board of councilmen provided however, there shall be \$50 revenue per annum for completion of 500 feet of said extension and that the natural drainage of the extension to be made is said that it will empty into the original system, which shall consist of at least 7 miles of pipe.

Sec. 6. That the city by its special authorities upon request, will pass, enact, and enforce all necessary ordinances to protect the said—his associates, successors or assigns in the rights hereby granted.

Sec. 7. That the said—his associates, successors or assigns shall lay the pipes as not to interfere with any water or gas pipes now existing, and shall as far as practicable follow the grades as now established, provided, however, that if it shall become necessary at any future time to lower said pipes, manholes or flush tanks in order to conform to any altered grade deemed advisable by the city authorities, the expense of lowering the same shall be paid by the city.

Sec. 8. That the city shall have the right to purchase the sewerage system and rights at the expiration of ten years or every consecutive 5 years thereafter in the following manner: In case said—his associates, successors or assigns, and the city shall fall to agree upon the price to be paid by the city, then at appraised value.

THE STREET CAR EXTENSION.

The Company Will Meet April 1st to Consider Such a Proposition.

Several days ago the Herald published a statement that a movement was on foot to increase the capital stock of the Albany Street Railway Company and to extend its lines during the coming summer.

The statement is now confirmed by an advertisement of the company which appears in our columns this morning. The stockholders of the company will meet on April 1st to consider a proposition authorizing the filing of supplementary articles of incorporation and the extension of the street car lines.

It is likely that the proposition will be accepted and that four or five miles of track will be built this summer, and it is also understood that the road will become an electric motor line.

Albany is showing evidences of her growth and prosperity in many ways, and the institutions of the city are steadily assuming metropolitan proportions.

Following are the newly-elected officers of the company: President, L. Flinn; vice-president, W. H. Gottra; secretary, C. G. Burkhardt; treasurer, L. F. Wax.

BECOMING MEEPLE LITAN.

Astoria Real Estate to be Sold at Auction, in This City Wednesday.

Mr. F. J. Goodhough, of the firm of Leinenweber & Goodhough real estate agents of Astoria, arrived in this city Monday morning and arranged to place on the Albany market a portion of one of the finest additions yet laid out in the city of Astoria.

The stockholders of the Albany street car company held their annual meeting Monday evening, at which time the following officers were elected: Directors—N. H. Allen, W. C. Tweedale, C. H. Stewart, Julius Gradwohl, Julius Joseph, W. F. Read and Geo. E. Chamberlain. The officers are: W. C. Tweedale, president; W. F. Read, secretary; Geo. E. Chamberlain, treasurer. The receipts for the year were \$127.73 and the disbursement, including two dividends aggregating \$418, were \$1251.

Death of James Dickson.

One by one the old and honored pioneers who were trained in Oregon prior to the fifties, are dropping out. Yesterday James Dickson, who has lived in Linn county since 1847, died. He came from Iowa in the company in which the Ralstons, Walter Ketchum, Jason Wheeler, George Klum, E. Sallmarsh and others came to this state. He was a noble and highly respected citizen, and his death will be deeply regretted.

Gas Well Project.

THE OREGON PACIFIC.

Hopes of Boise City for an Early Completion of the Line.

Among the certainties of the early future may be safely set down the completion of the Oregon Pacific railroad to this city. This is no myth, no dream of the idle boaster. Of course there may be some doubt entertained as to what corporation will continue the construction of the road and control it after it is completed; but if the Oregon Pacific has any real cause of being, or any rational future, these can only be made manifest and realized by following out the original plan which has never been lost sight of or modified, of building to Boise City.

The point at which this road will cross Snake river will probably be at Ontario on the Oregon shore, from which point the line will follow up the Payette valley to or near Falk's Store, and cross the low range of hills to the Boise valley in the immediate vicinity of Caldwell. It is known that a very easy grade can be had across these low hills, as a survey for an irrigating canal has been made, having its initial point on the Payette river and terminating at the foot of the bluff near Caldwell. This survey was made by an experienced engineer and there is no doubt of its correctness. A railroad on this line, connecting Ontario and Caldwell, would control the trade of the entire Payette valley and the lower section of the Boise valley, while the remaining portion of the Boise valley would be secured by the extension of the road to this city. What is here said regards the evident purpose of the company at present controlling the construction of the Oregon Pacific, and is exactly in line with the purpose expressed by the Boise City board of trade at its meeting on Wednesday evening.

While the Oregon Pacific is being extended eastward, Boise City can be building westward, and when the junction is effected at whatever point on the Oregon line, the adjustment of mutual interests will be easy and natural.

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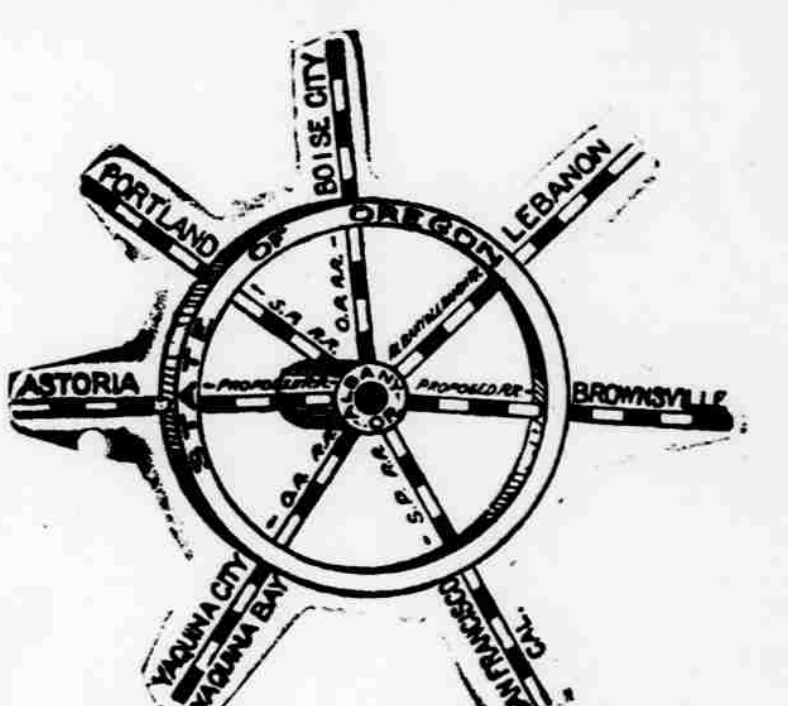
